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


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Wamboin Community Association Presidents Paragraphs


Get Vaccinated – Thanks science.

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

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WCAG – Community Fibre Project Update – 30 November 2021

It's been three months since the last update on our community fibre Project and we know that many residents are anxious to know how the project is progressing.

As outlined in our August update, the Department of Regional NSW, which is undertaking the procurement on behalf of the NSW Government, had contacted WCAG to advise that its evaluation of the RFT had been completed. While none of the tenders submitted met the requirements specified in the tender documents, the Department would now pursue alternative options to progress the construction of the network.

The WCAG is very much aware that this announcement resulted in numerous rumours and some speculation that the project was unlikely to proceed. To paraphrase Mark Twain, those rumours greatly exaggerated the facts. Specifically, despite what you may have read on some social media sites, or heard at community forums, our project remains very much alive.

Earlier this month, the Department of Regional NSW confirmed that it remains "committed to improving connectivity in the Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton region".

Over the last three months:

- the WCAG has met with senior officers of the Department to discuss options and alternatives to move the project forward;
- the Department has identified how the outcome and learnings from the RFT process could best be used to improve aspects of the projects technical, financial, procurement and operating models;
- in mid-November, the Department approached a shortlist of telecommunications providers (that had responded to the original RFT) and sought an updated response from them based on this (via an EOI process);
- WCAG was invited to assist these providers in responding to the EOI by clarifying the community's needs for better broadband and in refining and recasting their technical and deployment solution;

The Department is now considering the responses to the EOI.

Lastly, the WCAG understands that many residents are disappointed in the delays experienced in getting the construction of our fibre network started. It would be an understatement to say that we share your frustration.

In the meantime, best wishes for Christmas and hope you and your family have a happy and safe festive season. - WCAG

The summer solstice occurs on the 22nd December 2021, which is the day with the longest daylight, but interestingly it is not the day with either the earliest sunrise or the latest sunset. That is because sun rises and sun sets are not related to solstice. The earliest sunrise occurs about 2 weeks before the summer solstice and the latest sunset occurs 2 weeks after the summer solstice.

November 2021 has been the wettest November on record with 200mm to the 28th day. The total rainfall to the 28th of November is 1007.5mm, which is the 2nd wettest year on record. If we get the average rainfall for December, 2021 will be just short of the wettest year on record. However, the forecast for the region issued by BOM (Bureau Of Meteorology) for December is for above average rainfall.

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

Bird Of The Month

For December I chose the White-necked Heron, an uncommon visitor to the Wamboin area.

White-necked Heron (Ardea pacifica)

Size: 76-106cm (wingspan 1.6m)

Status: Uncommon breeding visitor

White-necked Herons are very large and distinctive waterbirds. Their plumage consists of a white head and neck, which contrasts strongly with the slate-grey body. In breeding plumage their neck is plain white, and they acquire plum-coloured breeding plumes on the back and breast. In non-breeding and juvenile plumage, the front of the neck is spotted black. The bill and legs are black. In flight White-necked Herons have a hunched neck and have white "headlights" on the front of the wings, a useful feature for identification when they are flying. Their flight is very slow with long. slow wingbeats. The male and female look similar. White-necked Herons are usually found singly or sometimes in small groups. They rarely call, but if they do, it is a guttural grunt or croak, typically only given in alarm or around the nest. White-necked Herons are an uncommon visitor to our area, mainly over summer, but they are also present in smaller numbers during winter. They very rarely breed locally, however a pair has been nesting in Wamboin this spring. They are not typically resident and move widely in response to where suitable habitat is. White-necked Herons can



be found at most waterbodies including farm dams, lake edges, flooded paddocks, wetlands and sewage ponds. They typically wade on the shallower edges of waterbodies and stalk fish, yabbies, tadpoles, frogs and other small aquatic animals, which they spear with their large, dagger-like bill. They are the third largest Australian heron, only surpassed in size by the Great Egret (Ardea alba - found throughout Australia) and the Great-billed Heron (Ardea sumatrana - found in coastal northern Australia from central QLD to the Kimberley, WA). In the local area, the White-faced Heron also occurs regularly which is overall grey in colour with a white face, as opposed to a white head and neck. (Photo from Google Images)



Nature Notes - November 2021

With copious amounts of rain falling during most of November, the dams are full and overflowing, creeks still audible and the vegetation growing fast in a green and lush landscape.

