



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


## Bywong Community Association News – April 2021



## The Wamboin Firefighter



As of midnight 31st March the Bush Fire Danger period will end in the Lake George District and our brigade area.

We made it, for the first time ever our brigade hasn't had to attend a bush or grass fire in our brigade area during the Bushfire Danger Period (1st of October to 31st of March).

The weather had a fair bit to do with it. However it is also because our community have been responsible in their activities that can cause a fire. Thank you.

The end of the Bushfire Danger Period means you will not need a permit for burning off vegetation. But, you will still have to notify our local Fire Control Centre (02) 6128-0600 during business hours) or do an online notification (<a href="www.rfs.gov.au">www.rfs.gov.au</a>)

Also it is a requirement to notify your neighbours at least 24hrs prior to lighting up. It's a good idea to check the RFS website and look up "Standards for Pile Burns" and Before you light that Fire".

These guides help you to prepare and advise you how to safely burn off vegetation, what is and is not allowed to be burnt as there are restrictions.

If you see smoke or a fire do not ring the Wamboin Station, Ring "000" for all emergencies better still get the EMERGENCY PLUS app from your App Store.

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

Despite the rain we had a great turn out for the market. More than 150.

I have a good quality umbrella that was left behind by a someone at the market this month. Call or message me to claim.

This month we had plenty of garden produce including figs, quinces, raspberries, tomatoes, salad leaves, zucchini, rhubarb and more. A young entrepreneur, Cherry - helped by her Mum - sold delicious biscuits, brownies and more and raised over \$100 for the Indigenous Literacy Foundation. Cherry also learned to calculate correct change and add up the numbers of offerings she sold and total up the gains at the end. Each month the family will donate proceeds to a different charity of their choice.

We used the 'back room' for the clothing stall this month and the extra space and the fact that it was out of the rain, meant sales were good. Proceeds totaled over \$160 and have been donated to ACT Animal Foster and Rescue Inc – for their work caring for, training and rehoming rescued dogs.

Most of our regular stallholders were there and there was 'baking-a-plenty' to choose from and plenty of craft, jewellery and art work for sale. Landcare brought a huge number of native tube stock plants to sell. Both sellers and their many customers – thanks to the fire brigade – had a pleasant and dry experience, safely sheltered inside the fire shed. Bacon and egg rolls sold out and coffee was plentiful, warming people up on a grey, windy and drizzly morning. For those of us born and brought up in the UK – felt like home!!



## Bird Of The Month

For April I chose the Australian White Ibis, a fairly common waterbird which has in recent times become a scavenging bird in many cities.

## Australian White Ibis (Threskiornis molucca)

Size: 65-76cm (wingspan 1.25m)

Status: Uncommon breeding resident

The Australian White Ibis is a familiar Australian bird. Traditionally a bird of wetlands and waterside areas, they have benefitted rapidly from humans and are now a common sight in many cities. They have joined seagulls and ravens (crows) as birds that are often referred to as trash birds (seen at tips or scavenging rubbish) and this has led to these birds being nicknamed "Bin Chicken". These birds are mainly white with black legs, tail, bare neck, head and bill. They often have a red stripe underneath the wings which is a patch of exposed skin (often seen when flying). Their plumage becomes yellow-brown with age as it gets stained from mud. Australian White Ibises can be found singly or in flocks, often with

Straw-necked Ibises (which are much darker on the back). When in flocks they often fly in a V-formation. These birds are occasionally seen on dams throughout Wamboin, where they feed on yabbies, small fish, frogs or other food items in the water. They can also be found probing the ground in grassy areas for worms and other bugs in the soil. They rarely breed locally, usually breeding in large colonies in the Murray-Murrumbidgee. Interestingly, ibises rarely call as they have no voice box. They will occasionally make harsh guttural noises produced from the throat, but cannot actually make any calls. 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## It Really is A Dog's Life

Hello again. It's been wet and I've become a bit of a water baby this year – I'm sooooo pleased I have learnt to swim. I mostly swim in dams but I know where to find some big puddles for swimming in Kowen Forest and on the trails. A lot of puddles nearly disappeared but they are back now. Puddles are also very good to lie in to cool down when I've been running a lot. I like to run... very much... especially when chasing balls... One of my favourite things is to combine swimming in dams with ball games. It's even more fun when I've got extra humans to help. There's not much room for me to take running leaps at my dam. I do try. My friend William comes over with his Nanna. He's three. He's a very good thrower, especially from the jetty. The jetty is interesting – I am tempted to be brave and jump from the end of it... but I've not been that brave yet. I have sort of jumped off the edge – I can almost land on the side of the dam from there. I seemed to just know that I need to be less boisterous than usual when I'm playing with William. That's nice because it means he's not overwhelmed and is happy to play with me. Sometimes I forget to drop the ball – luckily William is very good at reminding me to sit and to drop the ball. One day the humans got distracted and forgot to throw lots of balls for me – they were too busy trying to catch tadpoles. Tadpoles are even faster than me! They dive away just as you think you've got one. I'm told they will become frogs. Frogs are very noisy at my place. I am trying to understand how they can jump so very high – sometimes they come up to my house and jump under my nose – that can be disconcerting! Frogs can also walk up my windows and doors. Very clever. I can't do that.

