



How the Whisper Gets Printed Each Month



WCA President: WCA President Peter Evans attended the launch of the new Telstra Tower on Denley Drive, and indicated that the Queanbeyan Telstra staff have available a range of devices for boosting mobile phone signal strengths, if required. Peter will be meeting soon with the QPRC Mayor to discuss matters of importance to Wamboin, including the WCA's submission proposing works, etc., required under the Delivery Plan. *Whisper* readers are welcome to contact Peter to suggest topics that he could raise with the Mayor.

Littlish Libraries: the first Littlish Library has been installed (at the Macs Reef Waste Transfer Station) and others will be deployed across the community in due course.

Kowen Trail Run: The Wamboin Hall Management Committee briefed the meeting on the 17 June Kowen Trail Run, a particularly successful event with some 453 registered runners, and many volunteers, including from the Wamboin Fire Brigade, assisting.

Home Produce Market: in recess until September.

Wamboin Whisper: Editor Ned Noel thanked all who had contributed by writing for, advertising in or delivering the June *Whisper*, noting that more than 50 people are involved in the process each month.

Tilting at Windmills ... with Shades of Banjo

I had written the Mayor a letter, "which I had, for want of better knowledge", sent to the QPRC on 8th March 2018. The topic was the demise of the Wamboin Clean-Up Austraia Day; scheduled for 4th March. In short, I wanted to know how Council was able to effectively veto this highly successful community event, and how the clean-up might eventuate in the future

"In my wild erratic fantasy", I pointed out that Norton Road has become a shocase attraction for vandals and tossers, discarding fast-food container debris and inflammable items like cigarette butts ... hundreds of em, non-stop. I did seek confirmation that Council would be taking over the clean-up role, suggesting the provision for "anti-tosser" signage and associated surveillance measures.

"An answer came directed", promptly but briefly about Council Liability and costs. The Mayor concluded, "there was nothing to stop a community association accepting liability, or individuals undertaking a roadside walk/clean-up of their own volition."

I know about all this; my wife regularly undertakes her roadside clean-up, and in the June Wamboin Whisper, Jenny Warren fills us all in on the art of "Plogging in Wamboin".

I wasn't a happy camper, and wrote back to the Mayor on 22 March 2018, inter-alia, noting the QPRC Litter-Patrol Group in action around the outer fringes of Queanbeyan. Why not the same for Wamboin; along with some "RID' (Report Illegal Dumping) signage and surveillance around Wamboin? The time-honoured tradition; Rates, Roads and Rubbish.

No response from the Mayor; but the Service Manager – Utilities, did confirm that the role of roadside maintenance rests with the relveant local government authority.

On the other hand, the extensive QPRC road inventory and afffordability, confirms that our problems will not be addressed in the near future.

On a positive note, Mr. Cunningham agrees that our council could do with resources dedicated specifically to the task of roadside litter, and he will be "prosecuting that line as part of the waste strategy development".

On Saturday 9 June 2018 the Wamboin, Bungendore and Sutton rural fire brigades, along with a crew from the NSW Ambulance Service carried out a training exercise at the Capital Country Holiday Park. The scenario involved a burning cabin, a missing child and someone was reported running from the scene. The rural fire brigades were initially assigned to putting out the fire as well as protecting nearby cabins. Members of one of the crews from Bungendore equipped with compressed air breathing equipment entered the burning cabin to search for the missing child (represented by a small mannequin). About the same time, a young man with severe burns and suspected fractures appeared on the scene. Members of a fire brigade crew quickly attended to the young man and requested an ambulance. On the opposite side of the exercise area a young distressed mother searching for her lost child approached some of the firefighters. The ambulance crew arrived on scene and began treating the young man. The small child was found hiding in a cupboard in the cabin and taken to the ambulance crew for treatment.





It was a testing and valuable training exercise for all participants. The fire brigade crews performed well and the event was made even more realistic through the involvement of the NSW Ambulance crew.

The Wamboin brigade would like to thank the crews from the Bungendore and Sutton brigades, the crew from the NSW Ambulance Service, and the staff and management at the Capital Country Holiday Park for their assistance and cooperation. In addition, the Wamboin Brigade greatly appreciates the work done by volunteer actors and make-up crew. Their creative work really added to the realism of the event.

330 entrants came from the ACT, a further 117 came from NSW (from as far afield as Newcastle, Bega and Jindabyne) and two Victorians came up to run in the event. We also attracted our first international competitor. Ching Te Huang, from Taiwan.