This has been the wettest November recorded in the Canberra region. On the last Thursday of the month, we had two very heavy downpours here. I had 55.5 mm in my rain gauge and the creek flooded beyond its banks in places. The water was hurtling along so strongly that it uprooted reeds and sedges in places and left them on the banks – as well as almost uprooting two sizeable shrubs. Not sure where the tadpoles developing in the previously quiet pools along the creek ended up.

Masses of cream flowers are covering the dark green Black Wattles (*Acacia mearnsii*) along Sutton Road and at the bottom of the hill on Norton Road. This is a curious species as it doesn't develop its seed to maturity until the next lot of flowers are almost blooming. If you look at them now – when they are flowering, or almost so – you'll find well-developed seed pods that will mature round about the Christmas-New Year period. The flowers that are on the trees now will produce tiny seed pods that will stay that way until about the middle of next year, when they will start growing as next year's buds are developing.

Daviesia mimosoides (Bitter Pea) bushes have finished flowering and are now covered in triangular shaped reddish seed pods. But many of the other pea plants are still bearing a lot of colourful flowers – including Dillwynia sericea (Parrot Pea) a low-growing compact plant with masses of orange-yellow flowers – there are quite a few of these along local roadsides at present. And the Pale Wedge Pea (Gompholobium huegelii) is showing off a lot of large bright yellow flowers.

Bluebells (*Wahlenbergia stricta* and *W. communis*) are having a bumper show of flowers this year – growing extremely tall and producing lots of bright blue flowers. A bit of purple colour is provided by Mountain Kangaroo Apple bushes (*Solanum linearifolium* and the smaller (and prickly) Narrawa Burr (*Solanum cinereum*). And, along some local roadsides and beyond, Cauliflower Bushes

(*Cassinia longifolia*) are beginning to flower. Their large white flower-heads above the large patches of Sticky Everlasting Daisies (*Xerochrysum viscosum*) waving their golden flowers form quite a picture.

I haven't seen many lizards around yet – possibly because of the tall vegetation – but the Long-necked Turtles are moving around over local roads – I moved three to a saferplace last week.

It looks as if we're going to get still more wet weather. With everything growing so fast and luxuriantly, my place already looks more like a coastal area than Wamboin. Interesting times.

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A Chronology of Wamboin and District, from the Beginning to May 1828 David McDonald

The June 2021 issue of *The Whisper* included a note about the availability of the first edition of an historical timeline of our local area, titled 'A Chronology of Wamboin and District, NSW'. I have now completed a second edition. It contains 311 entries, in chronological order from c. 444 million years ago to the present time. You can access the full chronology (as a PDF file) at the Wamboin Community Association's website. It is at the local history page there: https://www.wamboincommunity.asn.au/localhistory/. At that page, navigate through the left-hand-side menus Wamboin Locality | Chronology.

Commencing with this issue of *The Whisper*, I have extracted some items from the Chronology that focus specifically on Wamboin and District, rather than the broader, contextual happenings. Future issues will continue the series. The full version at the website provides the documentary sources underpinning these contents and, in some cases, additional information, as well as other entries for the time period covered below.