I've not been convinced that swimming pool swimming is fun. Gretta says it is, especially when the people are in the pool. I've fallen into Gretta's pool a couple of times – I can scramble out *very* quickly, even at the deep end. I prefer to pluck balls from the surface of the water. And I keep the balls in the dish when I'm cooling down – otherwise the humans take the balls and make me rest. (I don't really like to rest but sometimes I need to.) They can be cheeky and put all the balls in a bucket with a lid. Then hide the bucket. But chasing balls is an important part of my job so I have learnt to find the bucket and open it and then there are all the balls for me to play with. Daisy's owners are setting up jumps and slalom courses for dog play. I'm told Daisy is very good at jumps and slalom when I'm not there. (I can do jumps but, as you might guess, I prefer ball games.) When I am there, Daisy is too busy watching me, and trying to decide if she'll come running after a ball. My favourite ball is squeaky. I've worn out a couple of squeaky balls but each time I've been lucky enough to get a new one.

The squeaky ball is nearly as much fun as my latex pig. Pig is a good indoor toy – you can play hide and seek and pass the parcel with pig. Muggles my cat brother isn't quite so sure... He doesn't really like the noise but he does like me so he puts up with it. We snuggle up together sometimes. And we like going on walks around the house yard with our owner. Muggles comes down to my mini field sometimes, to watch me play ball.

Daisy and I went to the sheep dog trials one day. We think we'd like to round up sheep... but we don't have any sheep. So we watched a bit and wandered around the showground a bit. There were lots of dogs to meet. Unfortunately I have decided that I need to bark to say hello. more with Oscar. They'd prefer I did that rather than round up the sheep and alpacas.

I think my biggest adventure since I last wrote has been staying at a kennel. My owner had to go away for a couple of days so I went to the kennel Gretta recommended. I liked the car ride but then wasn't sure about going into the area where the yards were. There were lots of dogs barking to say hello and I was a bit nervous. But I ended up being very brave and ran passed them into my yard. Luckily I soon discovered that being at the kennel meant I had lots more playmates and I ended up having a lovely time. I might go back again some time.

Did you know there is another clutch of cygnets in Queanbeyan? That's three lots since spring. There are three cygnets. My Queanbeyan friend has sent photos. Luckily they were still there after all the rain. The weir has been very high and the water is running very fast. The swan family has been taking shelter in the reeds – a clever thing to do. I might go and see them this week...

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## Nature Notes - March 2021

With over 100mm of rain this month and the temperatures forecast to reach the high twenties again at the end of the month, most of the plants in this area are still producing luxuriant new growth and the buds on some of the Spring-flowering plants are already well-developed.

At one stage, after several days of steady rainfall and a few storms, I could hear my creek running even with all the doors shut. Eucalyptus leaves contain several chemicals that are picked up by the rainfall and cause foaming in the resulting run-off. My creek was full of heaps of white froth as the water hurtled down the hillside. - lovely sights and sounds.

Not much is flowering at the moment except for a few golden Xerochrysum viscosum (Sticky Everlasting) – although the Hickory Wattles (Acacia implexa) along Sutton Road and the lower end of Norton Road were still bearing cream flowers at the beginning of the month. And the heath plants are beginning to provide a bit of colour. The Urn Heath (Melichrus urceolatus) is still

attracting a few Honeyeaters with its cream tubular flowers and Daphne Heath (Brachyloma daphnoides) are covered in large pale pink buds. And the bright pink clusters of tiny buds on the ground-covering patches of prickly Peach Heath (Lissanthe strigosa) are beginning to make an appearance.

An interesting find a few days ago was a tiny Horned Midge Orchid (Corunastylis cornuta). I'd found a small group of these a few years ago but hadn't seen them since. They grow amongst shrubs and tussocks in dryer areas and are usually considerably less than 10cm tall so are not as easy to find as some of our other local orchids.


I hadn't seen the usually resident pair of Mudlarks for awhile, but they turned up at the beginning of the month with a noisy young one in tow. I don't see Willy Wagtails here much but two did come a week or so ago and stayed for a few days. And another infrequent visitor, a Satin Flycatcher, a male bird, made a quick appearance.