Locals made up a significant proportion of the field with 28 competitors from the Wamboin/Bywong/Sutton region and



Bird Of The Month

For July, I chose the Grey Shrikethrush, a plain bird with a very interesting call.

Grey Shrikethrush (Colluricincla harmonica)

Size: 22-26cm Status: Common breeding resident

At first sight, the Grey Shrikethrush looks quite drab and uninteresting. So you might be thinking, why am I bothering to tell you about some boring bird? The Grey Shrikethrush is one of Australia's best known songbirds, with a beautiful call (See below for the local dialect). Both sexes are a dull grey varying from pale (almost white) underneath to very dark (almost black) on the wings and tail. The male has a white patch between the beak and the eyes (aka the lores). Their diet consists of insects and they forage both on the ground and in trees for them.

This bird's call is a melodious ringing "pip-pip-ho-ee" but the local Wamboin dialect is "J-J-J-Jill Gregory". You can listen to it here:

The Hills of Wamboin and Bywong, no. 4: Poppet Hill By David McDonald

The March 2018 issue of *The Whisper*, p. 23, introduced this series of brief items on the hills of Wamboin and Bywong: where they are and the origins of their names. Poppet Hill and Poppet Trig, altitude 918 m

NSW Geographical Names Board: 'A hill on border line of A.C.T. and New South Wales about 8 km W by S of Turalla Hill and 7 km N by W of Burbong.' Trig: 'A minor trig. station on boundary line of Capital Territory and New South Wales, about 8½ miles west by south of Bungendore.' Located in the parish of Amungula, 1.2 km south-east of the end of Poppet Road, Wamboin. A community radio tower is atop the hill; it commenced broadcasting from the site in 2015. Accessible by walking along the NSW/ACT border road which can be reached along good tracks from Cooper Road or Bingley Way, Wamboin, or up a steep ridge (the Queanbeyan Fault) through Kowen Forest (ACT).

Name origin: A poppet (or poppet-head) is perhaps best known as the headframe of a mining shaft: 'The frame at the top of a shaft, supporting the pulleys for the ropes used in hoisting' (OED 2018, 'poppet-head'). The term is used more broadly in Australia, however, to refer to shafts/timbers that form some type of tower, including the wooden tower that supports the round discs of some trig stations.

Additional information: The 1881, 1st edition, of the parish of Wamboin map shows 'Poppet Trig Stn', i.e. Poppet Trig Station. Although the trig station was notified in the Gazette on 7 October 1893, trig station number 18762, the hill's name was not gazetted until 1971. While it is obvious that the hill's name links to that of the trig station, it is unclear why the trig station was named Poppet in the 19th century. It is possible that a mine shaft, with a poppet above it, existed in that locality, but this has yet to be confirmed.







Squirreled Away In Care

Wildcare has always believed squirrel gliders live in our area, but until last year we had no confirmed locations for these elusive creatures. Two sites were confirmed and so began an intensive study of these gliding mammals, should one come into care at any point. And two weeks ago one did! A 300gm female!

To the casual observer squirrel gliders look like overgrown sugar gliders, having the same configuration, markings and colours. However, they are a distinctly different species, less territorially possessive and more sociable than your average sugar glider.

Squirrel gliders have a narrower and more pointed face than do sugar gliders. The black stripe from their foreheads runs down their backs right to the rump while the sugar's stripe ends before it reaches the rump. A good rule of thumb for identification is: any sugar glider over 130 gms is not a sugar, but a squirrel glider.

Like the sugar glider, squirrels have a gliding membrane (patagium) joining wrist to ankle. They live in small tree hollows in woodland and dry sclerophyll forests away from the coast. Like sugars they eat insects, nectar, pollen, manna, honeydew, thrips, eucalypt sap and acacia gum but, on occasion, they have been known to kill and eat small birds and field mice.

Bella, the squirrel glider, came into care as a result of one of the commonest perils for Australian animals - barbed wire. Caught by her tail, as she glided, she hung on that evil barb for at least forty eight hours before she was seen and rescued. In that time the lower half of her tail became necrotic so, to add to her trauma, Bella had to have that section of her tail amputated.

She is making a rapid return to health in the hands of one of Wildcare's experienced carers and has recovered her sense of adventure and fun, even to the point of escaping her hospital cage one night and exploring her surrounds before sleeping squirrelled away in her glider house. Eventually, since her amputation precludes a safe return to the wild, it is hoped she will join a breeding program to help ensure the survival of what is now officially a threatened species.

