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
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Wamboin Community Association Presidents Paragraphs "Big Brother"



Our residents who travel into Canberra along the federal Highway might have noticed some sneaky little camera's on a pole just over the ACT border. Many mornings I see cars rapidly slowing down from the 110kph Federal Highway speed to the 100kph ACT speed limit. Rest easy folks it is part of the National Heavy Vehicle Regulator's National Safety Camera Network. The network is an Australia-wide network of heavy vehicle monitoring cameras installed to collect real-time monitoring and compliance data. The camera data will help the NHVR target unsafe and non-compliant behaviours. Targeting this behaviour will help make safer roads for all users. Given the number of trucks on our roads it sounds like a good idea to me.

Spring Talks - The 2018 Spring Talks Series continued this month with the October talk featuring a presentation from Bungendore local area command from NSW Police. Both Tim and Kim spoke passionately about their role in the community and I for one came away very impressed with their commitment and understanding of the local issues.

Wheels of Wamboin 2019 – reserve the date - 18 May 2019 for the Wheels of Wamboin.








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Diary dates:


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Wildcare's Magic Towel

Many readers will be aware 'the magic towel' has been mentioned before. Carrying a towel in the boot of the car is not only useful to keep your hands clean or for first aid. A towel can be part of your tool kit, to rescue small native animals from the road or backyard and putting them somewhere safe. It can be used to securely hold small animals that need to be taken to a Vet or handed over to Wildcare.

Spring is a lovely time of the year. Everything is taking off – and so is our wildlife. It is an absolute delight to watch a joey kangaroo take its first hops and to listen to the ever demanding baby birds calling out to be fed. It's a busy time for Wildcare with a steady stream of orphaned and injured animals coming into care, such as, abandoned baby birds; turtles with cracked shells from being run over; lizards with puncture marks from dog attack; orphaned wombats and kangaroos from road accidents; and a growing number of calls for Wildcare's snake handlers to relocate snakes that turn up in the wrong place.

But you don't have to belong to Wildcare to help wildlife. And with new people moving into the area it's good time to remind ourselves what we can do to help out. Reptiles come onto our roads to get warm and motorists must keep a wary eye open to avoid them. If you see a turtle or lizard on the road, and if it is safe – stop the car, hazards on and move them off in the direction they are headed. Pick up turtles from the front and back, not the sides, as this is where the scent glands are! If you are squeamish, this is where the magic towel comes into play. Lightly drop it over the lizard, turtle or bird and scoop it up. For snakes, just stop and let them pass by (including in the garden), whilst alerting others.

Injured reptiles can be placed in a box, kept cool, then seek help. Echidnas can be difficult to pick up, but a rolled towel or other material will help to avoid their spines, as you wriggle your fingers underneath the shoulders to lever them off the ground –

don't use a spade, as this may injure the animal. In the garden, try to keep dogs and cats under control and inside at night. If you discover a lizard in the dog run, then move it somewhere else, nearby. Check that bird netting is off the ground to avoid snakes and lizards getting tangled up. And keep the land around your house clear and well tended, so you can see what is around.

If you come across a baby bird on the ground, just keep an eye on it for a day, as it might continue to be fed by its mother. Contact Wildcare (6299 1966) and talk about what to do. A rescued bird can be placed in a box with material at the bottom to hold it secure and then kept in a warm place. Often baby birds end up on the ground, as they learn to fly and haven't quite got the knack. They can also be carefully placed back in a tree — in a container if you cannot reach the nest.

At this time of the year there are less orphaned kangaroos and wombats coming into care, as there are less being hit on the roads. – but as you know, there is still a risk in coming across them on our rural roads during dusk and over night. Driving slower will give you more time to react to the unexpected. If you come across a large injured animal be careful how you approach it. A towel can be used to protect you and to place over the head of an animal to calm it whilst you wait for help.

The October market is always a weekend where we compete with Murrumbateman Field Day, school fetes, handmade craft markets in Canberra and more. But we were lucky and the market was busier than we thought it would be. Everyone was eyeing the sky and listening to the thunder – but at 12md we thought we had time to pack up and load cars etc before the storm hit. NO – we were wrong – and it was so heavy we had to wait it out before even attempting to load up and drive home. But wasn't that rain welcome!

Thank you to everyone for helping with the market and for clearing up and putting tables and chairs away for me – not viable on crutches! By next market I should be more mobile.

After our call for new stalls we do now have several new stalls including Valuelifefarm selling their locally produced, free range pork. You order and pay for whatever size 'pack' you want and then it appears in cryovac packs at designated local drop off points once ready - or you can collect from the farm (Jo Rocks Road).

