

**AGM** – The AGM was held on the 18<sup>th</sup> of April. All positions were returned with the addition of Diana Boswell to the general committee. We welcome Diana as a long time Wamboin resident and a new face to the committee.

Wheels of Wamboin – Well the day was a spectacular success with 175 cars, bikes, trucks and a Haflinger! The sunny autumn day certainly helped, as over 400 people placed votes in the "Peoples Choice" awards. I thank everyone who bought their pride and joy along as well as all the onlookers who make the owners feel special. It was great to see the crowd enjoying the automotive master pieces on display. QPRC Draft Policy for the Engagement of Volunteers – we are very concerned regarding the current proposed policy on volunteers working on Council property. This policy covers all individuals and organisations undertaking volunteer work on Council property including Community Halls, Pony Clubs, Landcare groups, greenways and the now defunct Clean up Australia Day. The policy basically states that a QPRC project supervisor would need to be appointed and document the activity, the volunteers would have to apply (on the prescribed form) to be involved, the applications would have to be approved by the supervisor, all activities would have to be undertaken under the provisions of various acts of Parliament such as work health and safety, all volunteers have to meet with the supervisor before the activity (an interview), Volunteers will be assigned a supervisor who will be responsible for providing access to necessary training. Volunteers will begin with an identified trial period after which they will be assessed on whether they are suitable for the role. Sounds like red tape and risk elimination gone mad. Maybe an episode from Utopia.

The proposed QPRC draft policy on volunteering seems to be lazy poorly thought out policy and will have a huge effect on local country communities. Our country communities rely on community spirt and volunteers to get things done and maintain facilities saving Council time and money. It should be remembered many facilities such as the WCA Hall and Fire Station were built by volunteers and the community maintains a sense of ownership. Please take the time to read the policy on the QPRC have your say website (submissions close 7 May) and write to Council and all Councillors expressing your concern with the policy and the impact it will have on our local community. This policy will put at risk the Fireworks night, Wheels of Wamboin, any work on the community halls, Landcare groups and Greenways and work on Pony Club facilities. Please make your voice known.

**May Market** – Just remember the May Wamboin market is horse gear trading day. Bring your surplus gear and see if you can sell it on or maybe you can buy some more (you always need more horse gear).



#### From the Corner

Principal Certifying Authority — You may recall that I have been doing a bit of building work of late. Well, actually, I've only just finalised all the necessary paperwork and appointed a Principal Certifying Authority (PCA). The process of appointing a PCA, in particular, has been quite educational.

The avid reader of this column may recall that, several years back, I discussed the building approvals process in some detail. The relevant part of that process in the present context is that, after your Development Application has been approved, before you begin any work you will need to apply for a Construction Certificate (CC) and appoint a PCA. Council can issue your CC and act as your PCA, or you may appoint a private certifier to provide either or both of these services.

If you choose to have your CC issued by council, as did I, you will also receive a quote from them for PCA services. Quite unfairly, I must now confess, I assumed that the council quote would be at the top end of the scale and that a private certifier would be more efficient and therefore less expensive. I will say right now, I couldn't have been more mistaken. Having received a quote of a little under \$1,000 for PCA services from council, I checked out the Yellow Pages and phoned around for a 'fee proposal'. Each of the three organisations I contacted asked me to forward details via email so that they could provide a quote, and here's where the 'fun' began.

One of the organisations replied, providing a quote as requested, the very next day. Excellent service, addressing the needs identified in my approval paperwork, but more than double the quote I had from OPRC.

A couple of days later, I received a response from the second organisation asking me to sign the paperwork appointing them as my PCA. I responded, politely advising that I was not wanting to appoint a PCA at this time, that I was simply seeking a fee proposal. Imagine my surprise when they replied, claiming that the signing of the paperwork they had provided, which included a formal contract for their services, was simply "a technicality required by the council for their archives". Needless to say, my subsequent response was brief, and I still have no idea what they might have wanted to charge for their services.

The third organisation provided a proposal about ten days later, but it was even more than the first quote I had received. This proposal also included inspections that were not required by the Schedule of Conditions attached to my DA.

Lest there be any doubt, there is absolutely no legal requirement to sign anything at all when requesting a fee proposal for PCA services, not for a prospective certifier nor for council. Nor is there any requirement to undertake inspections that are not identified in your approval paperwork—you can do that if it makes you feel more comfortable, if you want someone to check work done by subcontractors for example, but there is no formal requirement.

This account is not so much an advertisement for council's building certification services as it is an illustration of the sad fact that not everyone out there has your best interests at heart. In the end, my choice was pretty simple and I'm now signed up with QPRC as my PCA.





