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

## EQUINE CUSHINGS DISEASE: EQUINE PITUITARY PARS INTERMEDIA DYSFUNCTION

Equine Cushings disease is one of the most common diseases of horses greater than 15 years of age. The clinical signs are associated with abnormally elevated hormone concentrations in the blood and along with other hormones cortisol plays an important role in this disease. This syndrome is better defined as Equine Pituitary Pars Intermedia Dysfunction (PPID) because it reflects the location within the brain that is abnormal.

The pituitary gland is located at the base of the brain. In horses with PPID, the middle lobe of the pituitary gland (pars intermedia) becomes enlarged over time and results in over production of hormones. The enlargement of the pituitary gland is often referred to as a pituitary adenoma.

**Signs and Symptoms:** Clinical signs of PPID can vary depending upon the stage of disease. The average age of horses diagnosed with PPID is 20 years, with over 85 percent of the horses being greater than 15 years of age. Although PPID is most common in aged horses there have been cases of horses as young as seven having the disease. All breeds of horses can develop PPID. The most classic symptom of PPID is a long curly hair coat that does not shed properly. This condition is referred to as **hirsuitism**.

Other symptoms that have been associated with PPID include excessive drinking and urination, laminitis, lethargy, excessive sweating, muscle mass loss, repeated

infections such as hoof abscesses, tooth root infections, and sinusitis; infertility and bulging eyes that are a result of redistribution of fat.

**Diagnosis:** The best indication of PPID is the clinical sign of hirsuitism in the aged horse. Horses that have subtle signs of PPID need to be tested to confirm the disease. Of the tests available, no single test is 100 percent accurate. The most commonly used test in the field is the measurement of ACTH concentration. A single blood measurement of ACTH concentration is advocated by some as a confirmatory test for PPID. This test is simple and results are available within 3-5 days. Early in the course of the disease the long curly hair coat may not be present. If the horse does not have hirsuitism, a repeated test at six month intervals may be necessary to confirm the disease.

**Therapy:** Treatment seldom achieves complete resolution or remission of the disease. The most important reason to treat is to improve the quality of life. <u>Pergolide</u> is the drug of choice for treatment of PPID. The dose can be adjusted based on response to therapy or repetitive testing. Supportive care is also important for enhancement of the quality of life of horses with PPID. High quality preventative medicine such as regular deworming, dental care and consistent farrier work has been advocated. In the warm months, clipping of unnecessary hair will keep the horse more comfortable.

Recognition of the clinical signs and early diagnosis are the first steps in identification of horses with PPID. Treatment and implementation of excellent wellness practices are the key features to extending the life of a horse with PPID.





#### **Bonfire And Fireworks Night – Bonfire Fuel Wanted**

The 2017 Wamboin Bonfire and Fireworks Night is planned for Saturday the 23rd of September. Now is a good time to reduce the fire hazards on your property by clearing unwanted branches, prunings and brush. By delivering suitable material to the Bonfire site at the Community Centre Bingley Way, you will help make the night a memorable occasion. **Please do not mix in: treated timber, old carpets, soil, metal fittings, or large green logs. It may be hard to believe but other non-burnable materials such as wire, bricks and old sheets of corrugated iron have been delivered in past years. Pallets are <b>not wanted** because after they burn they leave a bed of nails, which can puncture the tyres of the clean-up tractors. **Very large logs and stumps are a problem** as they continue to smoulder and smoke for many days. All of these items have to be separated and taken away.

So what can you bring? The ideal is to have a large fire that burns quickly. This calls for prunings, branches and brush stacked high.

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#### Wamboin Community Association Inc. (WCA) General Meeting - Summary

Date of Meeting: 18 July 2017 Meeting chaired by: Peter Evans, President, WCA

#### **General Outline Of Topics Discussed**

Members of the WCA met in the warm Wamboin Hall to hear from WCA Committee members and representatives of other community organisations active in our community and associated, in some manner with the WCA. WCA Secretary David McDonald advised that arrangements were underway for a Meet the Candidates event on August 22nd at the Wamboin Hall, prior to the Council election on 9 September. Editor of the Wamboin Whisper, Ned Noel, thanked everyone who had contributed to, delivered and read the July issue. Lofty Mason gave an extensive report on the water management issues at the rear of the Wamboin Hall caused by the path of water inflow from the adjoining property and unsatisfactory current water diversion mechanisms. The plan is to extend two existing swales which run from Bingley Way through the areas surrounding the Hall and car park. Lofty advised that the Fire Brigade and the Hall Management Committee had agreed to pay a proportion of the cost and requested that the WCA also consider making a contribution, a request to be considered by the Committee.

