There are other long term contributors like the Wamboin Muse, Jill Gregory with her monthly message telling us "I wouldn't live anywhere else" for over 15 years. We now have the next generation of contributors in Luke Downey with his Bird of the Month contribution. The Whisper goes to around 1341 mailboxes across Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton (on this side of the highway) as well as a few mail outs to former residents. To get into the mailboxes over 55 local residents deliver and distribute the monthly issue. The Whisper provides an important old school voice across the community in this age of Facebook and digital technology. It is truly a great community effort and I deeply thank all the current and past editors, contributors, deliverers and advertisers that have made this happen over the past 40 years. Give yourselves a huge pat on the back for making our community what it is today. In celebration at the WCA AGM on Tuesday August 17th, we will be putting on a birthday cake to celebrate this milestone (with all Covid-19 protocols in place). Please come along to share in the celebration, Covid permitting.

2021 Local Government Elections – The proposed elections scheduled for September have now been sensibly postponed to the 4 December 2021 due the current Covid-19 situation. I also understand that electronic voting will be in place for the first time in NSW local Government elections and an extension to the postal voting period.

2021 Meet the Candidates Night – obviously with the above announcement we will be rescheduling our MTC night accordingly. Details in the next Whisper.

AGM 17th August 2021 – The WCA AGM will be held on Tuesday 17th August at 7.30pm in the Community Hall in Bingley Way. If you would like to play a part in your local community please come along. Meetings are only once a month and you will play a part in shaping our community with our many events (if we can shake of Covid anytime soon) and activities. Our community is only what we make it. Our normal events include the Bonfire/Fireworks night, Wheels of Wamboin, Christmas Carols, monthly markets and much, much more. These things don't just happen they need volunteers.

Macs Reef and Bungendore Road Intersection – you may not have noticed (as there is no changed traffic conditions ahead signs) but the intersection now has stop signs erected in lieu of the previous give way signs. Beware, I have been told the Police will start enforcing the signs shortly (line marking not completed as yet) and it is usual that locals will be caught, mainly because we are used to the old conditions. This is part of a motion put to Council in April 2021 item 12.2 asking for a report for all options to improve the safety of the intersection to be put back to Council by the July 21 Council meeting. The report asked for investigations into all options so we hope that the stop signs are only an interim measure until a more permanent solution can be found and funded such as a separated and offset left turn lane for this dangerous T intersection. The intersection has been the scene for a number of deaths over the years.

E4 vs **R5** – Most residents have received the letter in their mailbox regarding the long running E4 vs R5 rezoning debate. Due to a number of complex issues in this matter the WCA does not endorse either side of the debate and fully encourage residents to make their own investigations. A starting point would be go to www.legislation.nsw.gov.au and type in Palerang Local Environmental Plan 2014 in the search box in top left hand corner it will bring up a page with an index on the left hand side. If you scroll to Land use table, you can click on the zone objectives for both E4 and R5, What we do object to is the letter being issued only 8 days prior to a Council meeting (meeting on Wednesday 28th July) where one of the staff's recommendations is to slug our residents for the cost of the study (estimated at around \$200 each). By the time this Whisper goes to mailboxes the Council meeting will have been done and dusted and I do hope the Council staff's recommendation for the 413 residents to pay is not adopted.

Yless4U Tower proposal – Some good news, after the well attended public meeting the NSW Telecommunications Authority have informed us that they heard the local residents concerns and will be seeking an alternative location. Great outcome and we look forward to a new proposal. In the mean time (when it stops raining long enough) make sure you trek up Millpost Hill to enjoy the view to the Brindabella's snowline. Recently the snow has been very bright with the morning sun.







Bird Of The Month

For August I chose the Barn Owl, a cosmopolitan species, that preys on rodents, and has been seen quite a few times in the local area recently.