#### Kowen Trail Run - In It For The Long Run

On Sunday, 17 June, over 300 runners will again gather at Wamboin to take part in the second annual Kowen Trail Run.

Starting and finishing at the Wamboin Community Hall, the race will see competitors running up Bingley Way and into Kowen Forest. Three events are offered: a marathon (42.2 km); half marathon (21.1 km); and a 12 km run/walk.

The courses are both challenging and scenic; and runners/walkers will rack up some serious elevation. But with each climb, they will be rewarded with stunning views over Canberra, Queanbeyan, Carwoola and Wamboin.



Organised by the Wamboin Trail Runners, the Kowen Trail Run is a not-for-profit endeavour with proceeds going to the Wamboin Rural Fire Brigade. So far, with two successful events under their belt (the Kowen Trail Run in June 2017 and the New Year's Resolution Run in January 2018) the Wamboin Trail Runners have been able to provide the Fire Brigade with over \$11,000 in donations.

Local vineyard and restaurant, **Contentious Character**, will once again be sponsoring the race, providing prizes for the winners of each event. There will also be a coffee cart and stalls by Landcare, Wildcare and adventure clothing retailer, Mont.

#### 175 Wheels for Wamboin in 2018

Well the weather shined on the Wheels of Wamboin this year producing a beautiful sunny autumn day for the utopia of Wamboin. This enticed a record breaking 175 automotive dreams from garages to attend the annual event on a dusty Wamboin oval (reflecting our very dry autumn). This year we also had our first automotive market stall, hoping this kick offs our swap meet part of future events. The cars started to arrive in their droves and at one stage lined down Bingley Way as they took their place on the oval and as usual we had cars, trucks (one with a vintage Howard cultivator on board and a bushfire truck from the former Dungog Shire) and an increasing number of bikes. True to the theme we had a wide variety of marques and models. From early last century to recent end of the line Commodores, from shiny and bright to a worn and charactered patina, from rare to once we saw them everywhere. They all had their place in somebody's heart and sometimes a sparkle in an eye. The American muscle classics were represented with a beautiful Dodge Charger, Corvettes. Thunderbird and a herd of Mustangs. Post war Americans included Pontiacs, Dodges, Buicks and Plymouths. The British had Rolls Royces, Bentleys, a Doretti, MG's and Morris's of all shapes and sizes, Humber's, Vauxhall's and a cache of Mini's. Jag's were there and a super red Lotus Espirt. A Triumph TR3 undergoing restoration this year had some panels attached inching closer to finishing. We look forward to next years version. Europeans had VW beetles, Alfa's Fiats and a rare Audi Quattro Turbo from the early 80's. An unusual Tatra made the journey. The rear engine V8, 603 is super rare in the west and drew a constant crowd of interested onlookers. A rare Haflinger 4 wheel drive also prompted many conversations. Pre-war favourites was a superb 1923 Packard single six with the imposing solid disc rims and the winner of Peoples Choice this year, a 1928 Dodge DA (second year running) complete with period picnic setting and Clarke Gable director chairs. The now departed Australian car industry was well represented and clearly demonstrated the rising interest in Aussie made cars from Australia's car making heyday. Fords included Fairlane's and Cortina's and the GT's on show included a yellow XY and a black XB along with a rare 2 door Landau. Holdens ranged from FE and FC's to EH's and HD's to a number of super Monaro's (HG 350, 1970 GTS and two fantastic HK 327's) a wide range of Torana's including SLR's to a great original 4 door LJ Torana. In fact the Torana's were probably the most represented model on the day. From current Commodores to FJ's (and there was some great ones including a ute with a period teardrop caravan), Holdens had a great history on display. The Mopar Valiants really made you reflect on the now defunct Aussie car industry. When you see all the great cars that have been produced it is a shame we can no longer support a car industry.

All money raised went to the Wamboin RFS and I would like to thank everyone who bought their pride and joy along so it could be enjoyed by others. I also thank the bumper crowd who came along to vote and appreciate the awesome display. I look forward to seeing you all again next year. #### Nature Notes April 2018

Only a few drops of rain fell in April, just enough to dampen the surface of the ground for a few hours before the windy weather dried it out again. And temperatures were unusually high, still in the above 30 degree zone at the beginning of the month – and 27 degrees was exceptional for Anzac Day.

Nothing much is flowering at present, just the odd yellow flower of Sticky Everlasting Daisies (*Xerochrysum viscosum*) and some of the eucalypts. Two *Eucalyptus stellulata* (Black Sally) that I planted here many years ago are flowering at present. And the *Correa reflexa* plants are still carrying their tubular pink and yellow flowers much to the delight of the Eastern Spinebills.

