

"Winter is Coming"



Well the crisp frosts have already started and the chills of winter have arrived. The mornings have been glorious with the autumn sun creeping across the landscapes as the morning warms. Horse troughs have that thin sheet of ice and most of the colour trees have turned to shades of reds and yellows providing brightness in our winter landscape. It won't be too long before the snowy winds start. It's a great time to get out and enjoy our unique greenways. I have seen may sold signs lately (as the housing market goes a bit bonkers) and it is probably time to remind our new folk of one of our greatest assets hidden away in Wamboin. The greenways stretch (around 25km) throughout Wamboin and Bywong and provide a great opportunity for walking, horse riding and mountain biking in a mostly bush setting. The jewel in the crown is Millpost Hill. The highest hill in the district at 918m above sea level and provides views that go forever in every direction. It also has a historic trigonometrical rock cairn erected around 1872 (first cairn off the famous Lake George baseline and with views to the other cairns including the ACT borders). This in itself is a great story that I will detail in our next edition. Do yourself a favour and head up for a sunset on a clear evening, it is just spectacular or a morning for that matter More great information about our greenway network is available on the Bywong Community Association page. This is the time to get out and explore the greenways.

The Wheels of Wamboin – you will find a post as the Wheels of Wamboin wrap in this issue. We raised \$1,280 from the gate which will be donated to the Wamboin RFS. The Wamboin RFS also raised an addition \$300 from the BBQ stall. Thank you again for everyone who made the day special.

The Wamboin Firefighter



Do you intend to do some burning off?

- 1. You can complete an online NSW RFS notification at www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify, (or phone Lake George Fire Control Centre (02 6128 0600 during business hours)
- 2. You will need to do a letterbox drop, or chat to all of your neighbours at least 24hrs before you intend to light up informing them of your intentions to burn off. An example of what to write for your notification could be, Dear Neighbour, we intend to do some burning of between 00/00/2021 and 00/00/21 at ADDRESS weather permitting. The NSW RFS has been notified. Any enquires contact us on 0000 123 456.
- 3. On the day before and on the day that you intend to burn off, check the weather conditions. Most importantly the wind and the wind speed. Calm conditions are what you need. Moderate or Strong winds will make your fire unpredictable and hard to manage.
- 4. Watch and monitor your fire while it is burning and ensure that you have the tools and water available so that you can control your burn off be sure not to leave your burn unattended.
- 5. It is your responsibility to make sure that your burn off is completely out.





Control Of Dogs In Public Places

There has been some discussion on whether dogs must be on a leash on our Greenways. The legislation is clear. In public places, such as Greenways, public parks and roadsides, dogs must be under effective control by means of a leash. Here is the relevant excerpt from the NSW Companion Animals Act 1998.

NSW Companion Animals Act 1998
Responsibilities for control of dogs
Responsibilities while dog in public place

(1) A dog that is in a public place must be under the effective control of some competent person by means of an adequate chain, cord or leash that is attached to the dog and that is being held by (or secured to) the person.



YLess4U Information: Proposed microPop Tower Millpost Hill Wamboin

YLess4U are currently going through a process with Crown Lands, Queanbeyan-Palerang Regional Council in relation to building a microPop Tower at Millpost Hill.

The microPop tower is apart of a bigger project that YLess4U is working on, in conjunction with the NSW Telco Authority as part of Connecting Country Communities Fund. The proposed microPop tower will assist in bringing better Internet Connectivity to the Bungendore Community, whilst also being able to bring better Internet Connectivity to the Wamboin Community.

The proposed microPop tower will look similar to the current microPop tower situated on private property near the proposed Millpost Hill site. As shown below:




The microPop single monopole tower itself will be no taller than 12 metres in height. The site will also have a solar panal array and a roadside box. The solar panel array is to generate power for the running of the equipment within the roadside box, which will also include the batteries.

The pictures below are of the solar panel array and roadside box that will be used:





The below picture shows approximately where the microPop tower is to be placed:



YLess4U has designed the microPop towers so they can blend into the environment and not be an abnoxious eyesore that could be potentially seen for more kilometres in every direction. YLess4U are also wanting to work with the various community groups in relation to beautification (planting of native trees and shrubbery) of the site. YLess4U will not be removing any trees or shrubs from the site either, we would prefer to plant additional flora and fuana to assist with some shrouding of the site. Vehicle access has been arrange through a private land owner and access will be for the main construction period and then roughly every six months for maintence, unless there is an emergency.

If YLess4U is successful with our applications through Crown Lands, Queanbeyan-Palerang Regional Council, we will ensure members of the community will still have acces to Millpost Hill and it's Greenways. The site will be barricaded off and warning signs will be in place whilst the works are being completed.

