

Wamboin Community Association Presidents Paragraphs

"Bumper Wheels"



The Wheels of Wamboin – well what a great day it turned out to be. The weather gods helped out with a stunning autumn day only surpassed by the stunning line up of over 280 vehicles of all shapes, sizes and vintages. This was a lot more than I anticipated with a low key approach to advertising this year (I actually ran out of numbers again). The buzz of the day was electric, with the markets popular, the Landcare tree sale and the Wamboin RFS BBQ in full swing. The cars on display were many and varied as everyone bought along their special automotive marvel for the day. It was also heartening to see the diversity of the crowd (including many kids and families) to admire these great machines. Thank you to all involved including the Wamboin RFS, Meriel and all the stall holders.

Millpost Hill – Well another telecommunications company has letterbox dropped the surrounding land owners of the Millpost Hill Crown reserve (the area of land on top of the hill) to notify of their wish erect a fixed wireless tower. You may remember a few years ago Telstra reconsidered their proposal to erect (due to community concern) a tower on our most visible point in Wamboin and as part of a Federal funded blackspot program, they relocated the tower down the road to a visually less intrusive spot. Yes you can still see the tower from afar but is surrounded by established trees and was a great solution. Since then we also have an Optus tower over on Forest Road. I cannot understand why we need 3 when our taxpayers dollars already part paid for the Telstra one. I for one do not want to look and see a fixed wireless tower on our most prominent hill as a blight on the great natural amenity we live out here to enjoy. Surprisingly as part of the conversation I have now heard of Starlink and understand a number of locals and Canberrans have already signed up. This is a really interesting development for a global satellite network. There is a really good story on the ABC website and just type in Elon Musk Starlink. We also wait in anticipation for the Wamboin Communications Action Group tender outcomes that should be known later in the year. Round up the wagons folks!

Wamboin Markets – The May markets are held this month with an invitation to sellers for a used horse gear and farm/garden equipment to be set up on the oval. Please see further details in this edition of the Whisper.

Recycling Clothing – Just a reminder to bring down your recycled clothing to the may market. The stall offers donated recycled clothing and all profits are distributed to five local charities. This is a great initiative and is a win/win for everyone.




Do you intend to do some burning off? You need to complete an online NSW RFS notification, or phone Lake George Fire Control Centre (02 6128 0600 during business hours)

- 1. You will need to do a letterbox drop, or chat to all of your neighbours at least 24hrs before you intend to light up informing them of your intentions to burn off. An example of what to write for your notification could be, Dear Neighbour, we intend to do some burning of between 00/00/2021 and 00/00/21 at ADDRESS weather permitting. The NSW RFS has been notified. Any enquires contact us on 0000 123 456.
- 2. On the day before and on the day that you intend to burn off, check the weather conditions. Most importantly the wind and the wind speed. Calm conditions are what you need. Moderate or Strong winds will make your fire unpredictable and hard to manage.
- 3. Watch and monitor your fire while it is burning and ensure that you have the tools and water available so that you can control your burn off safely.
- 4. It is your responsibility to make sure that your burn off is completely out.





Responsible Dog Ownership

Let me say up front that my view is that everyone (be they walkers, joggers, horse-riders, etc) should have the right to traverse along public roads and footpaths without being anxious for their safety.

I have been concerned for some time about a few dogs that often wander up and down our street, apparently uncontrolled and generally barking loudly for much of the day, menacing walkers and occasionally chasing the kangaroos. A couple of times I've had to fish drowned joeys out of a neighbouring dam ... I can only assume in their terror they've been driven in by dog(s). Many horse-riders used to frequent the nature-strip paths and road presumably to get to the adjacent greenway, and their absence now indicates that even that activity is likely to have been denied due to the potential for attack by uncontrolled dogs. Anyway, as a result of several bad experiences with a large dog on the loose by myself and others trying to enjoy an otherwise quiet walk along the road, I enquired of QPRC to find out what their policy is on the effective control of dogs.

