



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Bird Of The Month By Luke Downey

For the December Bird of the Month I chose the Sacred Kingfisher which is a summer migrant to Wamboin who has been calling at our house for the past month - a call you may also have heard.

Sacred Kingfisher (Todiramphus sanctus)Size: 20-23 cmStatus: Fairly common breeding summer migrant

This bird is mostly a creamy-white colour, with aqua-blue on it back, tail, wings and on top of its head. It also has a black stripe through the eye and a large bill. Sacred kingfishers are summer migrants to this area, so look for them between September and April. These birds have a distinctive call: a loud eeh-eeh-eeh-eeh, repeated several times. They are found in the tree canopy and are usually in pairs. Although they are only found during the summer months, they breed in

Wamboin. Unusually for a kingfisher, they are not normally found near water and rarely eat fish or other water animals. (Photo sourced from Google Images)


Wamboin Book Club



SPRING TALKS 2017 – "THE QPRC TALK"



Queanbeyan-Palerang Regional Council Mayor, Tim Overall, was the guest speaker at the Wamboin Community Association's (WCA's) third and final Spring Talk – 2017 at the Wamboin Community Hall on Tuesday 21 November. In a break from the traditional "presentation and Q&A" format, WCA President, Peter Evans, asked the Mayor a series of questions, which are published here along with the Mayor's responses. The interview was followed by a Q&A session and light refreshments. (*Questions posed by the WCA President are preceded by "Q)", in bold italics.*)



General:

Q) What are your priorities, as Mayor, for Council for the next three years? What key outcomes (as different from activities) do you want to achieve by September 2020?

Mayor Overall referred the audience to the Group A Election Campaign Flyer "Your Vision, Our Commitment" as distributed by Australia Post to all letter boxes from 27 October 2017 (which many attendees said they had not received). He said the flyer lists nine regional commitments for inclusion in Delivery Program and that commitments for inclusion in Delivery Program for Bungendore - Bywong – Wamboin are shown as (1) New sports complex and new Mick Sherd Oval facilities; (2) Town Centre improvements; (3) New Halfway Creek Bridge, Bungendore Road.

Budget

Q) What are the proposed Special Rate Variations for the next Delivery Plan?

"Council's next Delivery Program will cover the period 1 July 2018 – 30 June 2021. In announcing the merger, the NSW Government announced a rate path freeze for a four-year period (up until 2020). The next Delivery Program will not contain a Special Rate Variation. The Long Term Financial Plan which makes up the draft Resourcing Strategy references the possibility of an increase in general rates of 1% above the rate peg limit set by the Independent and Pricing Regulatory Tribunal."

${\it Q}$) What items are in the proposed budget in the Wamboin area?

"The 2017-18 Operational Plan can be found at <u>https://www.qprc.nsw.gov.au/Council/Council-business/Budgets-and-planning</u>.

Council has allocated:

- \$700,000 towards the Macs Reef Landfill reinstatement.
- more than \$9M towards upgrades to local regional and state road networks.
- The full grading, resealing and rehabilitation program is currently being developed and will be implemented in early 2018. At the moment there are 3 reseals planning in Wamboin area for the 2017-18 resealing season
 - 1. Norton Road, 500m past Bingley Way
 - 2. Bungendore Road, from Doust Road to the Federal Highway.
 - 3. Bungendore road, from Millyn Road towards Emu Flat. This section of road consists of a considerable amount of heavy patching to be completed prior to the reseal taking place.

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There will be further reseals programed in the Wamboin area in the following year's schedule, but exact locations have not yet been finalised. Apart from the reseals there will be routine maintenance carried out consisting of, but not limited to, such things as pothole patching, edge repairs, shoulder grading, drainage works, tree trimming and ground vegetation control. The Forward Capital Works Program will be included in the Delivery Program for 2018-2021. This document will be developed in consultation with council and the community in early 2018. It is expected that public exhibition will occur in March-April 2018."

QPRC Local Environmental Plan

Q) What is the scope and timetable for developing a QPRC LEP?

"The current timetable remains as previously reported to Council at its meeting of 28 September 2016 which is:

For the comprehensive Local Environmental Plan (LEP) the preferred scope at this stage would be essentially an administrative merger of the six principal local environmental plans currently applying to the LGA. However at the same time there is recognition of a number of priority policy issues (some being long standing ones) which the comprehensive LEP will also address. These are:

- Review of E4 Environmental Living zone (with a focus on Bywong and Wamboin),
- Rural Lands Study, and
- Proposed Bungendore Aged Care Facility.

