

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Dave Argaet

Dave Argaet, of Bungendore and previously of Wamboin, a stonemason, musician, artist, and beloved father and grandfather has died peacefully after a long illness. He was farewelled this week by many friends at Bungendore cemetery. Dave was born in Murrumburrah in 1952 and met his wife Joanne when he was 16 and she was 14. In the traditional style, Dave announced his romantic intentions by throwing a firecracker at Joanne, and thus started their passionate adventure together.

The couple bought property in Wamboin in the early 80s and camped there for a few years to determine the best site to build on. When they first arrived, the grass was waist-high and they had to push it down with their car to get anywhere. They lived for years in a breezy timber and tin shed while they built their dream home which would eventually be a grand stone cottage with a cathedral ceiling held aloft by a central tree trunk post that Dave felled and hewed by hand with an adze and which needed a barn-raising style party to install.

Dave was great at hosting parties and many remember his famous Australia Day Weekend parties that would go on for days with many friends camping or coming and going from the event with its live music and warm conversation. Dave loved the Wamboin lifestyle, particularly enjoying the closeness of the local community. He was an active member of the Wamboin golf club with his paddocks part of the course, and a regular at the Wamboin markets coffee social scene and bonfire and curry nights. The Argaets moved to Bungendore in 2011 giving their grown kids greater access to town services, and Dave loved being able to enjoy the pubs and social scene there and for the first time ever, the urban advantage of being able to walk home after a great night out. As a musician, Dave loved performing in local pubs and cafes and his passion for music is carried on in his children. His epic parties continued in the new Bungendore location.

Dave's favourite time of year was winter solstice because it brought the promise of longer, warmer days and for him it was the true start of Spring. Dave is probably best known for his stone masonry which is all around the Wamboin and Bungendore areas, most prominently the big Wamboin sign on the corner of Sutton and Norton roads, but also in beautiful handmade stone gateways and landscaping features throughout the region. Dave was also an artist and created the award-winning half-sunken 'Sands of Time' house sculpture along Lake Road. Dave was always friendly and his family and friends remember how he was always so relaxed and accepting. He played footy in his youth for the Harden Hawks and he loved the music of Leonard Cohen.

Dave is survived by his wife Joanne, his children Renee, Dean, and Tom, and his grandchildren, Ella, Jett, Poppy, and Teddy.

Bird Of The Month - By Luke Downey

For August I chose the Common Blackbird, an introduced species that has been calling prominently around our place recently. Common Blackbird (Turdus merula) Size: 25-26cm Status: Introduced - Fairly common, breeding resident The Common or Eurasian Blackbird is a very common species native to Europe, western-central Asia and northern Africa. Popular among Europeans for their beautiful song, Blackbirds were introduced to Melbourne in the 1850's, where they subsequently escaped and naturalised. Today, they occur throughout south-east Australia from Brisbane to the Great Australian Bight (and Tasmania). The male is a striking bird, its body is rich black with a bright yellow bill and eye-ring and yellowish legs. The female on the other hand, is mottled brown, slightly paler and streaky underneath, with a dull yellow/brown bill and eye-ring. Immatures are like females, sometimes with more black mottling in immature males. Confusion is possible with the much rarer (locally) Bassian Thrush, but that species is much paler below with more scaly plumage and prefers denser forest and rainforest habitat (which don't occur in Wamboin). Common Blackbirds may also look similar to Common Starlings (another introduced species) but are easily distinguished due to the different habitat and behaviour they exhibit. Blackbirds tend to prefer more well vegetated areas where they forage in the undergrowth and leaf litter for insects. They are more prominent in bushland areas than other introduced birds and are the only introduced bird recorded at our property on a semi-regularly. They occupy quite a similar niche in the ecosystem to the native White-winged Chough, foraging on the ground for insects, however they usually occur singly or in pairs. Being an introduced species, they are classified as a pest. They are not however, prevalent or occur at high densities (i.e. not in large flocks) throughout their introduced range, and are thus considered to be



less of a problem than other introduced birds like, Common Mynas or Starlings. They don't appear to compete with native species for tree hollows. The call of the Common Blackbird is a very pleasant, melodious and complex whistling song, over and over but seldom the same notes repeated. This call is very loud and is a good indicator of their presence. When disturbed they make an alarm call "tschink" or "tseep". Keep an eye and ear out for this European-native species in your garden; they are a common garden bird.