They pointed me at their online pamphlet 'Responsible Dog Ownership' (see under

https://www.qprc.nsw.gov.au/Services/Animals/Your-responsibilities-as-a-Pet-Owner) from which the following is paraphrased, and I thought it may be of interest to local dog owners and walkers alike. The fines and rules are taken from the *NSW Companion Animals Act 1998* and are standard across NSW.

Keeping your dog under effective control

- All dogs that are outside of an adequately fenced backyard are required to be on a leash and under effective control. A fine of \$330 applies to the dog owner if the dog is off the lead in a public place

- While you may be confident in your dog's ability to listen to your calls and directions, that is NOT considered effective control
- Council will be increasing patrols around local reserves and ovals to ensure all companion animals are on leads and are under effective control. Everyone has the right to walk freely within the local reserves and parks without being concerned for their safety
- Various off-leash dog areas are provided around Queanbeyan-Palerang ... the one on the corner of Turallo Terrace/McMahon Drive in Bungendore seems to be the nearest.

Dangerous dogs in Queanbeyan-Palerang

- Substantial penalties apply under the Companion Animals Act NSW 1998 should a dog be involved in an attack (defined as an offence where a dog attacks a person or animal). The owner of the dog, or any person above 16 who is in charge of the dog at the time of the offence, is guilty of an offence if the dog rushes at, attacks, bites, harasses or chases any person or animal (other than vermin), whether or not any injury is caused to the person or animal
- The 1998 Act states that a person can be permanently disqualified from owning a dog or from being in charge of a dog in a public place if they are convicted of an offence involving a dangerous dog.

Reporting a roaming dog or dog attack

- Residents who spot a roaming dog or are attacked by a dog are urged **to contact Council on 1300 735 025** where a report will be lodged and the matter investigated.

 Cleaning up after your dogs
- If you are taking your dog for a walk in a public place, owners are required to collect any droppings. A fine of \$275 applies to owners that don't clean up after their dog.

Of course the vast majority of dog owners locally are totally responsible, but there are a few who are probably at work all day and may have no idea what their dogs are up to ... jumping fences, roaming around and barking loudly at anything that passes, in their boredom. I was lucky ... after a few instances of being menaced by the large dog roaming the road I was able to have a robust discussion with the owner over his fence and I'm pleased (and thankful) to say that no further trouble has been experienced with that particular dog. However, there are one or two other current habitual 'misbehavers', and I can only hope their owners will take heed of the public safety requirements as enacted by Council. As can be seen, penalties do apply but if the potential for even one minor injury, or worse, to a person or (protected) animal can be prevented as a result of writing this article, then it will have been well worthwhile.

Bird Of The Month

For May I chose the Golden Whistler, a fairly common winter migrant to Wamboin, with a beautiful call and a brightly coloured male. Golden Whistler (Pachycephala pectoralis) Size: 16.5-18.5cm Status: Fairly common altitudinal winter migrant

The Golden Whistler is a medium-sized bird, with a pleasant whistling call. The male is very colourful, and has bright golden underparts and collar, with a black head and black bordered white throat, and olive-brown wings. The female is plain olive-brown all over, with paler underparts. Juveniles resemble females but have varying degrees of rusty rufous in their plumage; older birds usually have just rufous margins to wing feathers, young juveniles may be completely rufous overall. Even though females are less colourful than males, their song is not any less beautiful. Golden Whistlers exhibit a large variety of whistling calls. The most common calls include an ascending "see-eep", a repeated "sweet-a-wit, sweet-a-wit" and a rising "dee-dee-dee-dee-ah-WHIT" with emphasis on the last syllable. Golden Whistlers are unusual in that they are a winter migrant to Wamboin. Most local migratory birds are summer migrants and they migrate to northern Australia in winter to escape the cold. However, Golden Whistlers are altitudinal winter migrants and this means that in winter they spread to the lower lying woodland areas, and in summer they retreat to the wetter forests in areas like Namadgi National Park. They do not migrate long distances. Golden Whistlers are similar to Rufous Whistlers (see Bird of the Month in the February 2021 Whisper) and there is a slight overlap where both species occur locally in spring and autumn. Male Rufous Whistlers are rufous (not golden) underneath, and female Rufous Whistlers are very similar to female Golden Whistlers, but have dark streaks on pale cream underparts (not plain brown). Their somewhat similar calls can be distinguished by the fact that Rufous Whistlers starts on the higher note and descends on the second note, whereas Golden Whistlers starts on the lower note and ascends on the second note.