A few years ago, a pair of White Ibis used to visit this part of Wamboin, and twice nested in a tall eucalypt further up the road and reared their young ones there. Then they disappeared – but last week one of them was standing near the edge of my dam. The more usual residents were there too – a Little Pied Cormorant sitting on a fallen branch jutting out over the water, patiently waiting for something to move, a pair of Pacific Black Ducks and several Long-necked Turtles of various sizes.

Speckled Warblers were once here pretty regularly, but I hadn't seen one recently – probably not for two or three years. Then recently I was watching a group of Yellow-rumped Thornbills and White-browed Scrub-wrens searching for food amongst and under the *Cassinia quinquefaria* bushes when I noticed a slightly different bird in a rather shady spot. After a while it flew out into the sunlight and the dark speckles across its cream chest were quite clear – a Speckled Warbler! It was good to see one again. They are vulnerable to feral predators as they nest at ground level under tussocks or low shrubs.

Another increasing problem for insect-eating birds- as most of our woodland birds are — is the increasing decline in insect numbers. This year has really been a six-legged 'silent spring'. A good indicator, amongst more careful observations, is the number of insects on car windscreens and in our animals' water-bowls. My windscreen hasn't needed much cleaning this summer, and, whereas I used to scoop swathes of insects of various species off the surface of the water-bowl near the house, this year it's unusual to find more than two or three if any. We had few Christmas Beetles this summer and no Bogong Moths. A whole list of insects that used to be common here are either scarce now or absent. This seems to be a world-wide phenomenon (Google 'decline of insects in Australia' to read some disturbing data). There could be a range of causes depending on where the decline occurs. But I think that locally climate change is beginning to take effect. Many insects need a small rise or fall in temperature or soil moisture to bring on pupation or emergence of adults, and these triggers are possibly being disrupted by unusual weather patterns. As insects are a vital part of food chains and most ecosystems, maybe we should be treating their study with as much urgency as the Great Barrier Reef.

Two groups of insects that do still seem to be thriving in the hotter and drier conditions are Termites and Meat Ants which should at least keep the Echidnas happy. I met one the other day, waddling nonchalantly up the track that leads down to the road and watched it until it had safely detoured through the dry grass to an ants' nest.

#### **Bird Of The Month**

#### By Luke Downey

This month I chose the White-eared Honeyeater, an autumn-winter migrant who has been visiting our garden almost daily this last month.

#### White-eared Honeyeater (Lichenostomus leucotis)

Size: 20 - 22cm

Status: Fairly common winter migrant

The White-eared Honeyeater is an easy-to-identify bird. It has dull olive-green body and a black head, grey cap and distinctive large white ear-patch. Being honeyeaters, their main food source is nectar, and they are often found around flowering plants (bottlebrush, grevillea, eucalypts, etc.). They also feed on other things including fruit and forage for insects under loose strips of bark on trees. They use our birdbath nearly every morning. White-eared Honeyeaters are mainly winter migrants to Wamboin (arriving is autumn), but occasionally you see one during the summer. I often see them in pairs or by themselves and they can be quite aggressive, chasing other smaller birds away from their flowering shrubs. (Photo from Google images).

# Wamboin Community Association Inc. (WCA) April General Meeting (GM) Summary and 2018 Annual General Meeting (AGM) Summary



Date of Meetings: 17 April 2018 Meetings chaired by: Peter Evans, President, WCA

The WCA held its 2018 AGM immediately following the April GM in the very welcoming atmosphere of the Wamboin Fire Brigade's meeting room. As always, attendees heard from WCA Committee and general members, as well as other local community groups, about the limitless efforts members of this community go to to enhance the livability and enjoyment of our rural-residential area for all residents.

#### General Meeting - Outline of topics discussed

**WCA President** Peter Evans updated on the arrangements for the fourth annual Wheels of Wamboin including the event's new Facebook page. QPRC's draft Volunteer Policy was tabled. Peter read a number of sections to the meeting and highlighted the issues this policy could potentially cause, suggesting that the activities of all 'volunteer' community groups could be severely curtailed. The meeting agreed that the WCA would write to all Councillors and senior QPRC staff to stress the impact this will have on rural and rural-residential communities.

**Vice President** and long term organiser of the Wamboin Christmas Carols event, Jenny Richards' proposal to hold the event one week earlier than usual, Friday 7<sup>th</sup> December 2018, was agreed. This was based on her research which indicated that many local families have end-of-school commitments which conflict with Santa's appearance in Wamboin. Sutton Primary School's Principal has also offered to have the School's choir participate which will be a welcome addition.