Is Bottled Gas Really Worth It These Days?

Have you had difficulties with gas deliveries this winter? I use Elgas who normally are pretty reliable. I run a gas guzzler of an AGA cooker - although to be fair it does heat my water and the kitchen/office and family room, plus of course supply my cooking needs over winter. I turn it off in spring and use the companion AGA which is electric ovens with gas hot plates. I do have instant gas heating and gas central heating (which I haven't used yet this winter – ie the house is freezing except for the area heated by the AGA.) I have solar as well but that doesn't help the gas issue. Have to think again for future winters......really have to work out a system that is more environmentally friendly and cost effective.

Enough of that. I currently get fortnightly deliveries of bottled gas. Been very erratic and unreliable this winter. On the phone often and promises of deliveries, text messages saying delivery the next day....but no gas. This time 3 weeks after regular delivery due, I got to between 5 and 0 on the dial and was told by the supplier to hitch up a BBQ cylinder to the system. Not easy.

So after many calls that appeared to end up in Wollongong and Dubbo to name a few, I walked into the Canberra office. 7/9 Geelong St Fyshwick, delightful, overstretched, hardworking staff. I stood there until I got a real answer (not long and they dealt with 10 other Wamboin calls while I was there – small office, can hear everything.....). Gas appeared 2 hours later. The person delivering it normally services the Southern Highlands and said almost everyone there gets a second emergency smaller cylinder set up for occasions such as these – or floods where tankers cant get through – or famine or something. He showed me how to set up a BBQ cylinder and also how to get someone to set up a reserve cylinder. I think I'll do that rather than trying to heave a full BBQ cylinder up onto the hopper next to the cylinder (above my height) and setting it up myself. Dodgy at 74, even if fairly fit. So – see you in the Elgas office next winter? Off for a long hot bath tonight! - Meriel Schultz





WCA Spring Talks Series at the Wamboin Hall – 2022

The WCA invites all residents of Wamboin and surrounding areas to the Spring Talks Series – 2022. Bringing the community together face-to-face to discuss topics relevant to life in our rural-residential area, the aim of the Spring Talks Series is to entertain, inform and encourage active participation in our community. We normally commence with a brief monthly general meeting of the WCA, followed by the guest speakers who usually present for 30-40 minutes, followed by refreshments and an opportunity to meet the guest speakers and more of your neighbours, and importantly, get to know more about what is going on in our community – it's where we all live!

Talk #1. Tuesday 20th September at 7:30. Allergies

Professor Simon Haberle will talk on hay fever and pollen in the Canberra region. Simon is one of Australia's senior experts on this topic. Simon is currently Director of the School of Culture, History and Language, College of Asia and the Pacific, ANU. He completed his PhD at ANU on the Late Quaternary Environmental History of the Tari Basin, Papua New Guinea, in 1994.

Talk #2. Tuesday 18th October at 7:30. - Citizens Science and the Canberra Wildlife Map

Dr Paul Downey and (his son) Luke will present on the world of Citizens Science and its value to Wamboin residents; including how you might become involved ... and why you should. Luke will give a demonstration of the Canberra Nature Map. Paul is an ecologist and Adjunct Associate Professor at the University of Canberra. Luke is a published author on birdlife in the Wamboin area.

Talk #3. Tuesday 15th November at 7:30. - Wildlife Care

Professor Steve Garlick and Dr Rosemary Austin Garlick will talk on their work looking after injured and sick Australian wildlife. Steve and Rosemary run the Possumwood Wildlife Hospital and Recovery Centre near Bungendore. Steve is a professor at the University of Newcastle and the University of Technology Sydney. He is a spatial economist, higher education specialist and applied ethicist with involvement in wildlife welfare. - Ian Donald, WCA Committee

Thursday Social Group

The Thursday Social Group commenced operating a couple of years ago. An application for funding was developed in 2015 and granted by Queanbeyan-Palerang Regional Council in 2016. The grant was used to purchase table tennis tables, scrabble, table games, puzzles and cards. The aim of setting up the group was to provide a meeting place for the community to get together during the day. The group commenced in 2016 and people attending the group played scrabble or other table games, whilst others played table tennis.