A number of local organisations gave reports on their activities, including the following:

- Peter Evans, President of the Wamboin Pony Club reported that at the July Canberra Zone Mounted Games competition, Wamboin's team of 8 plus 3 individual riders qualified for the NSW state championships to occur on the October long weekend (Fri 29/9/17-Mon 2/10/17) at Bungendore. He was also happy to report that Club membership has increased by fifty percent this year.
- On behalf of Landcare, David McDonald advised that a new planting plan for the Bywong Community Hall is in progress and plantings will occur in Spring.
- Wamboin Communications Action Group's (WCAG), Jon Gough, advised that WCAG is in early negotiations with a potential supplier for a community based fibre to the premise solution. The proposed network would cover Wamboin, Bywong & Sutton and provide speeds between 10MB-500MB. Each premise would have 2 fibre cables installed with lifespan of 20-50 years, thereby future-proofing this area. WCAG need to know which properties are interested so they can plot the address to be used for planning purposes. They have 300 properties signed up, with further Community meetings planned for August onwards.

As is usual, various questions were asked by WCA members seeking advice from those more experienced with local matters and a wide variety of issues affecting all of us who share this rural residential community.

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Be Fire Wise every day of the year

Before you light that fire

Bushfire may be far from our minds on these cold winter nights, however, the start of the Bushfire Danger Season is less than two months away.

Don't leave it to the last minute to have your home and property ready for the coming Bushfire Season.

When lighting a fire for either a Burn Off, a Pile Burn or for Agricultural Practices, there are a number of steps you must follow, even in the middle of winter.

While a permit is not required outside of the Bushfire Danger Period (generally from the 1<sup>st</sup> October to the 31<sup>st</sup> of March), you still have the responsibility to notify the following at least 24 hours before you light that fire.

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## **CONTENTIOUS CHARACTER**

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All adjoining landholders and occupiers

The Lake George Zone Office during business hours (9am to 5pm) before midday on Fridays. Phone 02 61280600

You will also need to create a proper fire break around the burn area

You will need to check the forecasted weather conditions, delay the burn if concerning winds are forecast You will need to have adequate water resources and fire fighting equipment ready to use.

#### VIEW Amazed By Creativite Felting By Publicity Officers Maureen Boss And Nancy-Lea Legge

Lake George Day VIEW club gathered in July at the Stonehouse Restaurant (aka Eaglehawk Pub) with Julie Knight from Bywong Art & Crafts who gave an inspiring talk, illustrated by samples of her creative felting works.

Julie was a teacher for twenty five years, developing her skills in felting and her creativity is often inspired by her great love of nature. She collects leaves to incorporate into her felt, spiders are studied for shape and then made in glowing colours. If going to the seaside her family are compelled to bring back shells and colourful stones. Julie is elated to find that research has shown that Arts and Crafts are of benefit to us and psychologists agree.

Felting is the oldest non woven textile. Story told of how felt came to be. Two men journeying on foot stuffed wool into their shoes to prevent blisters. When they removed their shoes at the end, the wool was felt. The combination of sweat from the feet, warmth from the body and constant friction had caused the change. Apparently there are four ways of felting and many fabrics which may be interwoven with the wool . Julie showed examples of her craft from a large shawl to tiny objects, and the redback spider was a hit with our country members.

Julie gives classes on her farm to anyone who is interested, and is willing to teach any age and number up to ten at a time. After the delightful Christmas in July lunch, the meeting closed, with the reminder that next month we will celebrate our Clubs 13<sup>th</sup> Birthday with a 1960's

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#### FIBRE BROADBAND IN WAMBOIN, BYWONG AND THE SUTTON REGION!

- Fibre Broadband Cable may possibly be coming to the Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton region!
- This is a community action group driven initiative.
- If you are interested in getting Fibre to your premises, you must sign up and complete the survey.
- We must get as many of our neighbours signed up as possible to ensure a viable fibre route Talk to them!
- If you don't show interest now, it may not be available later, or it may cost a lot more.