Barn Owl (Tyto alba)

Size: 30-40cm (wingspan 70-90cm) Status: Rare breeding visitor

The Barn Owl is the most widely distributed owl, found on all continents except Antarctica. Throughout its range, it is generally uncommon, and tends to occur around human settlements, especially farms, where it preys on rodents. They tend to occur in fairly open areas, and are rarely found in dense forests, where other owls occur. Their habitat preference corresponds with their main prey. Barn Owls are quite a rare visitor to Southeastern Australia, usually only present in very small numbers. However, they are very nomadic and irruptive in response to mouse plagues, like what is happening currently in South-eastern Australia. There have been many birds seen in the Canberra region recently, including one I saw near the Dickson Shops on the 19th

of July. They roost in barns and open buildings, or trees with dense foliage, during the day. Their roosting location can often be revealed by the alarm calls of other birds (e.g. Currawongs, Magpies, Ravens, Noisy Miners) who mob owls if they find them roosting; often chasing them away. Barn Owls are very distinctive, with their large, white, heart-shaped disc face, white underparts, and pale creamy-brown and grey mottled upperparts being unmistakeable. The sexes are the same in appearance. Elsewhere in Australia, the Australasian



Grass-Owl (*Tyto longimembris*) and Australian Masked-Owl (*Tyto novaehollandiae*) are similar in appearance. Barn Owls are renowned hunters, and have long legs equipped with big talons (claws) to grasp and kill rodents. They have an immaculate sense of hearing, which they use to hunt at night, and can detect the movement of mice in grass and strike very accurately. Their disk-shaped face also helps funnel sound to their ears. Keep an eye out over the next little while, as there are likely to be more around while there is a sufficient food source for them.

A large issue for owls in current times is rodenticides. Owls unknowingly ingest poisoned rodents, and then die from the poison. Thankfully, the APVMA rejected allowing the use of the highly toxic poison bromadiolone in the recent mouse plague. However, other mouse poisons still cause harm to predatory animals including owls, so please consider not using poison to kill mice, as it detrimentally effects the predators of the mice. Reporting Injured Wildlife

Imagine this scenario: you are driving home after work, and you see an animal on the grass verge next to the road. You are unsure if it is injured, but you don't often see animals lying so close to the road. You stop the car and go to have a quick look at the animal. It doesn't get up or run away as you approach, but you don't want to get too close, just in case. You can't see any obvious injuries, but something just doesn't seem right. What do you do now? You think about calling Wildcare, but what if there's nothing wrong and someone comes out unnecessarily? You decide to call Wildcare. What happens next?

When you make a phone call to Wildcare, the call is answered by a Helpline volunteer. The phone line is staffed 24/7. The Helpline volunteer will collect information from you, including your name and phone number, the specific location of the animal and any visible landmarks, the type of animal, the approximate size or age of the animal and the nature of any visible injuries. All these questions help the roster volunteer determine the most suitable rescuer to send to assist the animal. Some rescues need specific training, such as snakes, or vaccinated rescuers, in the case of bats. Occasionally, members of the public are asked if they can safely bring the animal to a rescuer or take it to a vet. These decisions are made to ensure an injured or orphaned animal gets the assistance it needs, as quickly as possible. You may also be asked if you can remain nearby the animal until a rescuer arrives. If you are unable to do so, it is helpful if you can mark the animal's location with something, such as a plastic shopping bag tied to a fence post.

When the rescuer arrives at the animal's location, they begin to make an assessment of the animals' injuries or circumstances in order to make a determination on whether the animal should be brought into care, left in place and monitored regularly, or euthanised. If the animal is being brought into care, the rescuer will start planning for this to happen, including how to safely transport the animal. Once in care, the animal will be given a thorough assessment and a care plan will be devised to assist the successful rehabilitation, and ultimately the release of the animal back to the wild. If the decision is made to monitor an animal in place, the rescuer will visit the animal regularly to ensure its condition is not deteriorating. This is often done to minimise the serious effects that stress of capture places on the animal. If the animal is too severely injured or will be unreleasable, and the rescuer determines that it is unlikely to survive, the

decision may be made to humanely euthanise the animal. This is a decision that must be left to an experienced person who has a sound understanding of what is realistically achievable. Members of the public should not attempt to euthanise an animal themselves. Not only is this illegal, but it can also cause unnecessary suffering and cruelty.