This preferred scope for the comprehensive LEP has been reported to the Planning and Strategy meeting of 8 November 2017 and staff intend to report to Council on the first two issues at the meeting of 13 December 2017.

However in addition to the comprehensive LEP Council will be continuing with other land-use projects such as the planning proposal for the rezoning of North Bungendore (Elmslea - 300 lots) and the planning proposal for the rezoning of South Jerrabomberra (1500 lots in total including South Tralee). Should these be finalised in time then they will also be incorporated into the comprehensive LEP."

Greenways

O) The Wamboin/Bywong Greenways - official and informal - are among the key assets of the OPRC area. What action is Council taking, or will it take, to remediate the severely damaged parts of the Greenways Network, and to expand, protect and strengthen the Network, such as when Crown Roads are released?

"QPRC Service Manager - Urban Landscapes, Tim Geyer, advises that a small amount of money has been made available for Greenways maintenance and that he has been liaising with the relevant s355 Committee to identify priority areas for maintenance. He considers it would be beneficial for staff to review the situation on site. Tim is the contact point in Council in regard to Greenways. In terms of new areas that may come under Council's control as a result of changes to the Crown

Lands arrangements, Council has made no provision for improvement or maintenance of such areas should this occur, nor is it in any foreshadowed budget."

Roads

Q) Please explain the difference between local, State and Federal roads in terms of funding and maintenance responsibilities.

Mayor Overall provided information in a handout that will be published on the WCA website and in an upcoming issue of the Wamboin Whisper.

Q) Wamboin and Bywong's roads have sections that are potholes over potholes. What road projects are specifically proposed for the Wamboin area in the term of the current Council? .

"Bitumen Resealing 17/18: Bungendore Road – Doust Road to Federal Highway; Bungendore Road – Emu Flat to Millyn Road

Routine maintenance 17/18: Maintenance grading of unsealed roads; Vegetation control; Drainage maintenance; Pothole patching

The reconstruction of about 1km of Macs Reef Road on the Federal Highway end is also proposed however this may not be done until later in 2018.

The Possible Construction Projects over the next few years are:

- Macs Reef Road: Pavement rehabilitation from CH880m Federal Highway to CH2380
- Bungendore Road: Pavement rehabilitation from Macs Reef Road to Summerhill Road
- Bungendore Road: Halfway Creek Bridge Replacement"

Road Safety

Q) Does Council have Road Safety Officers/Co-ordinators as do other Councils? If so, what are their roles and activities, what have they achieved and what goals do they aim to achieve over the next three years?

Q) Is there a Road Safety Committee and, if so, what is its composition, what does it do, and what outcomes has it achieved to date?

Mayor Overall provided information in a handout that will be published on the WCA website and in an upcoming issue of the Wamboin Whisper.

Companion Animals and Responsible Pet Ownership

Q) Roaming domestic dogs are a major issue in our area with numerous attacks on stock and wildlife reported to Council. We are pleased to see recent advertisements for the new role of Animal Management Officer. The WCA will be happy to work with this Officer to arrange community meetings and other avenues for advertising their remit and providing community education on responsible pet ownership. Has the position been filled and how do we best engage with the newly appointed Officer?

"In developing its Transition Structure, Council took into consideration the vast area it covers and the issues with roaming dogs, especially in rural areas. In doing so, Council has created a new position for an Animal Management Officer. The recruitment process that is currently underway (interviews late October), will result in two Animal Management Officers being appointed. It is expected that these two officers will rotate between the Queanbeyan Pound and Bungendore Office with the intention of undertaking more patrols in rural areas and working with groups such as yours on education. The Association is encouraged to engage with Sheree Curwen, our Animal Management Team Leader and when resources become available, we will be in a better position to provide education and information to your Association."

Social Development

Q) We are aware Council has Community Development Officers but are unaware who they are, what their roles are, and what they achieve. Please discuss.

Mayor Overall provided information in a handout that will be published on the WCA website and in an upcoming issue of the Wamboin Whisper.