What can we do to ensure that other squirrel gliders survive and multiply in our region? Removing the top wire of barbed fencing will help, albeit, this can be a 'painful' job (the remaining fence will still enclose stock). Glider-friendly species of natives can be planted and look after the old trees on our land, so that they continue developing nesting holes. Above all, keep cats indoors at night. They won't complain one bit in our cold winters).

Should you come across an injured or orphaned glider, wrap him warmly, enclose him in something secure (with air holes), and ring Wildcare on 6299 1966, 24/7.

From the Corner

Waste Not Want Not — You wouldn't normally expect international trade agreements to have a direct impact on the local government sector, but China's National Sword program, which has restricted the importation of recyclable material since 1 January 2018, has hit many councils squarely in the Rs—the *Rubbish* part of their Rates, Roads and Rubbish portfolio, to be precise.

With China being the largest importer of recyclable products from Australia, this policy is having a significant impact on the options available for the management of recycled material. It's not just a case of finding somewhere else to send this material, because the whole western world is in the same boat, so to speak, and there is no other market that can absorb the waste stream that China previously accepted.

In the simplest of terms, with the withdrawal of China from the market, the cost of processing recyclable materials is set to double or even triple (up from around \$40/tonne to as much as \$120/tonne, perhaps more as the market tightens). With the average Australian household reportedly generating around 1.6 tonnes of recyclable waste each year, this equates to a waste processing cost increase of around \$130 per household. And for most of us, that will show up in the bottom line on a rates notice coming soon to a letterbox near you.

But even this is not the whole story. Major recycling organisations such as Visy, the middle men in the process, are withdrawing entirely because there is currently no viable market for the recyclables they previously accepted, leaving the collectors of waste, which includes many local councils, with a mounting (mounding?) problem. For the 'glass half full' people out there, we have an incredible opportunity for a creative entrepreneur...

The Container Deposit Scheme, although it's hardly a new idea, is certainly a step in the right direction when it comes to litter control, but it's actually a bit of a double-edged sword. Removing those items from the general waste stream actually complicates the recyclables picture because it decreases the value of the remaining [recyclable] waste, making it even more expensive for councils to deal with. And, of course, the CDS just provides another path to the endpoint, not a new endpoint.

So, if it wasn't already, it may now be a little more obvious why TV programs like the ABC's War on Waste are being plugged so heavily of late, and why single use plastic products are currently in the spotlight. After all, in the world of waste, *Recycle* is actually the last of the three Rs—it comes only after we have *Reduced* our consumption of products that end up in the waste stream and *Reused* as much as we can.

This whole issue, however, is still very much a 'work in progress'. In the mean time, apart from reducing the consumption of single use items in general, we can all help the recycling effort by keeping recycled waste streams as free of contamination [by non-recyclable items] as possible—use the different coloured [lid] bins only as directed. Contaminated recyclables can't be processed and just end up in landfill via a somewhat circuitous and more expensive route.



Denim stitched with sequins... surely not the stuff of Wamboin work wear....or had I been absent for too long!

Even a verandah and a wall of windows does little to disguise its architectural heritage. The building is as cold as charity on a frosty morning and the pollen laden norwesterlies whistle through the cracks in late spring, but by the time classes started this morning the heaters had made it comfortable. Time to lie down, switch off the mind and relax the body. Lying on the old wooden floor with only a thin rubber mat between me and the permafrost I focus on the soothing instructions. Another long slow breath. Then my nostrils twitch. It's not the smell of sweat and lanolin mixed with sheep dung in the shearing shed but something quite different. Oblivious to all else I breathe again, deeply, less rhythmically, but my senses are awakened. Stale beer! Concentration is shattered and my mind is racing. I'm at the party last Saturday night....a twenty first, a wedding reception, a reunion? It's a lively gathering, anyway, voices straining above the music, laughter, feet tapping and beer flowing. Someone gesticulates wildly and a full glass of beer sloshes to the floor, close to where my head now lies. The old wooden floor is forgiving and in time honoured fashion quietly absorbs the spill. The party goes on. And now I'm doing a "downward dog" and mercifully my head is at the other end of the mat!

The world may be busy and noisy and full of people on contrived treadmills, but there are still places of calm within. And to think that I was able to be thoroughly modern, to multitask, attending a party while meditating in an old shearing shed in the middle of a paddock so close to home.

I wouldn't live anywhere else.