Date	Occurrence/comment
c. 444 million years ago	Late Ordovician geological period. Huge volumes of sediments (turbidites) deposited into the deep ocean far off the east coast of the Gondwana mega-continent. Subsequently folded and metamorphosed into the quartzrich sandstone, siltstone, and shale that we see over most of Wamboin and district today.
c. 10-5 million years ago	The tectonic elevation of the Cullerin Uplift/Cullerin Horst during the Late Miocene to Early Pliocene epoch. The downcutting of the Molonglo River gorge kept pace with the uplifting of the lands. The eastern escarpment of the Cullerin Horst blocked the flow of Allianoyonyiga, Taylors, Butmaroo & Turallo Creeks to the Yass River through Gearys Gap, creating Lake George/Weereewaa.
c. 50,000 years ago, onwards	Aboriginal people were the custodians of the lands that we call Wamboin and district for up to 50,000 years (and possibly longer) before Europeans first visited the area. Tobler <i>et al.</i> (2017) present evidence ' that the settlement of Australia comprised a single, rapid migration along the east and west coasts that reached southern Australia by 49-45' thousand years ago. Apparently, no historical documents, nor recorded oral history, exist clarifying what these traditional custodians called themselves, nor what they called their language. We do know, however, from scholarly linguistics research covering the National Capital region more broadly (especially Koch 2009 & 2010), that their language was similar to, if not identical to, that of the Monaro people: the <i>Ngarigu/Ngarigo</i> language, and <i>Ngarigu/Ngarigo</i> was apparently the name the Monaro people called themselves.

Route: from the eastern side of Lake George, crossing Turallo Creek, west over the Lake George Range, through what is now the south-eastern part of the locality of Wamboin, to the headwaters of the Yass River in Wamboin, followed the river to the west then north to its junction with Brooks Creek, east along Brooks Creek to Gearys Gap, descended to the lake, south along its western shore then north along the eastern shore to the expedition's starting point.
1822, 30 Jan	First map to show part of what became the Parish of Wamboin. Compiled by NSW Surveyor General John Oxley.
1824 (possibly earlier)	Sydney-based Captain Richard Brooks (1765–1833) established the 'Bungendow', 'Bungandow' property (including 'Turalla'), the most southerly inland location at which the colonial settlers had taken up land at that stage. In 1 Dec 1824 he was 'Allowed temporary occupation of land at the southern end of Lake George for use as a grazing run'. It subsequently became a land grant of 4,000 acres.

Tomatoes '21

No ripe tomatoes so far however we now have quite a lot of set fruit.

Of the 6 varieties of tomatoes we planted, the first to set was a San Marzano (left - looks like a tall Roma), as per the attached photo taken November 26. Maybe this one will be ripe by Christmas? The most prolific tomato at this stage is an Apollo (right). As you can see by the photo it is well



advanced.

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Perhaps the cold weather delayed thoughts of gardening as I was about a month late planting the Siberian Tomato seed. This variety is going great now. At the other end of the season, I cut back an Apollo to about 150mm about the end of January and was rewarded with fruit until late June. Lofty Mason.

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Tawny Frogmouth Family

Yesterday I spotted a family of Tawny Frogmouth Owls perched on a gum tree branch down by our Creek. There were three babies and what may have been their mother sitting watchfully behind them. Naturally camouflaged against the bark of the gum trees, they sat motionless and with their eyes closed for what appeared quite some time.

This is typically their breeding season between August to December and we are thrilled they chose to visit or perhaps nest on our Wamboin property.






Can You Create Something for the Next Whisper?

Kowen Iso Freedom Trail Run

I'm standing on the concrete drain at the Wamboin Community Hall. There is no one around except for a lady sitting in her car. She has run the course and is waiting on her husband to finish. This is not like any other Kowen Trail run. Pam and her loud hailer are not to be seen or heard. There is no coffee stand or hundreds of other runners milling around. There are no queues for the loos, I can walk straight in. It's all very quiet and somewhat disconcerting. I'm on my own. The weather is dry (what a surprise) and cool, perfect

After abstaining from the previous Kowen Iso runs I have decided to give this one a go. I don't feel fast but I think I can do a reasonable time after a fairly sedentary time under COVID restrictions.