You may have already heard a whisper about the possibility of our area getting a broadband fibre connection to each property. Yes it's true, the Wamboin Communications Action Group is in discussion with a third party to lay fibre optic cable around this area, giving everyone who chooses to connect a superfast internet connection, far faster and more reliable than the satellite service NBN is offering and at a cost comparable to what our friends in Canberra pay.

With negotiations underway now, we need residents to sign up to our email list and complete a short survey.

#### Why do you need to sign up?

To make this a reality we need as many people as possible to get on board. Laying fibre in the ground is an expensive business and our potential partners need a minimum number of properties to make a start. We need as much of the fibre as possible to be laid between/across our properties, in order to minimise the need for regulatory permission to run along the roads. Not only would this complicate the project with the need for approvals, it would also add to costs.

Soon we hope to be able to share more details with residents, but for now we need to know the locations of those residents interested in getting fast fibre broadband so that we can begin to plan possible fibre paths We are not asking for a commitment to anything right now but if you sign up at the start then we shall make every attempt to include your property on the cable routes being considered. If you leave it until later, when the cables are already in place, then you may not be able to be connected at all, or the connection cost may be far higher.

If you have already signed up and completed the survey, then you need to talk to your neighbours to encourage as many properties in your area to do so too. If you are the only one in your immediate vicinity to want connection then you may miss out. It is in everyone's interest to work together on this project, so go and talk to your neighbours and tell them about this exciting prospect! Remember, we need your address to help plan the fibre route so completing the survey and including your address is critical. Again – you are not committing to anything by doing so – simply helping us plan and consider possible routes based on the level of interest you express in the survey

#### What do you have to lose?

At the moment we cannot give you exact costs but usage fees are looking to be on a par with what current NBN city dwellers pay for comparable speeds and unlimited data. You are not committing yourself by signing up, just showing your interest, you have nothing to lose and everything to gain – not to mention the fact that you are supporting an initiative that will contribute enormously to enhancing our community.

Before we start the final planning stage we will have more details - including a proper contract for you to read and consider. We clearly understand that you would be concerned about someone digging a trench across your property, so please know that you will be consulted beforehand and the route chosen to best suit you and have minimum impact on the environment. 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#### Wildcare's Above and Beyond - Alex

Alex (*see photo*) is a Yellow Tailed Black Cockatoo and is a very lucky lad. Discovered, as a tiny 10-day old chick in the hollow of a felled tree at Tarago. He was picked up by a couple of inquisitive Samaritans, taken to the Vet, who then passed the bird to Wildcare for rehabilitation and release. But this little fella had a different destiny to the norm.



Maryanne, Wildcare's bird coordinator, took on the job of initially raising Alex prior to handing him onto Nadia who specialises in bird care. As Maryanne says, "Raising a chick from such an early age is not easy. They require considerable care, in terms of temperature and humidity control. And they need feeding with a syringe every couple of hours. It can be a challenge, but this one made it and within a few months had grown quickly to close to its full-grown weight of about 700 grams."

"The problem was, that Alex was raised alone, and didn't know how to be a cockatoo. And as Wildcare and neighbouring wildlife groups didn't have a

companion bird to match him up, he became very humanised. He certainly could not be released back into the wild, as he would always seek out the company of people. Normally in such a case, if an animal cannot be released, it has to be euthanised. However, under the NSW Code of Practice for raising and releasing orphaned wildlife, there was a slim option to keep him alive, as a permanent care animal.

"Maryanne and Nadia wanted the best possible home for Alex and found exactly that, all the way across in Western Australia at the Kaarakin Black Cockatoo Conservation Centre. Kaarakin was very keen to have Alex to help raise public awareness. They already have other species of black cockatoos and have huge aviaries and facilities. There is no doubt Alex will have a great life at Kaarakin. To transfer Alex, there was a need to get permission from the NSW and WA governments and then it was a matter of organising the flight across the continent."

So, well done to Maryanne and Nadia, who both raised Alex at different stages and took the long journey across to Perth. Their efforts to raise Alex, and then at their expense, transfer him to Kaarakin are extraordinary. As Maryanne, says, "He has apparently settled in

very well – happy to chat away to the staff and get along with the other permanent care parrots. Overall, Kaarakin can have as many as 150 parrots at any time in rehabilitation and permanent care."