A small group of people were instrumental in getting the group started. The Thursday group has been very lucky to have people such as these, committed and enthusiastic to see such a social group commence. At various times the group had up to 24 participants with ages ranging from young mothers with babies through to 92 years. Everyone was made to feel welcome and participants contributed \$2 each week to cover morning tea and goodies.

The Queanbeyan Palerang Regional Council Mobile Library commenced visiting Wamboin during this time and this visit coincided with the Thursday morning group. Over the years the Library has also provided information sessions in conjunction with the Thursday social group on topics such as the use of ipads and smart phones. Queanbeyan Palerang Regional Council has also assisted the Thursday social group with funding to cover venue hire, thus ensuring that the Thursday social group continues to operate.

In mid 2019, I attended my first Thursday social group. Like many Wamboin residents, I didn't know of the group's existence until my neighbour started to talk to me about going to the group when I retired a couple of years ago. When I finally decided to go I was made so welcome. Each Thursday when I came in, people welcomed me before I even got to the door, and they remembered my name!!! This was my introduction to the Thursday social group, and it remains the same friendly welcoming group.

Early last year, there was a concern that the group might fold, the convenor was unwell and COVID had hit, but by this time I had made some wonderful friends and knew that I would miss the group greatly if it folded. After some discussion with other group members and my concern that the COVID pandemic was causing some isolation and loneliness in the area, I took on the convenor role in March 2021.

The pandemic has caused some disruption to the group but we have developed COVID safety plans and ensure that all requirements were/are met. Currently we have 20 people on our books, with 10-12 people attending each week. The people attending the group range in age from 63-95 years, with an average age of 82 years. We welcome everyone and would love to see younger people come along.

We start the morning with freshly brewed coffee or tea, a snack, a chat and then usually a game of scrabble or rummykub. These seem to be the popular games but we also have card games available, triominoes, dominos, pick-up sticks, upwords and if we have sufficient demand, a game of table tennis. Some people come along for a chat and don't wish to play any games, others are more serious

about their game. We cater for everyone. The Mobile Library continues to visit on alternate Thursdays.

The Thursday Social group is a wonderful opportunity for anyone to come along, have a chat, a cup of coffee/tea and a game of something if you would like. Members of the group are very supportive of others and if we can help with transport, or other things, we will try our best to accommodate these needs. If you haven't been to the Wamboin Hall parking is easy, a flat walk to the entrance and no steps.

If you are not busy on a Thursday morning between 10-12 noon, then come along and see what you think. If you want to have a chat about the group, please give me a call on 0438 917206 or email pumpbnjc@westnet.com.au -- Narelle Pumphrey, Convenor



PRELIMINARY NOTICE: As the saying goes..... 'forewarned is forearmed'. The bush fire season is rapidly approaching (1st Oct). Now and through September is a good time for residents, families and property owners to get bush fire ready. By having a Bush Fire Survival Plan and knowing what you will do in the case of a bush fire, you can keep yourself and your family safe. And, preparing your home is common sense and can be simple. In September every year, Wamboin Rural Fire Brigade along with other NSWRFS brigades will be out in our respective communities helping you to get ready with advice, guidelines and resources. Preparing for the fire season is as important as ever; Get Ready Weekend (17-18 September) is the perfect time of year to get ready. Mindful that Covid-19 and other viruses continue to circulate in the community, the brigade's

information shopfront will operate, as normal, outside the Wamboin Fire Station on Saturday 17 September adjacent the Wamboin Market.

This is in-lieu of a community-wide 'theatre-style' gathering inside the Fire Station as has occurred in years prior to the start of the Covid-19 pandemic. Our Community Engagement Team of experienced firefighters will be on hand to talk with individuals on a <u>one-on-one basis</u>, answer questions and provide general advice on the preparation of your bush fire survival plan. Note: Extended hours of operation of the brigade's shopfront: 9.00am till 3pm.

Throughout September, as we did last year, we'll be providing regular Get Ready messaging plus hints and tips on the brigade's Facebook page. You'll also be able to find helpful information on the brigade's website.

One important change that will affect everyone this bush fire season will be the introduction of the new Australian Fire Danger Rating System (i.e. nation-wide system). Expect a state-wide media campaign from the NSWRFS beginning in September.