With the wi fi working in the community hall, stall holders can now start taking electronic payments if they want. That made life much easier for the pork as the cost of a 5, 10 or 15 kg pack was more than the cash you would probably take to the market otherwise. SPRING TALKS SERIES – 2018 -- TALK #3: "THE MIKE KELLY TALK" NOVEMBER 20th, 7:30PM WAMBOIN HALL

The Wamboin Community Association (WCA) invites all residents of Wamboin and surrounding areas to the Spring Talks Series – 2018. The WCA is very happy to welcome The Hon. Dr Mike Kelly AM, MP, Member for the Federal electorate of Eden Monaro as our guest speaker in November for the third and final event in our Spring Talks Series - 2018.

Spring Talk #2 Report: Bungendore Police team members Sergeant Tim Saunders and Senior Constable Kim Wegner were the guest speakers at the October Spring Talk. Tim and Kim demonstrated their professionalism and formidable knowledge of local events and issues, firmly positioning their objective of helping to keep all members of the community and their property safe. Topics ranged from how to prevent thefts from homes and farm sheds - including being circumspect about posting your upcoming holiday plans on Facebook - use and storage of firearms and the impacts of organised crime on the community. The recurring issue of poor driver behavior was a major topic. Tim and Kim acknowledged the problems on our local "feeder" roads, particularly Macs Reef Road, and confirmed that Highway Patrol presence will continue. They gave advice on collection and use of dash cam footage and stressed the value of "driving to the conditions" in reducing the likelihood of an incident.

Covering a variety of topics relevant to life in a rural-residential area and presented by local experts, the WCA's **Spring Talks Series** will entertain and inform. The talks will be preceded by a short meeting of the WCA, and will be followed by refreshments and

an opportunity to speak to the guests, meet more of your neighbours and get to know what's really going on in your community - <u>it's</u> where we all live.

Outlook

We are in the bush fire season. The state of NSW (including our region) is 100% drought affected. Sure, we've had a little rain recently and it's nice to see the resultant green flush. But don't be fooled. It does not mean the fire danger has gone away this summer. The ground below remains dry, as are the paddocks, pasture and bush. Just a few warm and windy days will quickly see a return to parched pasture and bushland. The drought is not expected to ease in the southern part of the continent any time soon. The latest Bureau of Meteorology's (BOM) El Nino-Southern Oscillation (ENSO) Outlook (23 Oct) remains at El Nino ALERT indicating there is approximately a 70% chance of El Nino occurring in 2018 – around triple the normal likelihood. According to the BOM this, along with movement of other indicators, increases the likelihood of a dry and warm end to the year across most of Australia and raises the risk of heatwaves and bush fire weather in the south. This makes it all the more important for all residents to have a sound bush fire survival plan.

Bush fire!! - Are You Really Prepared?

Research on behalf of the NSW Rural Fire Service shows that while the majority of people have some form of plan for what to do during a bush fire, these plans often won't hold up to the test of a fire. Ask yourself – would your plan stand up to the test of a fire? How fireproof is your plan? You can find out in five minutes at www.myfireplan.com.au



There are simple things you can do to protect yourself and your family this bush fire season:

- **Discuss** with your family what you will do if a fire starts near you.
- **Prepare** your home and get it ready for bush fire.
- **Know** the bush fire alert levels.
- **Keep** key information like websites and emergency details handy & download the 'Fires Near Me' Smartphone app. (provides information on bush fire incidents)

Since this accident (am now suitably screwed back together but non weight bearing – non driving for 6 weeks) we have had overwhelming help and support from our kids and from Wamboin and Bungendore - with Wamboin coming up with carefully prepared meals, cakes and goodies; fetching cars from servicing; shopping, transport, collecting and stacking wood, sending flowers, providing equipment and dropping in for cups of coffee and visits, We have had assistance with feeding horses and chooks plus immediate help with managing Wamboin produce market responsibilities. Outside that, both Bungendore IGA, Bungendore Medical Centre and the pharmacy have been outstanding in terms of help and cheerful positive approaches. IGA for example sat Lance down at that big table for coffee, provided me with someone to help with a trolley and to grab stuff off shelves and then put the bags into our car; Medical Centre organised scripts and took to pharmacy for us and the pharmacy carried everything for me in and out of the shop. All done with a smile and lifted our spirits no end.

Of special note is that the Wamboin 'meals on wheels' service has been so good it would almost be worthy of 'learned helplessness' on our part in order for its continuation..... In fact the only hiccup in this Wamboin food support system was when a helper fell through her shed roof and injured herself and was forced in desperation to eat the casserole she'd prepared for

us! Understandable. All this help seemed to happen seamlessly and by word of mouth - which is in stark contrast to what is meant to pass as help from the aged care system. But we won't whine (wine?) too much on that score as Queanbeyan Community Health has also been fantastic and indeed the physio that comes to visit Lance weekly now doubles for me too!