If you come across sick, injured, or orphaned wildlife, or an animal that just doesn't seem to be behaving normally and could need assistance, please phone Wildcare on 6299 1966. We would much rather you call us so that we can make an informed assessment to ensure the best outcome for the animal.

Our later copies of course are computerised and we thank Pete Harrison for the time consuming work he has been doing to scan older copies of the Whisper for easy access at www.wamboincommunity.org.au/theWhisper. July 84 featured our first paid ad which was for Oregon Traders. Because of the numbers (less than 200) the early Whispers were financed (unknowingly) by various Government departments. They were collated and distributed by the editor. The numbers of copies today (over 1300) require a more professional and approach, with many residents lending a hand.

The success of The Whisper relies firstly on the input of contributors, who often spend considerable time writing things for us to read. Because of the cost of printing we benefit from all the advertisers who pay for it. Next in line is the editor who prepares the material for printing. After printing there would still be no Whisper each month. Except for over the now 7 "distributors" who deal with boxes of 200 or so. And there still would be no Whisper for each home each month except for the now over 50 people, listed in each issue, who drive, cycle, walk or run down each road to put one in each mailbox.

A list of all involved over the years would include many of you, however the following is a list showing the dates, the number of Whispers we wrote, produced and delivered over the last 40 years, and the editors.

From the Corner

Council Elections (Part 3) — Following on from last month's piece, these were to be my final words on voting in the upcoming [4 September] Council election. Then, feeling quite comfortable that I'd met the editor's deadline, I received the advice that the elections had been postponed, yet again (to 4 December, for anyone who hasn't yet heard). But rather than break the flow of our discussion of the election process, and just as much because I didn't really have anything else immediately at hand to write about, let's carry on regardless.

Let me say up front that I am not seeking re-election in the upcoming elections, whenever they ultimately happen to be held, so none of my comments have anything to do with improving my chances of election. Also, these words now will probably not be my final words on the elections—I may have to run something similar in three months time, just so that the whole process is fresh in everyone's mind.

There are two observations that come out of an analysis of previous elections that are worthy of consideration. These two observations may appear to be contradictory but one is actually a direct consequence of the other.

The first is as follows. In the first two Palerang elections, 2004 and 2008, eight of the nine candidates elected have been those with the most votes after the first preference count, and any distribution of surplus votes. Put another way, the first eight candidates have been effectively elected based on the first two preferences identified on ballot papers. The subsequent distribution of preferences did, however, determine the last candidate elected, although that race for 9^{th} was still only between the candidates that were 9^{th} and 10^{th} after the first preference count.

More to the point, however, in the 2012 Palerang Council election, the 2008 and 2012 Queanbeyan City Council elections and the 2017 QPRC election, the distribution of preferences made no difference at all to the final result. The candidates that were ultimately elected were exactly those that were ahead after only first preference votes were counted.

The upshot of this observation is that when casting your vote, you should take care to identify candidates in the order you would like to see them elected. Don't, for example, just casually mark 11 candidates that you think might make up a well-balanced Council, as some have confessed to have done in the past.

The second observation is the fact that in the 2017 QPRC election, for example, and this is not unusual, 2545 votes exhausted—they ran out of preferences before all candidates were elected. The last four successful candidates in that election were elected without making quota—they were the last candidates standing when all but 11 candidates had been eliminated from the count. None of them

amassed more than 2500 votes. Put another way, "No Choice" actually made quota and would thus have been elected at position 8 if it had been an actual candidate!