There is no point in hanging around, let's get this done. I walk up to the concrete drain and push the button on my watch, that's my starter's gun. I'm off. There is no crowd jostling as we turn on to Bingley Way, I'm on my own. There is no one passing, nor can I check on other runners to see who I might use as my pace setters. I'm on my own. This is like the Moonlighter run when I ran up Bingley Way at 4.00am, on my own. This time there is daylight.

As always it's up Bingley and a right tun on to the dirt road. I run to the steeper section and then slow my pace as I climb to the right hand turn into the bush. On the left there is a new track well marked with a boundary of rocks. Do I go that way? No, stick with the track you know and then there it is, Pam's pink tape. I'm where I should be.

It's about 800 metres through the bush and then the crossing into the forest. A left turn and I can settle my pace on these forestry roads. I think about that age old question is it Cow-wen forest or Co-wen forest. I let that debate run in my head while I focus on my foot placement and breathing. The body is warming up and my breathing is settled. I'm not fast but I feel comfortable. Now where are these steep bits.

And there it is, a steep downhill. The one advantage of being on my own is I don't have to think about other runners behind me or in front or those trying to pass. I weave across the track trying to find the best line. No need for runner's etiquette when you are on your own.

Is that a dunny lying on its side? Yep, that's a dunny and what's it doing here? How did it get here, how do you use a dunny on its side and who is going to lift it back up? Was there someone in it when it fell over? These are the questions I entertain myself with as I run past a random toilet in the bush.

There is a very wet section across the track. I can see many foot prints but there is no dry path. I choose a high section but pretty quickly the ground subsides and my foot is underwater. So now it's wet feet! I hit some very wet clay and my foot loses traction. It's like driving an empty ute around a Canberra roundabout in the rain, the backend slides and then you steady as you get traction and you're off.

Over a hill and then there it is, Amungula. I have a steep decline, a long flat section and then the climb up THAT hill, no it's a mountain. I am careful going down as I want to preserve my knees and I don't want to trip. Across the flat and then the climb. I try to maintain a respectable pace but that is not to be. I slow and the climb gets steeper and longer. There are no clues from other runners who might have slowed to a walk. It's my decision how I attack this bloody hill. I set a marker and decide that at that point I'll be walking.



I can hear what sounds like heavy machinery. Is someone operating a rock hammer? Maybe it's that new subdivision where they are operating heavy equipment. It's a slow rhythmic thump, thump, thump. It's coming from a long way away. I slow down and listen. Then I realise that's not heavy plant, that's my heart pumping! That's a good thing I guess.

I get to the top of THAT hill and try to get my legs running again. Now it's time to look for the markers for the turn around. So far Pam's pink tape has been very visible. There is the cross road and now I am looking for a three way intersection. I'm sure the turnaround must be coming up. I'm trying to recall the map I had been studying on the web site. What does my watch say about how far I have run? There's the three way intersection, a nice long flatter section and there it is, the stone cairn and lots of pink ribbons. It's the turnaround, now I'm going home.

My legs are feeling less energised but I only have 6 kms to go. This time it's down Amungula and again time to preserve the knees. I wonder is it A-mun-gulla, A-mun-goola, or A-mung-gulla. No time for that debate, I can't think, I'll stick to the running. I am back to running up a steep climb and again I can hear that rock hammer. Oh, that's right we decided that was my heart pumping. Again, a good thing.

Back through the mud, past the unusable dunny and I am looking for the gate out of the forest. Finally, I think I can see the gate. I am back into NSW and the native forest. No need for a mask since I am outside. Through the forest and back to the dirt road to Bingley. I turn on to Bingley and that short climb which never fails to annoy me at this late stage of the run. I can hear Pam's words, 'It is a Kowen Trail run' and I must expect hills.

Now its downhill all the way to the finish line. There are no runners I can chase down or that are passing me. I'm on my own. It's past Lofty and Joan's place and I am looking for the entrance to the hall. I turn on to the gravel, being sure not to slip and there it is the concrete drain, the finish line.