Community Services

Community Health Services for the Wamboin area

Q) Wamboin residents have access to medical services in Bungendore and Queanbeyan. However, more is needed for community services in our area including those focusing on ageing in place and preventive health services. Please discuss Council's plans.

"QPRC plays an important role in planning programs and developing/encouraging community networks. We recognise and support Seniors' Week, and are aware that the current QPRC Active Ageing Strategy 2014-2017, will need to be reviewed. We also promote healthy eating and activity programs through schools throughout the region. However, QPRC does not provide Community Health Services directly. NSW Health offers the Community Health service in

Queanbeyan and the surrounding region. According to their web page, "...a range of health services are provided to the local community. Services include Community Nursing, counselling, children's services, women's health, sexual health,

immunisation, continence nurses, ACAT, asthma clinic, OT for children, dementia advice, diabetes education, physiotherapy, dietician, cancer care, foot clinic, audiology, lactation consultant, men's health, needle exchange, sexual assault counselling, palliative care, TB service, and social work. Crisis Response Service

Q) What action is Council taking, or will it take, to have an ambulance station located in Bungendore?

Mayor Overall committed to taking this up with the Minister for Health/Ambulance Service of NSW to ascertain current position and forward plans.

When carrying out hot works in the open such as welding, soldering, or gas cutting (or any other work likely to generate sparks) it is a legal requirement to have fire fighting equipment in working order available on site.

As a minimum you must have:

- 16 Lt knapsack spray pump filled with water; or
- 9 Lt liquid fire extinguisher; or
- 0.9 Kg dry powder fire extinguisher.

Angle grinders have in the past been attributed as the cause of significant fire within Australia most recently in February 2017 with the Carwoola Fire. This fire burnt 3,500 hectares, destroying 8 homes and damaging many others.




BYWONG COMMUNITY HALL NEEDS YOU!!!

The worker said it took a long time to pick up those inside the WTS. None were noticeable on Sunday around 9 am. – Ned Noel

Wildcare: Wrapping Up 2016–17

Recent statistics for Wildcare show that over the past year we responded to over 3300 calls about wildlife needing help. The largest number of calls related to macropods (1560) – mostly eastern grey kangaroos, as well as wallabies and the odd wallaroo. Road collisions were the primary reason for more than half of macropod calls (56%). Other reports were for



orphaned or abandoned joeys (often related to road deaths of mother), those caught in fencing, and dog attacks. Over summer, due to the bushfires in the region, we also assessed or brought in to care around 75 macropods with burn injuries. Other burn victims included birds, possums, echidnas and wombats.

Around 1000 calls about birds came in, making this the second most-reported animal type needing assistance. A diversity of species was called in, from common magpies, cockatoos and rosellas etc. to several raptors and some with unusual names, such as the olive-backed oriole, nankeen night-heron and white-winged triller. The main reasons for calls also

varied and included habitat loss, juveniles needing care, car collisions, cat attacks, disease, domestic escape/release and others. In many cases injured birds are found with cause unknown.

Reptiles also made up a large bulk of calls (438) to Wildcare, including lizards, the eastern long-necked turtle and snakes. As for all wildlife, many reptiles were found injured on roads, particularly turtles for which this was the main reason for reporting (65 calls). Many lizards were victims of cat or dog attacks (79) and a fair number, along with snakes, had become entangled or trapped in netting or similar materials (26). Snake calls (230) are quite different to those for other reptiles, as people tend to report sightings of snakes in their gardens or on their properties. A few frogs and monitors were called in, and this year we had a blind snake called in from Burra – a rarely-seen species.

Small mammals included possums, gliders, bats, echidnas and native rats (antechinus) – a total of 222 calls for a range of reasons. The 90 calls about brushtail possums, for example, were due to loss of parents, habitat loss, entrapment, being hit by cars and dog attacks, among others. There were more than 20 calls about gliders over the year - mainly for sugar gliders, a few feathertails and one greater glider. The stats show that sugar gliders are particularly susceptible to attack by cats, dogs and birds. Of the small mammals, 32 bat calls were received; most being microbats and others included the Lesser Long-eared bat, Little Forest bat and the wattled bat species. There were over 30 calls about flying foxes (most Grey-headed), often due to entanglement, electrocution or young being orphaned.

Wombats form another category, and over the year there were 88 calls received caused by car collisions (31), skin disease – mange (21), and being orphaned (13).