Joey Season is Here

Around this time of year, as winter approaches, many female eastern grey kangaroos are carrying a growing joey in their pouches. Unfortunately, this is also when road strikes increase in numbers, due to shorter days and busier traffic at dawn and dusk when kangaroos are more active. Many are killed or badly injured every winter, often requiring euthanasia. When you are out driving, and you see or hit a kangaroo on the road, keep in mind that a live joey could be inside the dead or dying mother's pouch.

If you come across a kangaroo that has been killed, and if safe to do so, please check its pouch (if female) for a joey. It might be a tiny pink one without fur (a 'pinkie') or larger and furred. Ideally an experienced wildlife rescuer (e.g. Wildcare) should remove the joey for transfer to care. Contact Wildcare on

6299 1966 to get advice. However, if you are out of range for Mobile, here are some tips:

- be aware the joey will be highly stressed, so keep noise and disturbance to a minimum
- the joey may be injured, especially if the dead mother has sustained injuries to her body; care must always be taken, as it is removed
- a kangaroo's pouch is quite flexible and can be readily 'opened' to gain access
- if the joey is attached to a teat, ideally cut the teat with scissors and leave teat in joey's mouth while transporting
- to remove a joey, try to cup the body and gently pull from the pouch not by the legs or tail but from its torso/body and wrap in a towel (keep one in the car) or jumper (keep warm, dark and quiet)
- if the joey is bigger and out of the pouch, it will probably remain near its mother; call Wildcare for advice and rescue
- a joey can be thrown from its mother's pouch, so if she appears to have a recently occupied pouch, have a look around to see if a joey is nearby
- there is always the option of taking the whole animal to Wildcare, or a Vet, to have a joey safely removed.

Wombats killed on roads can also have a joey in their pouch. Note that (unlike the kangaroo pouch) the wombat's pouch faces backwards between the legs. Removing joey wombats can be difficult and they may need to be cut from a dead mother's pouch. However, try to cup the body of the joey and ease it out – the joey may resist!

Don't be tempted to try to care for a joey yourself. Wildcare volunteers are specially trained and start off

Don't be tempted to try to care for a joey yourself. Wildcare volunteers are specially trained and start of with a buddy mentor to guide them, as there are many specific requirements related to rescue, feeding, toileting, bedding, interaction with other joeys and animals etc. And every joey is different! Azolla

This year, you may have noticed many dams throughout NSW with a film of red covering the surface. The plant is known as Azolla, a native Australian fern that is found in many waterways and also commonly used as a decorative feature in garden ponds. It is not a noxious weed and does not, under the NSW biosecurity laws constitute a biosecurity risk. It is a free floating surface plant. In warm weather it can quickly spread to cover open areas of water and builds up quite substantially in stationary water bodies such as dams, especially in times of heavy rain after drought. See photo in colour at www.wamboincommunity.org.au

In Wamboin, it is likely that in these recent times of plentiful rain, the fronds are washed downstream from gardens where people have ornamental ponds and supported by excess fertilizer washed downstream. Azolla produces spores and spreads by fragments. It does die back in winter especially if there are harsh frosts. Ducks and wildlife also help its spread.

From experience, it's extremely hard to eradicate. Biosecurity NSW classifies this as a native plant and control methods are limited. There are herbicide options, but these are difficult to safely apply to large dams and basically kill everything in the dam, including fish, frogs and turtles. Withholding periods mean removing stock from the adjacent area. Of the herbicide products available, none are recommended for use by Queanbeyan/Palerang Council nor by the several water experts we have consulted. The resistance risk (ie ineffectiveness) with use of the herbicides is high. In other words the herbicides don't work particularly well, especially on large bodies of water.