The Yellow-tailed Black Cockatoos had been absent here for some time when about thirty of them appeared here last month. Since then, there have been fairly regular visits, and twice recently I've seen a high fly-past of just over a hundred of these majestic birds.

There was an interesting, but not altogether welcome mammal visitor here a few days, or more correctly nights, ago. A micro-bat flew in when I opened a door after dark and fluttered around. I turned on the lights in every room except one, and, sure enough, after a few wanderings, the little bat made its way to its preferred darkness. I'd opened a window in the dark room and closed the door behind the bat and it made its way to freedom. It's best not to handle bats if there is another way of returning them outside as they can carry disease and can also bite.

Daylight Saving ends next week – which might make conditions seem a bit more Autumn-like than they do now.







## From the Corner

Council Elections—I jumped the gun a bit last time I broached this subject, but who could have foreseen what was about to happen back then? Regardless, here we are, with the revised NSW Council election date [4 September 2021] now squarely on the horizon. I'll have a bit more to say about the election process in the coming months, but I thought that, first up, I might deal with some of the not-so-obvious 'rules of engagement' that might help to inform any decision to nominate as a candidate.

I'll take for granted that any prospective candidate has at least attended a Council meeting or two and has some idea about what might be involved in the 'job'. Mind you, I know of a first-time candidate in a neighbouring Local Government Area (LGA) who was elected Mayor at the first meeting of the new Council without ever having previously attended a Council meeting, so 'experience' is not actually a prerequisite.

Either way, let's take a look at the election process, the ballot paper in particular. To some extent, the order in which candidates are listed on the ballot paper is, quite literally, a lottery. But there is a little more to it than that.

The voting system used for NSW local government elections allows a candidate to stand either as an individual candidate or as a member of a Group of candidates. The voting system also makes a significant distinction between candidates listed as individuals on a ballot paper and those listed within such a Group.

I will note from the outset that it is a distinct advantage to be listed high up in a Group, and almost impossible to be elected as an individual candidate, in the QPRC LGA at least. While much of this has to do with voter behaviour, the structure of the ballot paper has a direct influence on the result.

The ballot paper ultimately lists all of the Groups that have nominated, across the paper, from left to right, in an order determined by lottery. Candidates who have chosen to stand as 'individuals', are listed in the last 'group' on the ballot paper, but within that 'group' in an order also determined by lottery. Here is the next distinction between grouped and ungrouped candidates—the order in which ungrouped candidates are listed on the ballot paper is determined by lottery, but the order in which Grouped individual candidates are listed within their Group is chosen by the Group, automatically bestowing a preference on the leader of the Group for every vote cast in favour of that Group.

It is also evident that being listed first on any ballot paper in a system where voting is compulsory, as it is in Australia, conveys an advantage. Historically, first place on the ballot paper in a Council election can be worth as much as a whole quota of votes (i.e. the donkey vote can be as high as 10%, arbitrarily guaranteeing the election of the first candidate listed, or an extra candidate from the Group lucky enough to be listed first).

The final piece of the Group voting 'puzzle' arises as a result of the fact that Groups of candidates can choose—and they invariably do so choose—to be allocated a 'Group Voting Square'. Group identifiers and Group voting squares appear above a solid horizontal line on the ballot paper, while the names of individual candidates and their individual voting squares, are listed below this line, under their respective Group identifiers. To cast a valid vote, voters can either number Group voting squares—at least one—above-the-line, or the voting squares for individual candidates—at least half the number of councillors to be elected (in the case of QPRC, that's six)—below-the-line. Note that, as there is no (above-the-line) Group voting square for ungrouped candidates, an above-the-line vote automatically excludes all ungrouped candidates from any subsequent voting preference distribution. Given that, historically, 80-90% of voters cast their vote above-the-line, this makes it very difficult for an individually listed candidate to be successful in the presence of Groups and above-the-line voting.

The point of this discussion is simply that, if you were considering nominating as a candidate in the upcoming Council election, quite apart from any other matters that might be relevant, like experience (or not...), you really need to be nominating as a member of a Group. If you're really serious about being elected, as distinct from just supporting the efforts of the lead candidate in your Group, you need to be that lead candidate. If the Group is sponsored by one of the major political parties, if the lead candidate within a Group has an established public profile, or if the Group is lucky enough to score first slot on the ballot paper, being the second or third candidate in that Group might be enough to get elected, but historically, only rarely are more than two candidates elected from within any one Group.

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## Wildlife in Winter

The approach of winter brings about a change in behaviour for some of our native wildlife, especially reptiles. In our region, these include lizards, snakes and eastern long-necked turtles. Reptiles are ectothermic, which is sometimes described as being cold blooded. This means they rely on external sources, such as sunlight, to regulate their body temperature. The cold weather in our region forces reptiles to go into a hibernation-like period known as brumation, where they become inactive and may not eat, drink or move for several weeks or even months at a time.