**Hall Management Committee:** Lofty Mason commented on the extensive improvements to the driveway of the Hall complex an area now signposted in memory of volunteers of our local Fire Brigade.

**Wamboin Rural Fire Brigade:** Peter Greenwood advised the Brigade had attended 1 motor vehicle accident and 2 minor fires in the past month and he introduced the Brigade's new vehicle, Wamboin 1 Alpha.

**Wamboin Social Drop-in Group:** Convenor Denise Hales said that Group continues to be well supported and that the QPRC mobile Library technical education sessions have been very successful.

#### **Annual General Meeting**

In his **President's Report**, Peter Evans stated that 2017-18 has been another successful year for the WCA. He reviewed the numerous events organised by the WCA including the Monthly Home Produce Markets; the Bonfire & Fireworks night; Christmas Carols; the Wheels of Wamboin; Spring Talks Series; Meet the Candidates; the June screening of the Blues Brothers; etc. He thanked the 2017-18 Committee and general members for their efforts and extended his thanks to other local community organisations which provide invaluable assistance and experience at these community events.

#### Presentation of the annual statement of accounts

Keith France, **Treasurer**, presented the annual statement of accounts showing the WCA's financial position as at 31 March 2018.

Vice President Jenny Richards reported on a good year including the purchase of First Aid kits for the Hall.

**Secretary** David McDonald advised that during the year Lance Schultz resigned from the Committee due to ill health and the meeting resolved that the Association write to Lance thanking him for his contributions as a Committee member, and for his ongoing contributions to the Wamboin community.

#### **Election of the Committee of the Association**

At the invitation of the chairperson, Lofty Mason assumed the chair in the capacity of Returning Officer to conduct the election of Committee members. He commenced by commenting on the ownership country people feel for their local facilities, reminding the meeting that the Wamboin Hall was built by volunteers and continues to be maintained by volunteers. He said that the Wamboin Hall is like our "Town Hall" and wondered if city people feel the same way about their Town Halls. Lofty advised the meeting that, as at the closing date for nominations to the Committee, one nomination had been received for each of the office-bearer positions:

President: Peter Evans, Vice-president: Jenny Richards, Secretary: David McDonald

He called for nominations from the floor for the second position of Vice-President, and for the position of Treasurer. Keith France was nominated as Treasurer, and accepted the nomination. Since there were no nominations from the floor for the second position of Vice-President, Lofty declared the office-bearers elected.

He advised that, at the closing date for nominations to the Committee, three nominations had been received for ordinary committee members, namely John van der Straaten, Samantha Urquhart & Jenny Warren. As there were no additional nominations from the floor for the position of ordinary committee member, he declared these ordinary committee members elected.

He concluded by advising that the Committee of the Association has resolved that John van der Straaten continue as the Association's Public Officer during the 2018-19 year.

#### Other matters which notice had been given:

Secretary David McDonald explained proposed minor changes to the Association's Constitution which were agreed. As required by legislation covering incorporated associations, notice will be given to NSW Fair Trading.

#### **Cranky Over Cruelty To Native Animals**

As a community, if we measured our performance against a quote, believed to be by Mahatma Gandhi, "The greatness of a nation and its moral progress can be judged by the way its animals are treated", we would probably not be doing very well. Both nationally and internationally we are no longer surprised by the animal cruelty incidents that routinely hit the headlines.

In our own back yard we have a tiny minority of people who can't help themselves, but be nasty towards our native wildlife. From one year to the next, Wildcare volunteers come across acts of cruelty - not many, but enough to make us all sit up and take note. The most recent incident involved a young adult kangaroo, which was hopping around with literally half its tail cut off. The cut seemed to be man made! Last year there were two incidents of kangaroos found with a crossbow bolt stuck in its rump and another having to cope with an arrow sticking out of its back. There are incidents of kangaroos left to deal with maggot infested bullet wounds. And some property owners think its OK to chase kangaroos on their quad bikes! Or let their dogs run freely. All this does is terrorise, so their joeys bounce out of the pouch or they later die from myopathy (muscle disease brought on by stress). Its not a good look.

Wantonly killing or harming snakes and other wildlife is simply against the Law. Only licenced wildlife groups and individuals can 'harm' (rescue, rehabilitate and euthanise) native wildlife, or where there is a permit in place. And did you know that 85% of snakebites happen when someone is trying to pick up a snake or kill it? Far better to call Wildcare and have a trained volunteer remove an animal that is in the wrong place.