10 ways you can help Wildcare Queanbeyan help wildlife.

- 1. Phone the Wildcare Queanbeyan 24/7 Helpline on 6299 1966 if you find sick, injured, or orphaned wildlife. Please don't phone WIRES. WIRES are great at animal rescue in areas where they have lots of members, but around here there are few members and response times can be slow. WIRES will often call Wildcare to pass a local rescue to us, which takes valuable time when an animal is suffering.
- 2. Provide the animals exact location. This can be done with GPS coordinates or specific directions "Its 100 metres east past the 80km sign on the left-hand side of the road" and leave a marker if possible. This can be as simple as a bag tied to a fence post.
- 3. If it is safe to do so, remove the animal from the road, to prevent further injuries. This is good to do as it prevents scavenging animals like eagles and quolls becoming roadkill too.
- 4. Stay with the animal to protect it from opportunistic species. Crows will remove the eyes of an injured animal, significantly impairing the outcome for the animal.
- 5. Take the animal to the local vet or bring it into town if it is somewhere remote and pass it to an authorised wildlife rehabilitator. Vets will assess or treat an injured animal and then pass it to Wildcare for rehabilitation.
- 6. Carry a towel in the car with you. Injured wildlife can be picked up and wrapped in a towel, helping it feel secure and warm until it can be helped.
- 7. If you need to hold onto an animal until help arrives, keep it in a quiet, dark, and warm (but not hot) location away from children and pets. This helps minimise the animal's stress and leads to a better outcome for that animal.
- 8. If in doubt, call the Helpline for advice. You may have noticed unusual behaviour in an animal or see it in a strange location. Maybe something just doesn't seem right. Call the Helpline and an experienced rescuer can come and assess the animal. Please check the Helpline has recorded your contact details correctly so that the rescuer can contact you if clarification is required.
- 9. Please add the Wildcare Queanbeyan Helpline phone number to the contacts in your phone. You never know when you might need it
- 10. Make a donation to Wildcare Queanbeyan. Details of how to do this can be found on our website at www.wildcare.com.au. Wildcare Queanbeyan is run entirely by volunteers and any donations are greatly appreciated.

Broadband Fibre Network Project – Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton Region – Funded, Contract Signed and Construction Starts 2023

As foreshadowed in last month's Whisper, the NSW Government has now announced funding and signed a contract with Opticomm Ltd (a wholly owned subsidiary of Uniti Group) to build and operate the Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton Region Fibre Network.

On 30 June 2022, Glenn Archer and Olaf Theden (representing the Wamboin Communications Action Group - WCAG), met with the NSW Deputy Premier, Paul Toole MP and together with our local member, Nichole Overall MP and Geoff Aldridge (CEO, Opticomm), participated in the announcement of the signing of the contract to build and operate our community Fibre-based network.

Our fibre network is the first of several projects being funded under the banner of the **NSW Gig State** initiative, with the aim being "to deliver a metro-level internet service to regional communities and businesses".

The key aspects of this announcement include:

- A total investment of \$12 million to construct the network made up of \$9.5m from the NSW Government in addition to \$2.5m in resources and services from Opticomm.
- The contract provides for delivering superfast broadband connectivity to 1,352 premises to be connected to the fibre network across the Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton regions. This includes building, operating and the ongoing support of a Fibre to the Premises (FttP) network along the streets and individual fibre connections (lead-ins) to connected residences & businesses.
- The broadband network will operate under a wholesale model (similar to the NBN), where residents and local businesses gain access to the Internet at speeds of up to 1Gbps through one of Opticomm's more than 50 Retail Service Providers (RSPs). Each RSP offers a range of plans with different speeds, data allowances and other features. As these are national plans, residents will be getting access to the same pricing as those living in the cities. See https://www.opticomm.com.au/service-providers/ for a complete list.
- Construction is planned to commence in early 2023.

This is a significant financial investment and one that will greatly benefit the three communities, residents and the many businesses that are based here. It will enable us to participate fully in the increasingly digital society and economy.

The WCAG was formed in 2017 by a small group of local residents who have volunteered their time (and money) to advance a cause they each passionately believe in. Consequently, this announcement represents a major milestone and the culmination of over five years of effort for the Group.