The half page article on the next page came in from a resident before the YLess4U material. I've said to YLess4U they can have a half page of their material at no cost under an attempt at "right of reply". I did give a brief summary list of the "Keep Millpost Hill Towerless" reasons to YLess4U so they could reasonably address them, but did not show them the article on the next page. The opposing view, from a resident, who I know represents the view of a number of others, is presented next, to give it the last word.— Whisper editor

No Communications Tower on Mill Post Hill

On the 14 April 2021, the local internet supplier Yless4U advised some local residents of a *proposed installation of communications equipment* on Mill Post Hill.

The letter advised that Yless4U are one of two local communications carriers selected by the NSW Government to deliver a wireless broadband internet service to 11 communities that previously relied on satellite internet. In response to this letter, I sought further information from the NSW Telco Authority via connectingcommunities@customerservice.nsw.gov.au and I was informed that the proposed location has been chosen as a potential site to ensure that all of Bungendore is provided with improved internet access.

I congratulate Yless4U on being chosen for delivery of improved internet for Bungendore, and I also positively support any NSW Government commitment to improve regional internet provision.

I do NOT support the construction of a communications tower and associated infrastructure on top of the most recognised Wamboin landmark as the best way to deliver this internet.

If you are a resident of the local community, or just a lover of the amenity provided by the Wamboin/Bywong greenways and in particular Mill Post Hill, please consider writing to the NSW Telco Authority via the email address above to advocate for another location for this tower. You may like to consider the following:

- -The disruption of the visual amenity of Mill Post Hill, from the surrounding area.
- -The disruption to the uninterrupted views from atop.
- -The power that will be required to be installed to supply the tower.
- -The vehicular access that will be required to reach it.
- -The security that will be required to keep it safe from damage.
- -The disruption to extensive planting by Landcare to install the infrastructure.
- -What regulations are in place stop the extension in height of the tower height once it is in situ?
- -The precedent of having one tower...what about another?
- -Doesn't Bungendore have the NBN?

For new residents of the area, this is not the first time this battle has been fought! Telstra reconsidered their own tower on Mill Post Hill after strong resident objection. Telstra now have a huge tower on Denley Drive, on private land and hidden (mostly) by large trees.

I ask Yless4U, what other options have you explored for this tower? Other sites? Have you considered piggybacking on to existing infrastructure like the local Telstra or Optus towers, or even local telegraph poles?

I value my rural-residential location and amenity. I do not support the construction of a communication tower and associated infrastructure on my favourite hill for the benefit of Bungendore. If you agree, please write to NSW Telco Authority and keep an eye out for Yless4U community consultations.

Bird Of The Month

For June I chose the Striated Thornbill, a very common resident small bird that is not very colourful, and often overlooked.

Striated Thornbill (Acanthiza lineata)

Size: 10cm

The Striated Thornbill is a very small bird that some people might refer to as an "LBJ" (Little Brown Job). It is brownish in colour and looks similar to a few other species. However, when you look closely, these species can be told apart fairly easily. Unlike elsewhere in the world our little brown birds can be readily distinguished, whereas warblers are almost indistinguishable. Striated Thornbills are pale cream-

white underneath, becoming yellowish towards the vent (undertail). The breast and face are streaked black. Their upperparts are olive-brown, with the top and back of the head, including the crown, being a reddish-tan colour, faintly streaked white. The tail and edges of the wings are black. Striated Thornbills have a very fine, black bill, and fine black legs, well adapted for foraging in the canopy and foliage of gum trees, and gleaning small insects off the leaves. They occur in woodland and forests, generally avoiding more open and sparsely treed areas, as they like to forage in the treetops. The similar Brown Thornbill is often confused

with the Striated Thornbill, however there are a few main differences to help identify them. Striated Thornbills have a brown eye (Brown Thornbill has a red eye), Striated Thornbills have a plain rump and reddish-tan crown with olive-brown upperparts (Brown Thornbill has a rufous rump and rufous-scalloped forehead, with overall greyish upperparts). Their behaviour is also very different; whilst they often occur together in mixed-species flocks, Striated Thornbills usually feed in the canopy in larger groups, whereas Brown Thornbills usually forage in understorey, in pairs or smaller groups. Striated Thornbills have a chipping, insect-like "tiz, tiz" call, which is a lot higher-pitched and more constant twittering than the Brown Thornbill's harsh chirping and warbling call. Striated Thornbills build their dome nest in leafy branches of trees, it is suspended from a branch with an entry hole on the side. The male and female birds, look the same, and they both attend to parental duties, assisted by the rest of their flock.