However we could not have managed without our local

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The Parish Of Wamboin: Its Creation And The Parish Map By David McDonald

This article provides information on the creation of the parish of Wamboin, and on its early maps. It is an abridgement of a longer piece at the Local History pages on the Wamboin Community Association's website: http://wamboincommunity.asn.au/localhistory/index.php?op=locality. The references cited below are detailed there. Please contact the author with any corrections, etc.: email david [at] dnmcdonald.id.au, phone 0416 231 890. Subsequent articles in this series will focus on the origins of the name of the locality of Wamboin, and on the Aboriginal origins of the word 'wamboin'.

The creation of the County of Murray, in which the parish of Wamboin is located, was notified in the *Sydney Gazette and New South Wales Advertiser* (hereafter the *Gazette*) on 17 October 1829. The County was at the south-western extremity of authorised settlement, the 'limits of location' (Marshall 2006, p. 2).

The Surveyor General's Regulations of 1864 provided that the size of parishes should be approximately 25 square miles (65 square kilometres), and that 'The boundaries should, wherever practicable, consist of creeks, ranges, or other natural features, but failing the existence of these in suitable positions, arbitrary lines may be adopted as boundaries, and which should, unless a strong reason to the contrary exists, be directed to the cardinal points' (Marshall 2006, p. 3).

The name of a parish did not need to bear any relationship to its locality, although sometimes it did, for example the parish of Bywong is named after Bywong Hill. Furthermore, 'Where euphonious aboriginal names can be ascertained, it is desirable that they should be suggested by the Surveyor for new parishes' (Surveyor General's Regulations of 1864, cited in Marshall 2006, pp. 3-4). 'Euphonious' means 'pleasing to the ear'. 'Wamboin' is a euphonious Aboriginal word however, as will be discussed in subsequent articles in this series, the word has no direct connection to where Wamboin is located. At least six other places in NSW are called Wamboin or similar names with slightly different spellings.

When was the parish of Wamboin created? The first thing to note is that the creation of parishes was not notified in the *Gazette* as they were developed for administrative (land management) purposes, and their boundaries could be changed from time-to-time, without formal notification (Surveyor General's Regulations of 1864, cited in Marshall 2006, p. 3).

It seems that the first notice of land for sale by auction in what is now Wamboin that was published in the *Gazette* occurred on 16 March 1841 (p. 4). It refers to a block in a 'parish unnamed near Bungendore'. However, William Guise, William Moore, Michael Day and John Anlezark had all purchased blocks one square mile (640 acres) in size before then, in or abutting what became the parish. Most of the land of the parish was alienated as small selections (40-60 acres) in the 1870s and 1880s.

The first mention of 'Wamboin' in the *Gazette* was the issue dated 1 February 1866 (No. 33 (Supplement)), p. 333: 'Department of Lands, Sydney, 31st January, 1866. APPROVED CLAIMS FOR PRE-EMPTIVE LEASES'. It was a notification of claims for three selections, situated in the 'Parish of Wamboin', for John Murphy whose address was given as 'Creekborough'. This property was originally taken up by William Moore in what was to become the parish of Bywong. Snowgum Road runs through the middle of it.

From this and related information we can conclude (with some, but not perfect, confidence) that the parish of Wamboin was created not long before February 1866.

The parish boundaries do not accord with those of the current locality of Wamboin. The parish is much larger than the locality. In particular, the parish's south-eastern border is Turallo Creek in Bungendore.

The parish of Wamboin maps. The first edition of the parish of Wamboin map can be accessed online via the Historical Land Records Viewer (HLRV) http://hlrv.nswlrs.com.au/. What is labelled there as the second edition of the map is actually the first edition, dated 1881. The map contains the annotations: TRIGONOMETRICAL COMPILATION, Reserves charted and examined 13 Sep. 81, Compiled by C.G. Ireland 20th Oct. 81.

The following year the *Gazette* of 7 February 1882 (No. 52), p. 684, included a notice:

PARISH MAPS FOR SALE. ON SALE at the Surveyor General's Office, Sydney, and at the respective Land Offices hereunder mentioned, the following Lithographs of PARISH MAPS: Price One Shilling each:—

...Parishes of Amungula, Wamboin, and Majura, county of Murray-Land Office, Queanbeyan.

The parish of Wamboin map referenced in this notice is almost certainly the first edition, 1881.

I have had the second edition of the map, published in 1891, scanned. It available online (as a large, high resolution file, 118 MB) at the WCA's website

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

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From the Corner

Planning Legislation (Coda)—There are just a few loose ends to tie up in relation to our discussion of the last couple of months on the subject of land use planning.