What does that mean? Well, it means that 2545 voters did not mark enough preferences on their ballot paper for their vote to count. Their higher preferences will have gone to candidates who were eliminated at some point in the count, and any subsequent preferences, if any existed, did not identify anyone who was still in the count.

So here's the second point. While 79% of the votes in the 2017 QPRC election effectively rested with their first preference, and a further 12.5% was distributed through preferences (although with no impact on the ultimate result), around 8.5% of the vote could have had a significant impact on the final result, had the voters in question nominated preferences deeply enough.

To summarise the above discussion then, to be sure that your vote counts on December 4 (or whenever the Council elections end up being held):

- Place the number "1" against the name of the candidate, or Group if voting above-the-line, that you would most like to see on Council, and allocate your preferences in a similar fashion. For around 79% of the votes, the first two preferences are all that will count:
- 2. Allocate preferences to every candidate, or Group if voting above-the-line, that you would be happy to see on Council, not just the minimum number. For the remaining 21% of the votes, in a field of, say, 40 candidates vying for 11 seats, their twenty ninth preference could help determine the makeup of the new Council.

Nature Notes - July 2021 Jo Walker

There are tiny snowflakes drifting past the window as I write this – and the temperature outside was just 3degrees about midday. With several snowfalls, a few really white frosts and rain and strong winds with a real bite in them, the weather this month has lived up to mid-winter expectations. Rain has fallen ever few days towards the end of the month and dams are full and creeks still running. My creek has pools along the length of it and frogs are already calling from many of them.

Not much is flowering yet, but there is a beautiful tapestry of different colours in the foliage and new growth on eucalypts and wattles and other local plants. The Silver Wattles (*Acacia dealbata*) are still a few weeks away from flowering – except for the single one across the creek that I mentioned last month. It is still adorned with a mass of bright yellow flowers. Red-stemmed Wattles (*Acacia rubida*) growing along Sutton Road are almost in flower, with one or two of them showing a few tiny spots of yellow.

Amongst the smaller plants, *Leucochryum albicans* (Hoary Sunray) have been sporting a few white flowers for most of the winter. And, last week, I found a lone yellow daisy flower in a patch of Leptorhynchos squamatus (Scaly Buttons).


I recently saw a single Wedge-tailed Eagle soaring and gliding around far above for a while. There used to be a pair of Eagles that visited quite frequently, but I haven't seen them here for a while. Over the years, the vegetation here has grown denser so they may have shifted to more open country where they can see prey more easily.

Another bird that I haven't seen for a while is a White-faced Heron that used to spend time searching for aquatic insects at the edge of the dam. The dam did completely dry out during the last long dry period – now it's full and overflowing again I hope the Heron will return. There were two of them at the edge of a dam along Norton Road recently, so they are still in the area.

A few Honeyeaters are passing through the garden most days. There was a White-eared Honeyeater feeding on some Grevillea flowers and several Eastern Spinebills have discovered the few flowers that are already opening on the Correas. Seed-eaters are finding plenty to eat. Several Crimson Rosellas have been perching on the *Kunzea ericoides* (Burgan) bushes feeding on the tiny seed capsules. And yesterday there were two Gang-gang Cockatoos on a young Red Stringybark (*Eucalyptus macrorhyncha*) breaking open the tough seed capsules to feed on the tiny seed inside.

It was good to see the Gang-gangs as the Federal Environment Department is considering putting them on the endangered species list. The Department has opened up submissions as to whether they should be so listed with a final decision to be made in April next year. Evidently the population of this species has declined 69 per cent in the last 21 years and has lost a lot of its habitat during the 2019-2020 summer bushfires. A few Kangaroo joeys are peering from their mothers' pouches, but none have emerged yet. There was a large group of 'roos standing near my verandah a few mornings ago. They had a dusting of white frost on their fur and the sun was just rising over the hill. When the sunlight reached them, it was warm enough to melt the frost – and the 'roos stood there with clouds of white steam rising from them. Wamboin is always coming up with lovely pictures like this, isn't it.