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#### **Drainage Of Hall Grounds**

The large RFS tank near the playground and the overflow from that tank has severely curtailed access to the rear of the Hall. When checking how to remedy the problem the decision was made by the Hall Management Committee to also increase the swales that redirect the water, which runs onto the NW section of the car park, and to re-align the water flow behind the Hall. This will require bringing in some soil and also adding an underground drainage pipe to the RFS tank overflow. While there has not been a lot of run-off water lately, the drainage will be an advantage in the future.



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#### **Out of the Corner**

As our new council draws close to the end of its period of administration, it's good to be back offering informative commentary on local government matters.

NSW Planning Portal — A couple of years ago, I wrote about the Electronic Housing Code (EHC) and the role it played in enabling users to determine whether they needed planning permission to build or renovate, and also, when appropriate, to prepare, submit and lodge a complying development application. This system was superseded a few ago by the new NSW Department of Planning & Environment Planning Portal at https://www.planningportal.nsw.gov.au. Like the original EHC, the new Planning Portal provides public access to information, online services and guidance materials relating to the NSW planning system. The Portal has been designed to address the needs of NSW councils, industry professionals and the general community, in an ongoing effort to improve access to planning information.

Access to the new Planning Portal is open-registration is no longer required-and users can search planning information on any property in NSW, including the maps and applicable clauses associated with the relevant LEP. It also includes a range of background information to help users to efficiently navigate the NSW planning system. The map viewer is particularly useful, providing access to recent imagery with the ability to overlay the complete range of LEP map data for quick identification of the applicable LEP clauses.

The Portal also provides a single point of access for DA tracking throughout NSW. In this case, DA status information is ultimately provided through individual council websites, but there is no longer any need to know how to navigate through [the invariably different routes on] individual council websites to find this information. As well as the status and progress of individual DAs, the tracking system provides the ability to query the status of any DA in a nominated area, either at the locality or individual street/road level.

Note that development in the former Palerang and Queanbeyan City areas will continue to be controlled by their respective LEPs for the foreseeable future. It is, nonetheless, expected that LEP consolidation will be completed in the 2018-2019 timeframe, in the term of the new and soon to be elected Council.

When our elder son was to be married it was suggested to me that I should wear beige and keep my mouth shut. Well, beige wasn't my colour, so I wore green.....It seems only a few short months ago that the landscape also chose to wear green, but as I look around now I see only beige, and I can't keep my mouth shut any longer!

Autumn this year was brilliant. We didn't get much rain but what little we got came just at the right time. Since then, however, despite the periodic appearance of black cockatoos and busy little ant trails signalling rain, nothing much has happened. Meanwhile the green grass has vanished and all that remains are a few beige tufts and bare ground; the birds and animals are hungry.

You can't blame them for their appetites. We provide year round water, even when the creeks dry up, with our dams only an easy hop apart. We provide a smorgasbord in our gardens long after the native grasses have disappeared, and the kangaroos munch steadily through hard times on the extras we provide, and continue to do what comes naturally....breed! Many years ago during the last drought, I came across a well dressed couple beside the road, looking lost. They weren't. They were German tourists who'd been told to go to Wamboin if they wanted to see kangaroos.

Well, the drought ran its course, we had a few good years, the creeks ran, our dams filled and overflowed, gardens blossomed and the kangaroos flourished. Now we're in drought again and the foraging kangaroo population is out of control. They're eating native plants that I've never seen them touch before and depriving many birds and other native species of their food sources and habitats as they strip the country bare.

This is a land of good years and bad years, but we've upset the balance. What are we going to do about it? Will we sit back, with our beige voices, and do nothing while our natural diversity is decimated. Kangaroos are beautiful creatures with a truly fascinating biology, they are unique, they are our National symbol, but they were never meant to inhabit this fragile landscape in such large numbers. We have, perhaps unwittingly, created this mess but are now impotent to do anything about it, trussed up as we are in a string of rules and regulations made by those with their heads in the clouds and their feet under a desk.

I wouldn't live anywhere else....Encountering three or four kangaroos along my driveway is pure pleasure, but a mob of thirty or forty is a bit much!! And I pity those who have to eke out a living from this land, while struggling to feed the rest of us!