But WCAG is not planning on taking a back seat. It has committed to the Department and Opticomm that it will provide what support it can to ensure that the project is a success and that it meets the expectations and needs of the residents and businesses across the three communities. In particular, WCAG will aim to provide a conduit between the community and Opticomm throughout the construction and commissioning phases – to support the consultation process, facilitate a feedback mechanism and keep everyone advised of any issues as necessary.

The Department of Regional NSW has recently published the list of the properties that it has contracted with Opticomm to be connected to the network. That list is available at https://www.nsw.gov.au/sites/default/files/2022-07/Opticomm service list.pdf. However, WCAG is aware of a small number of properties, that are not included on this list, notwithstanding that their surrounding neighbours are included. WCAG has raised this issue with both the Project Team and Opticomm and we are hoping for a quick resolution to this.

WCAG hopes to be able to release a map showing the boundary of the area covered by the published list shortly. It is clear that, in general, the boundary approximately matches the previous NSW tender, although it omits some properties north of Sutton village. As noted in past WCAG newsletters, this means that, overall it excludes a number of areas/roads that were originally included within WCAG's target footprint. We are currently in discussion with the Department, Opticomm, some affected residents and our local member's office, to ascertain what options might exist for those residents on the fringe of the contracted network footprint, to be connected to the network at some time in the future.

However, WCAG believes that the interests of residents are best served, for now, in assisting Opticomm with delivering fibre broadband services to those properties covered by its contract with the NSW Government, and this needs to be WCAG's immediate focus.

The following is a summary of the key details provided, by email, to those residents registered with WCAG in early July 2022. It is included here for the benefit of those residents that may not have received that advice. If you would like to register with WCAG, to be kept up to date on the progress of the project, please go to http://wamboinfibre.com/

How and when will residents be able to connect to this broadband network?

Opticomm is currently completing a detailed project plan, network route design, schedule and various aspects of how consultation with property owners will be enabled. Network services will begin to be offered in early 2023 and will expand as the network is progressively rolled-out. WCAG and Opticomm will be providing information to residents about the planned information sessions and construction schedules soon.

Opticomm has advised WCAG that they will be adopting an industry standard approach to installing fibre, including primarily making use of road verges to construct the distribution network. As a consequence, the connection into residences (known as the "leadin"), will be installed by Opticomm from the property's front boundary. The actual route that the lead-in will then follow across your property will be the subject of individual discussions and agreed with property owners. As touched on above, further information is to be provided in relation to the consultation process that is proposed here.

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What will it cost me?

WCAG understand that, provided the installation of the lead-in fibre connection to each property/residence is completed as part of the planned network rollout, this will be done at no cost to the owner. Residents can choose to 'opt-out' and not have the lead-in installed into their residence during the construction period for their street. However, if you choose to opt-out and you (or a future owner of the property) subsequently request a lead-in connection at a later time, this will be a VERY EXPENSIVE process and will be at full cost to the owner.

After the property is connected to the fibre network, owners can then contact their preferred RSP, choose a plan that best meets their needs, and sign-up for the service to be activated. In addition to the normal monthly service charge applicable to the plan you choose, there may be a small initial connection fee payable to the RSP. We understand that this fee will be of the order of \$300. Most RSPs typically also offer their own (preconfigured) wifi capable routers – which you may or may not need. You should discuss this with the RSP. (See https://www.opticomm.com.au/service-providers/ for a list of Opticomm's RSPs)

What do I need to do now and where can I get more information?

At this stage residents do not need to do anything. WCAG will work with Opticomm to facilitate and coordinate a number of community forums or information sessions which we hope to run over the next few months. WCAG will use its web site as the primary source of advice to the community. As we learn more about Opticomm's plans and schedule we will post this first to that site. We will also continue to provide email updates from time-to-time to those residents registered with us.

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

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
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Nature Notes - July 2022 - by Jo Walker

A few sunny and still days made Spring seem just about here, but some frosty mornings and gloomy weather reminded us that July is still mid-winter.

But the Silver Wattles (Acacia dealbata) are beginning to flower and that adds some cheery brightness to the landscape. Most of the bright yellow flowers of these plants are only just beginning to open, but there is one tree here, just across the creek from my house, that has been in full flower for several weeks now. And some of the local eucalypts are likely to flower well later. There are several Red Stringybarks (Eucalyptus macrorhyncha) here with enough clusters of buds to weigh down the tips of the branchlets bearing them. And some of the Scribbly Gums (E. rossii) are also bearing loads of dainty buds.