"The organised savagery with which kangaroos are being hunted today is equalled in our history only by the appalling massacre of koalas in 1927." - Alan John 'Jock' Marshall, Foundation Professor Zoology, Monash University, in 1966 book The Great Extermination

Jock Marshall's hard-to- find 1966 book documented a war since settlement on our national emblems, the kangaroo and the emu and much other wildlife – including the koala – killed for profit and to remake the nature of Australia.

I wrote *Injustice*, with a chapter on Marshall's evidence, after investigating a hidden story: the legacy of disrespect for native animals and their destruction has not stopped. It is still today capped by a world-beating wildlife trade that few people know of or acknowledge. The government-sanctioned killings rely on dominant public stories: about the needs of commerce/export trade or on arguments from applied ecology. Together they keep Australians looking the other way.

But 'Injustice' also explores winning directions that marry the economic and the ecological – showing ways to heal the country and co-exist with the full nature of Australia on properties large and small. I know that many who might read these words in the *Wamboin Whisper* have found the sharing path rewarding, and that wisdom is acknowledged in the book — Maria Taylor

The six coldest weeks occur after the winter solstice which is on 21 June. Whilst June 21 is the shortest day it does not have the latest sunrise and earliest sunset. The earliest sunset occurs about 1 week before the 21st and the latest sunrise about 1 week afterwards. This phenomenon is due of the tilt of the Earth and that the Earth's path around the Sun is not a circle, but more like an oval.

From the Corner

Earthworks (or Illegal Dumping?)—I thought a recent case in the Land and Environment Court was significant enough in its findings to warrant revisiting this subject. We've discussed the council controls associated with earthworks on several occasions, but I've never quite gone as far as discussing the point at which earthworks might be classified as illegal dumping, a much more serious issue than simply unapproved works.

Suffice to say that the importation of more than 100m³ of fill without any specific purpose is unlikely to be approved by any consent authority and will thus invariably constitute illegal dumping, regardless of the 'quality' of the material involved. The case at point, however, was fairly blatant, both in the extent of the activities involved and the refusal of the offending individual to acknowledge the many attempts made by council to address the situation.

A 100m³ limit, on the importation of fill without council consent, was introduced a few years back following a case in a neighbouring LGA where an earthmoving contractor purchased a rural property and proceeded to use it as a dumping site for material excavated in the course of conducting his business. He managed to avoid compliance action at the time by ensuring that the material was spread out so as to never exceed the 600mm depth limit that would trigger the requirement council approval.

In the present case, the offender proceeded down a similar path, dumping several thousand cubic metres of material on the property over a period of several years, in spite of notices from council to cease the activity.

In finding in council's favour, the court ordered the defendant to:

- Immediately cease using the Land for the disposal of Materials;
- Within 28 days install and maintain erosion and sediment controls to contain the movement of sediment off the Land;
- Within four months, remove all Materials and other waste from the Land;
- Within one year of the date of these orders, restore the Land as near as possible to the condition it was at the importation and placement of the materials thereon.

Failure to comply could lead to fines of up to \$5 million and/or a custodial sentence. This was no inconsequential smack on the hand but, with the rising costs of waste disposal, this sort of illegal dumping has become a serious problem in our rural areas.

The reader might be interested to know that the property in question is currently listed for sale and the traps for the unwary

that might exist in cases like this. While the ultimate responsibility for remediation works rests with the subject individual regardless of any sale, and the relevant details would be articulated in a Section 10.7 Planning Certificate (formerly a Section 149 Certificate), which any prospective purchaser should request from council as a matter of course, this is very much a case of buyer beware. As the new land owner, you might not be directly responsible for the remediation works, but you will certainly be caught up in any necessary compliance activities and could be seriously limited in how you are able to use this piece of real estate. At the end of the day, there's only so much that council can do if people, or their legal representative, do not seek out all relevant information before proceeding with a property purchase.

As a corollary to this scenario, council has become aware of contractors who, when asked to undertake work on a property, suggest that fill will be required to complete the project at hand. This opportunity is then used to dump waste material, perhaps when fill is not even required. Note that it is the land owner's responsibility to verify the source of any fill coming onto their property and to secure council approval if it is required. In general, any imported fill should be what is known as virgin excavated natural material (VENM), or in some circumstances just excavated natural material (ENM). The EPA provides guidance for landholders in this regard (see *Filling your land? Make sure it's legal*—just Google "EPA2017P0295").

As a footnote, the high resolution, historical time series aerial imagery that is available today from providers like Nearmap, even the lower resolution imagery freely available through Google Earth, make it a trivial exercise for anyone, let alone a

government agency, to track changes to both structures on and the general landscape of a property. It's pretty difficult to argue against evidence like this if a matter goes to court, especially if it's backed up by a paper trail documenting attempts to resolve associated matters in a more constructive manner.