During this time, people continue with their normal activities, such as gardening, working on rural properties or undertaking home renovations, and sometimes brumating reptiles may be disturbed. If you can leave the reptile where it is (under a log, for example) then that is the best approach. However, this is not always possible, and the animal may need to be relocated to another suitable location. Microbats also become much less active over the wintertime and enter periods of torpor (similar to brumation,) to conserve energy.

They will rouse themselves in order to eat and drink and then return to a state of torpor. Bats are frequently found inside folded umbrellas, handing from curtains, and other secure, dark places.



Microbats require a different approach. Any bat that is disturbed during a period of torpor requires the attention of a vaccinated wildlife carer to catch, assess the bat's condition, then provide it with appropriate food and water, before releasing the bat in the locality from which it came. Bats can carry Lyssavirus and unvaccinated people should not handle bats of any kind.

## The roads of Wamboin, part 12: further information on Kestral Place, Proud Place & Hogan Drive

Introduction: This is the 12th contribution in a series of articles on the origins of the names of Wamboin's 31 roads. (The Bywong Community's website has corresponding information on some of the Bywong roads.) In the March 2021 issue of *The Whisper* I wrote that I have yet to ascertain the origin of the names of Kestral Place and Proud Place, two of Wamboin's shortest roads. I am pleased to report, however, that the Queanbeyan-Palerang Regional Council's Records Management team have made a great effort on our community's behalf, and have located files from the time of the Yarrowlumla Shire Council that cover the naming of these roads. Details follow.

As always, readers are invited to contact me, or the Editor, with any additional information, or corrections.

**Proud Place:** As pointed out in the March 2021 issue of *The Whisper*, Proud Place was built as part of the first subdivision (Canberra Country Estate) that eventually became Wamboin. The first advertisement for land sales in the Canberra Country Estate that I have located was published in *The Canberra Times* on 2 December 1972, page 31.

QPRC Records Team personnel have located, within the old Yarrowlumla Shire Council files, a subdivision plan for Canberra Country Estate which reads (in part) 'Managing Agents Proud Projects Pty Ltd 375 Pitt St., Sydney, Tel.: 61-6679'. While the plan is undated, we can probably safely assume that Proud Place was named after Proud Projects Pty Ltd. The final meeting of the liquidators of the company took place on 5 August 1994 (Commonwealth of Australia Gazette 1994).

Kestral Place. As I speculated in the March 2021 Whisper, this road is named after the Nankeen Kestrel Falco cenchroides, a small falcon quite frequently seen in the Wamboin area. The road's name is spelled 'Kestral' not 'Kestrel', a not-uncommon spelling error. Kestral Place runs off Denley Drive, near Hogan Drive. The land was subdivided by Neil and Marie Quinn in the late 1980s. At its 19 May 1987 meeting the Yarrowlumla Shire Council considered an application by Neil Quinn to approve 'Kestral Close' as the name for the road that became Kestral Place. Council staff advised (in the meeting papers) that the name reflects 'A variety of bird to be found in the area'. With respect to that road and Hogan Drive, staff wrote 'Whilst the proposed names are not historical as required under Council policy, they are considered acceptable provided Quinneil Street became Quinneil Drive and Kestral (sic) Close became Kestral (sic) Place, these changes being suggested taking into account the length of road in each case ... It is recommended that Council accept the road names Quinneil Drive and Kistral (sic) Place for the roads created through the subdivision ...'. Council resolved '...that the roads created through the subdivision of Lot 17, D.P. 703846 and Portions 99, 176 and 118, Parish of Wamboin be named Hogan Drive and Kestral (sic) Place'.

Hogan Drive. The above quotation from Yarrowlumla Shire Council, 19 May 1987, sheds additional light on the naming of Hogan Drive. One of the two developers (Neil Quinn) proposed that what became Hogan Drive be named Quinneil Street, i.e. that it be named after himself. Obviously, Council rejected this proposal, despite the Council staff recommending the name Quinneil Drive. The name Hogan Drive is an appropriate one given the Hogan family's earlier connections to the area. The Council meeting papers do not explain why the proposed name Quinneil Street/Drive was rejected. As Harrison (2018) has explained, the road naming principles in force nowadays (and which are currently under review) '... were only formally articulated in 2014'. They now include the provisions that 'The names of people who are still alive shall not be used because community attitudes and opinions can change over time ... Ownership of land that has been developed is not considered as a significant reason for naming purposes ... It is a requirement that a person is to have been deceased for at least 12 months before an application to commemoratively name a road after them is deemed acceptable' (GNB 2019, p. 99).

Conclusion: This concludes the series of articles on the origins of the names of Wamboin's roads.