So, what is the outcome for all of these calls about wildlife in strife? Our statistics for all wildlife called in during 2016-17 show that: 1434 died or were euthanised; 584 were released or relocated; 357 were taken into care; 326 are unknown; 278 disappeared (before rescue); 172 were transferred to other wildlife groups and Vets; and, 125 were left alone and observed.

Drains, Ditches and Swales

The Hall was built in 1983, which was a very dry year. In '84 we had record rains and the large catchment area to the east of Bingley Way drained a lot of water towards the Hall. My father-in-law and I went to check and we found water banking up against the east wall of the Hall and running under the door. We dug a rough ditch to run the water down the north side of the Hall. Some time later the Council came and dug a deep drain between the Hall and the playground. A Community working bee laid an agricultural pipe and covered in the drain.

Problems with the concrete floor indicated that water was still getting under the Hall so the Council built a bank from the Hall running towards the entry gate to divert the water via a swale around the north of playground. Another swale was formed running south from the Hall however this had to be concreted when the flow of water cut this swale to a dangerous ditch. There is a slight problem with low-slung cars getting hung up on the banks however the earthworks ensure the Hall area remains high and dry.

The recent drainage works were required because with heavy rainfall the water from under the road, which was diverted by a culvert and swale along our northern boundary, combined with the overflow from the neighbouring dam to the north and flooded the western end of the parking area. During wet weather there was quite a stream behind the Hall. Access for Fire Vehicles behind the Hall was further restricted by the siting of the large RFS tank.

The Hall Management Committee contacted Nick Stokes who not only gave excellent advice but also carried out the earthworks and supply of topsoil for out-of-pocket expenses only. We now have a much enlarged parking area, good access behind the Hall, a useable grass area behind the Hall and better fire protection for the Hall and Fire Station. In case you are wondering. Swale: a small valley.

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Kowen Trail Runners Return To Wamboin

On 16 June, the Wamboin Trail Runners Inc. held the inaugural Kowen Trail Run. The event, attracted over 250 competitors and their families. Being a not for profit event, proceeds from the race (\$5,000 in total) were donated to the Wamboin Rural Fire Service.

On 20 January, in conjunction with the Wamboin Home Produce Market, a second Kowen Trail Run event, the 'New



Year's Resolution Run', will once again see competitors running up Bingley Way and into the Council Reserve.

Three run/walks are planned. A 21.1 km trail half marathon, a 12 km trail and a 1.5 km kids trail run/walk. The half marathon will see competitors running into the eastern reaches of Kowen Forest and summiting the formidable Mt Amungula before returning to the Community Hall. The 12 km will be held on trails within the Council Reserve while the 1.5 km kids trail run/walk will be held in the bush behind the Community Hall.

The event will also include novelty races for junior runners, five years and under.

Local vineyard and restaurant, Contentious Character, will once again be sponsoring the event and race organisers are hoping

to match June participation rates.

One spin-off of the event has been the improvement of trails within the Council Reserve. Regular visitors to the reserve will be well acquainted with the two main trails, the saddle trail linking Bingley Way with Kowen Forest and the southern boundary trail which follows the boundary with Kowen Forest. In addition, Wamboin Trail Runners have been busy maintaining some existing but less well used trails in the forest, raking them and placing fallen timber along the edges to make them easier to follow. Long after the event, the improved trails will remain as a legacy for locals wishing to enjoy this important local greenway.

Nature Notes - November 2017

Although we haven't had much rain this month, the landscape here is still quite green. But the soil is getting dry again and we've already had two summer-like days with temperatures of 30 degrees.

The countryside is bright with golden yellow, cream and white flowers at present, the dominant colours of Australian plants in this area. The tall robust Cauliflower Bushes (*Cassinia longifolia*) are displaying their large white flowerheads as a backdrop along the roadsides to lots of golden Sticky Everlasting Daisies (*Xerochrysum viscosum*). Clustered Everlasting Daisies (*Chrysocephalum semipapposum*) are less common, but also occur in this area. They are about 40 cm tall and crowned with clusters of tiny yellow button flowers. The ground-hugging, suckering little *Chrysocephalum apiculatum* are also showing some small yellow flowers above their grey-green leaves. And the white flowers of the Hoary Sunray (*Leucochrysum albicans*) are covering an increasing area of roadsides every Spring.