There are no crowds cheering or milling around. No queues of runners waiting for the steak sandwich. I press the button on my watch and I'm done. I look around, let my breathing settle and think what now? I don't have to take the timing bib off, I don't have to calm my breathing so I can talk to other runners. There is nothing to do so I guess I'll go home. I get into my car, sit for a minute and drive home for a hot shower.

After my shower I download my results onto the web page and discover I am the only male in my age group that has run the 12 km course. That makes me first in the male, 60-69 group. There are however six more days for people to run this course. My time was 1:33:05. The lady who was waiting at the carpark when I started had a time of 1:22:49, a great result. Along with the 12 km run there is a 21 and a 31 km course.

Hopefully the next Kowen run will be back to the old format with lots of people. In the meantime the Iso version was still lots of fun, thanks to Pam Muston and her team. - Kevin Rowe, The Three Score Plus Trail Runner

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From the Corner

Signing Off—By the time most people read this, I will no longer be a councillor, so this will be my last column on Local Government matters. It's been an interesting, if at times challenging, ride over the last 10 years and I have been encouraged by the positive feedback from readers of my ramblings.

Most of the issues that I have discussed over the years relate to planning matters. Dealing with, and understanding these issues is probably the most complex and contentious part of a councillor's role. The breadth of the legislation involved is just part of the story. Being seen, often a little unfairly I might add, as the reason why someone is or isn't allowed to do something they might want to do with or on their property, however, can be a very effective way of minimising one's social set.

But getting back to the election itself, I believe, but have not been able to personally confirm, that with recent changes in the necessary legislation, this will be the first time all preferences will actually be counted in a local government election. Regulations hitherto have not taken into account the fact that we have computers capable of executing this task much more quickly than can human beings. In the past, the regulations required that the distribution of preferences be based on a sample of ballot papers, not the counting of every individual paper, even though all ballot papers have been electronically tabulated (*i.e.* 'computer ready') for at least the last ten years.

So, given the number of essentially unknown candidates and the fact that two of the four sitting councillors who are contesting the election have not nominated in electable positions on the ballot paper, there could well be a few surprises and a [politically] unpredictable Council. The NSWEC, however, in almost theatrical fashion, is not committing to finalising any results for several weeks after election day, so it could be a less than relaxing Christmas for some.

If you're after a bit of light(er) entertainment (actually, given that this is a genuine documentary, it's not exactly 'funny') while you await the announcement of the Council election results, take a look at the [1996] documentary *Rats in the Ranks*, an account of the 1994 Mayoral election in Leichardt Council.

More entertaining may be the subsequent satirical comedy (actually, closer to a documentary than most people would like) TV series *Grass Roots*—Australian humour in the vein of *The Games* and *Utopia*.

For anyone who was too young to know what was going on, or who just missed it at the time, *Grass Roots* (just Google it, some of the episodes are available on YouTube and the whole series, while it can be a little difficult to find now, was released on DVD) is the next best thing to—some might suggest even better than—reading my articles in past editions of the Whisper. The series, and the *Rats in the Ranks* documentary (that's available on YouTube too), do indeed offer a more in-depth coverage of the political machinations of local government than I ever contemplated presenting.

From the DVD cover:

Welcome to Arcadia Waters Council, where the local politicians dream and scheme, intent on climbing the political ladder through corruption and shady deals. Where the Staff work hard to keep all the skeletons neatly in their cupboards, and where the ordinary local people just want their rubbish collected, their streets cleaned, and for someone at the council to pay attention for a minute and for heaven's sake, stop the dog next door from barking all night!

It's only days to the local government election and Col Dunkley, Mayor of Arcadia Waters, wants to be re-elected for another term.

Col's main political opponent, Biddy Marchant, also wants to be Mayor. She's a charming, ruthless conspirator. She could win. The election night results take Col and his faction back into Council but without a majority. He and Biddy have equal numbers and the position of Mayor will be decided by an independent new councillor.

The story unfolds when we meet the councillors, as they succumb to the pressure of local politics and the local people tear out their hair and get on with their lives.