The Environmental Planning and Assessment Act (EPAA) has always supported a hierarchical approval structure that was intended to provide appropriate levels of transparency in the assessment process, balancing the interests of all parties involved without burdening the vast majority of applications with unnecessary bureaucratic red tape.

The Planning Assessment Commission (PAC) is the final piece of the puzzle. It was established under the same state planning reforms (Part 2A of the 2008 EPAA Amendment Act) that saw the introduction of Joint Regional Planning Panels (JRPPs). The PAC is effectively the highest authority in relation to the determination of planning matters. It operates independently of the NSW Department of Planning and Environment primarily to determine State significant development applications where there is 'significant opposition' from the community—where there have been 25 or more public objections, the local council has objected, or the applicant has made a reportable political donation. The Department of Planning and Environment itself is the delegated consent authority for State significant development where this level of opposition has not been encoutered.

While high value and controversial developments are always in the public eye, and are thus the focus of most efforts to demonstrate transparency in the determination process, there has been an ongoing effort to simplify the process for the most simple or common forms of development (cf. the Exempt and Complying Development Codes State Environmental Planning Policy). The most recent (2012–2013) attempt to reform the NSW planning system, however, failed in fairly spectacular fashion, ultimately resulting in a ministerial reshuffle, the departure of the then Director General of Planning and a restructuring of the Department of Planning. The reforms were an attempt to 'streamline' the planning process but were perceived to have been the result of lobbying from property development interests. The resulting public outcry, particularly in metropolitan areas where there was significant concern in relation to the proliferation of residential flat buildings, led to the abandonment of this effort to replace the EPAA.

In spite of the failure of the overall proposal, certain elements of the reform package have indeed since been implemented. The introduction of Independent Hearing and Assessment Panels (IHAPs) in metropolitan Local Government Areas (LGAs), removing all development assessment powers from Councils (elected representatives), was one element of the reform package that specifically targeted corruption in the assessment process. This is seen as one of the most significant shifts in the allocation of responsibility for development decision-making since the introduction of the EPAA. Whether or not this approach will lead to more efficient or even transparent processing, or when this model might be extended to embrace regional councils is yet to be determined.

And if all this wasn't confusing enough, the planning agencies I've mentioned have recently been renamed, so that the PAC is now the Independent Planning Commission (IPC), JRPPs are now just Regional Planning Panels (RPPs) and IHAPs are now known as Local Planning Panels (LPPs). The hierarchy nonetheless remains the same, with the IPC responsible for the determination of state significant development, RPPs for regionally significant or high value local development and LPPs in metropolitan areas for local development that cannot, for one reason or another (generally local controversy), be determined by council planning staff under delegation. In regional areas, for the time being, Councils remain the local consent authority.



Apart from all the native birds, we've had a succession of feathered friends...ducks, chooks, guinea fowls, geese and even a peacock. Guinea fowls are supposed to be good eating, but we never ate them of course and they were the least endearing of all. We enjoyed our ducks, chooks and geese. They were pets. Unfortunately the foxes enjoyed them even more, but we have always replaced our chooks.

Chooks are delightful creatures, friendly, curious, grateful, industrious, an interesting study of a society. Once we had a complete misfit in a tightly knit community. She was always on the outer and so slept alone, high in a wattle whilst the others snuggled together, tut tutting on their perch. Her exclusion, however, saved her and she was the sole survivor of a fox raid. But completely alone, she became miserable. We introduced some new girls and wondered how she'd settle. She didn't just settle, she became head girl, the ruler of the roost, and thrived. Cedric, the rooster, was another character. Bird Of The Month

For November, I chose the Southern Boobook, a little owl whose call has been heard most nights for the past few weeks at our house. We think (and hope) that they are breeding nearby.

Southern Boobook (Ninox boobook)

Size: 25-36cm (Wingspan: 60-80cm) Status: Uncommon breeding resident The Southern Boobook is the smallest owl in Australia. It is also know by several other names including mopoke, boobook and morepork. The latter is actually incorrect, as the morepork is a different species of owl found in Tasmania and New Zealand (Morepork, Ninox novaeseelandiae). These names all relate to its call, which is a distinctive boo-book, mo-poke or more-pork. Being an owl, these birds are nocturnal, and their call can be heard at night. To see one of these birds, you can either be very lucky and stumble across one roosting in the daytime, or go out at night with a torch. They roost low down in dense trees, so check any pines or native cherry trees. Being small, their diet consists mainly of insects, especially spiders, wolf spiders and beetles. They also eat mice, but not possums or gliders. These birds nest in large tree hollows during the breeding season, which runs from September-February and the incubation period is 42 days.