Melichrus urceolatus (Urn Heath) is a common low-growing little shrub around here and is still bearing its cream flowers. And another heath plant, the suckering Lissanthe strigosa (Peach Heath) is carrying clusters of dark pink buds. The local Correa (Correa reflexa) begins flowering much earlier, and has been providing the Eastern Spinebills with some sweet nectar from its tubular, yellowtipped red flowers for some weeks now.

Kangaroo joeys are beginning to flop out of their mothers' pouches and tentatively hop around to explore their piece of the countryside. This is a dangerous time for them as a joey can easily get separated from its mother if it gets too adventurous. They are usually re-united after a bit of calling from both of them, but occasionally that isn't the outcome.

I hadn't seen a Wombat here for a while, but, just before I started on these Notes, a fully grown Wombat appeared on the hill across the creek. It eventually trundled down the hill, crossed the creek and spent an hour or so nibbling away on the grassy slope.

It's good to see some wildlife around after the dire State of the Environment Report came out this month. Evidently the Ganggang Cockatoo is now listed as a Threatened Species. I did hear one calling a few weeks ago, but there are definitely not as many around here as there used to be. And other parts of the environment are disappearing. Worryingly, many insects – an essential part of most food chains – are disappearing. It's many years since we've been inundated with Christmas Beetles, and very few large Ghost Moths batter our windows at night. And now the Bogong Moths that used to fly into our area in their millions during their annual migrations are listed on the International Union for Conservation of Nature Red List of Threatened Species. A lot of these losses can be laid at the door of climate change – with increased likelihood of bushfires and floods and temperatures high enough to disrupt insect life-cycles.

There's not a lot we, as individuals, can do to limit climate change to the levels necessary to avoid catastrophic changes to the environment we depend on. But we can enjoy the presence of all the creatures that share Wamboin with us now and do our best to protect the places they need.

What the Heck - Part 4

For more in our story of the SRMD, let us go back to Sutton in October 1908. A little weatherboard church, built on the Anglican site in Camp Street, was consecrated by Bishop Barlow. What a wonderful day that must have been for Sutton residents; the culmination of a dream and years of hard work. The previous year, following much hard work by Sutton locals, particularly Mrs Jane McInnes, a church building, St Peters, was constructed in the village. Sutton was a close knit community and the initiative was supported by both village and rural residents, regardless of whether Anglican or not. However by 1924 white ants had taken up residence in the building which was subsequently condemned and replaced by the stone building which is still in use today.

One hundred years later, on 26 October 2008, another wonderful community event took place as St Peters celebrated 100 years of services on the site. The church was overfilled with some having to sit outside and listen to the service on a public address system.

During the service a plaque was dedicated to the Cartwright family pioneers who have lived and worshipped in the area since 1853. Students from Sutton Public School presented a play and musical item.

After the service most of the congregation moved to the Community Hall where they were joined by other local residents to partake of the feast that awaited them. The hall had been decorated with art work by pupils from the school, along with displays by the RFS, Land Care, Pony Club and craft/activity groups from Sutton.

A few years earlier, in September 2005 a special service had been held at St Peters to celebrate 80 years since the laying of the Foundation stone for the brick building which was replacing the condemned weatherboard building that had been removed from the site. September 2025 will be 100 years since the Foundation Stone laying and February 2026 will be 100 years since the Consecration. Maybe there will be a big centenary celebration for one or both of those events. Keep the dates free.

This is the same building used for services twice monthly at the current time. A portico has been added, driveway upgraded and a carpark constructed, along with the nearby hall which is partially built awaiting funds to allow completion. -Alan Rope

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A Chronology of Wamboin and District, Part 7: 1921-1939 - By David McDonald

The third edition of an historical timeline of our local area, titled 'A Chronology of Wamboin and District, NSW', is available at the Wamboin Community Association's (WCA's) website. This is the seventh article presenting some items from the Chronology that focus specifically on Wamboin and district, rather than the broader, contextual happenings. It covers the period 1921 to 1939, and future issues will continue the series.