People often ask, "What can we do?" Well we are not helpless in the face of perceived or observed cruelty to native wildlife – or any other animal for that matter. The people perpetrating these crimes are our neighbours – they're in our communities. And we can make a difference, and make these people accountable for their actions. If you don't feel able to talk to your neighbour, about their behaviour, then contact your local Police. The National Parks and Wildlife Service also have authority to act, as does the RSPCA (but contact NPWS first). Reports made to the authorities are in confidence.

Wildcare (6299 1966) can look after the needs of injured or orphaned animals. And just remember, if there is unusual shooting taking place nearby, it could well be an irresponsible idiot, with the next round coming through your kitchen window!



## The Hills of Wamboin and Bywong, no. 2: Guise Hill By David McDonald

The April 2018 issue of *The Whisper*, p. 23, introduced this series of brief items on the hills of Wamboin and Bywong: where they are and the origins of their names. The information is being collated for inclusion in a Wamboin local history database that is being developed for the Wamboin Community Association's website: <a href="http://wamboincommunity.asn.au/thewhisper/index.php?op=localhistory">http://wamboincommunity.asn.au/thewhisper/index.php?op=localhistory</a>.

**Guise Hill, 750 m (approx.):** *GNB*: 'A hill about 7 km ENE of Sutton'. Located 1.4 km NW of the Shingle Hill Way/Federal Highway intersection.

*Name origin*: Brothers William and Richard Guise are believed to be the first European settler in the area: 'The date of the Guise brothers first occupation of land in the district remains ... uncertain ... but it was much earlier than February 1828 when William applied unsuccessfully to lease two thousand acres at Bywong as a cattle station. He was undoubtedly using the land already ...' (Lea-Scarlett 1972, p. 5).

'Notable early European landholders were the brothers William and Richard Guise. (Their father, Richard Guise, had fled from France to England in 1789, enlisted in the New South Wales Corps, arrived in Sydney in 1791, and had three children born in the colony). By 1826, the Guise brothers were running livestock on a property near the Yass River. After their homestead "Bywong", north of Sutton, had been built in 1829, they occupied it permanently in 1833. The holdings of William Guise expanded rapidly in the 1830s, to include properties covering a significant part of the present localities of Bywong and Sutton. After his death in 1850, many of these properties passed from the control of the Guise family' (Bywong Community n.d.).

*Additional information*: Some of the Guise properties are shown on Robert Dixon's 1837 map of the Nineteen Counties. The 1891 second edition of the parish of Wamboin map (contents compiled in 1881, the first edition appears to be lost) shows two adjacent 640 acre land holdings in William Guise's name in southern Wamboin. These blocks are named 'Duntroon' on the 1926, 5<sup>th</sup> edition, of the map. The 1906 3<sup>rd</sup> edition of the parish of Bywong map (apparently the earliest edition extant for Bywong) shows large landholdings in his name in the north-western part of the parish.

The trig station is on the Trigonometrical Reserve number 11,560, notified in the Gazette of 07 June 1890, 10 acres (Cannon 2015, p. 325).

Another ANZAC Day is behind us and with it the usual range of loud voices expressing their opinions. Think what you may, but here's an opinion from a quieter voice. The simple, moving Dawn Service of remembrance, echoed around Australia as the new day dawns, signed off, on cue, by a lone magpie neither needs dressing up as entertainment nor needs to become a vehicle for yet another exercise in social engineering. In the lead up to ANZAC Day there is a lot of talk about heroes. I have a suspicion that we use the word "hero" too lightly in modern discourse. When I arrived home just before ANZAC Day having being in different climes for a few weeks and saw my confused and arid autumn garden, my shoulders slumped. I felt very, very weary, crippled. It always takes time to reacquaint myself with the garden and its surrounds, reconcile the changes, good and bad, and start to hear individual bird song again.

Brushing past a lavender bush helped restore the soul. Rosemary did the same. Then I heard the butcher bird's call, saw Peace roses, my grandmother's pride and joy, on a bush that had limped through summer and an embarrassed flowering quince sporting a few pink blooms. A crab apple sprawls, draped in a lacy shawl of russet leaves and nearby manchurian pears pose naked, caught out by an earlier, unseasonal cold snap. A solitary chinese pistachio, planted many Easters ago in a rough patch of garden and wished lots of luck, however, steals the show; small things can help to overlook the scars.....And there are many scars. My garden, owned by night raiders is very ordinary, with a very ordinary overseer on very ordinary soil in an area of ordinary rainfall..... so why do I expect heroics from it. There have been individual casualties this "long summer," but overall it has survived. Some plants have been luckier than others; garden "heroes" in this particular season. I just have to accept what's there, and get on with it. Composting is next.

I wouldn't live anywhere else..... but it would be quite acceptable to have some decent rain...... lest we forget what it looks like.