Queanbeyan/Palarang biosecurity officer I have spoken with, agrees the best approach is to try and regularly reduce the amount of weed on the dam by manual methods, aerate the water and enhance water quality. Best methods are to try and manually remove the weed, using pond skimmers or similar. Following removal, installation of an aeration system is important (we have installed a solar


panel, air pump and two aeration modules to aerate our dam). There are various products that help enhance the quality of the water. These need to be added to the dam regularly and are expensive. We have been testing our water to see if quality is improving and it is great to see that oxygenation and overall quality and turbidity has improved considerably.

Once the weed is removed it can be used as a natural fertilizer but take care to spread it in areas where it will not be carried back to the dam or waterway next time it rains.

Using the above methods, we managed to clear the dam of a mat of weed about 100mm deep. We now have regrowth but it is much less dense. Hopefully with winter frosts and ongoing water quality monitoring and maintenance we will obtain a more balanced water ecology.

If anyone would like any further information about management of this native plant or needs to borrow a skimmer or hire someone with heavy equipment to move away the resulting debris, I am happy to point you in the right direction/ **Meriel Schultz 0422614304 Meriel**

Nature Notes April 2021

We haven't had much rain this month but moisture provided by previous rainfalls, along with continuing warm weather, has resulted in good enough conditions to encourage local shrubs and trees to keep on growing. But, we did have the first white frost this month to remind us that winter is on the horizon.

There are still a few hardy little plants in flower. Xerochrysum viscosum (Sticky Everlasting Daisy) is still brightening the landscape with a few golden flowers, and Goodenia hederacea (Ivy Goodenia) is still bearing quite a few ground-level yellow flowers. And the Hoary Sunray (Leucochrysum albicans) seems to be having another surge of white flowers.

The most noticeable feature of *Vittadinia muelleri* (Narrow-leaved New Holland Daisy) at the moment is the masses of fluffy pale seed-heads that are blanketing several hillsides at my place.- but they do still have a few tiny blue flowers on show.

A few years ago, there must have been the perfect conditions for two species of Solanum to move here. I have quite a few of the tall Mountain Kangaroo Apple (Solanum linearifolium) but even more Solanum cinereum (Narrawa Burr) which is only half a metre or less in height. The latter species has quite long spines (about 0.5 cm) on both the upper and lower surfaces of its dark green leaves. Bothe species eventually bear tomato-like orange or yellowish fruit (they are in the same plant family as tomatoes and potatoes). Both plants have attractive bright purple flowers, with fused petals forming a disc shape, and bright yellow stamens.

A welcome surprise was the appearance of Ottelia ovalifolia, a native Water-lily, on the surface of the dam. There was a small patch of this plant a few years ago before the dam completely dried out during the last long period of dry weather. But, it must have produced seed which spread around the dam before it became completely parched. There are now several patches of leaves floating on the surface of the dam in the shallow water at the edges. Right now, they are producing flower-buds so there should be a good display in spring - if the ducks don't find them! The floating, oval leaves are dark green and about 10 cm long. The three-petalled white flowers are borne at water level and have maroon centres.

The Yellow-tailed Black Cockatoos have continued to appear most mornings, mostly flying over to one of the pine forests. But occasionally a few stay here for a while, pulling a few pieces off the trees.

The local Wombat has finally found an ideal place for a burrow – an expanding excavation alongside a large pipe that was placed in the creek to funnel water under a narrow road to the top of the hill when I acquired this land. Fortunately, the road is no longer in use and has been taken over by vegetation.

Another part of the local wildlife seemingly intent on destroying my infrastructure is a group of Meat Ants, the ones that produce those huge gravel-topped nests. They are attempting to build a nest under the pavers in front of the garage. I don't use insecticides – and, anyway, the Ants are an integral part of the scheme of things – but applying talcum powder to the holes they are making doesn't kill them but does seem to persuade them to move on after a while.

Accommodating wildlife and enjoying its presence is, after all, part of life in Wamboin.