Black Wattles (*Acacia mearnsii*) have been flowering heavily this year, bearing clouds of cream flowers. Those at the bottom of the hill on Norton Road and along Sutton Road have been flowering for some time now. But, two very large ones at my place are only just beginning to show a few flowers. It shows what a difference elevation and aspect can make to plants.

Years ago, I planted a few *Eucalyptus leucoxylon* here (they are South Australian trees, but often used locally, sometimes as street trees). They bear masses of red, pink or white flowers at this time of the year and seem to be a favourite food source for the Red Wattlebirds and Noisy Friarbirds. There are often disputes as to whose trees they are, but, so far this year, the Wattlebirds seem to have the flowers to themselves.

There were four Kookaburras calling loudly for some time from the trees in the driveway this morning – looked like two adults and two young ones. Some birds began nest-building quite early this year so there could already be some young birds around. I recently saw a pair of Eastern Spinebills flying back and forth to a large *Melaleuca linariifolia*. I could hear grateful nestlings but the foliage was dense enough to hide the nest. And, this morning, I saw a pair of Spotted Pardalotes pulling strong fibres off a wide strip of bark which had fallen from a dead Stringybark Tree. Both finally flew off with their booty to build their nest at the end of a long tunnel in a creek bank or a steep piece of hillside.

One morning recently, there was a freshly dead Kangaroo in the dam, presumably another victim of an attack by roaming dogs as Kangaroos often take refuge in a dam under those circumstances. But, it seems, one animal's disaster is another's gift. A few days later, two small Long-necked Turtles had found the corpse and were snapping at and catching flies and maggots infesting it. Although the dam is getting low, there are still several large Long-necked Turtles visible at times.

The Swamp Wallabies seem to be visiting here more frequently. There were three up on the hill opposite the house a few days ago – a large male and a female with a joey.

After my sighting of the Wombat with a little joey in her pouch, I hadn't seen her again for nearly two months – although fresh droppings now and then indicated she was still around. Then, one evening, I looked out of the kitchen window while I was washing up not expecting to see anything in particular. And there she was – with the little joey out of the pouch and close beside her as they nibbled the grass together. A lovely sight to end the day.

From the Corner

Regional Strategic Planning — While State and Local Government strategic planning can be a bit of dry subject at times, the recent release of the NSW South East and Tablelands Regional Plan 2036 seemed like an opportune time to take a brief look at the way that State-level strategic planning filters down into the local government arena.

The Plan, which is an update of the original Sydney-Canberra Corridor Regional Strategy 2006-2031, guides the NSW Government's land use planning priorities in our region. It provides an overarching framework for local strategic plans and more detailed land use plans in individual Local Government Areas. It feeds into areas such as economic development, environmental management, infrastructure planning and residential development strategies.

Apart from a degree of consistency that this promotes throughout the region, this sort of strategic planning allows local government to align relevant priorities with State government funding programs. When well-managed, this of course means that there is less pressure on, and councils have more flexibility in how they use their own rates revenues.

Another aspect of this recent Plan is that it formally recognises our proximity to Canberra and acknowledges the influence of the ACT on all aspects of the regional economy.

Only five years ago I sat in a meeting to provide feedback on a draft of the NSW Transport Master Plan for our region. I found it incredible that, until that meeting, this Plan, the 20-year master plan for infrastructure development in our region, completely ignored the impact of any traffic—road, rail or air—that went into or came out of the ACT. Thankfully, we've come a long way since then.

The ACT Government has recognised the mutually beneficial nature of its relationship with the surrounding NSW region for some time. Being able to showcase the diversity of opportunity that our region provides has been a key element of its campaign to attract international carriers to fly directly into Canberra. This also means that the surrounding region becomes and integral part of the ACT economic development and tourism strategies, once again relieving the financial pressure on local government within the region that might otherwise be associated with the development independent local programs.

As part of the local government reforms that included the recent amalgamation of Palerang and Queanbeyan City Councils, regional local government cooperatives known as Joint Organisations (JOs) were also formalised. In a further positive development, the boundary of our local JO, the Canberra Region JO (CBRJO), has been pretty much aligned with the SE & Tablelands planning region. Importantly, recognising the role it plays in regional planning and development, the ACT Government is an associate member of the CBRJO.
