





What the Heck Part 5

This month we look at the east window in St. Andrews; the stained glass window. This magnificent window was installed in the building in April 1998, shortly after construction, in memory of Joan Robertson, a stalwart of both the Wamboin and Sutton churches. When the window design was first discussed it was suggested that it should depict Christianity in Wamboin's geographical setting and the church's links with Canberra, and should incorporate symbols with which the local community might readily identify.

The design meets the requirements by incorporating a central cross as the most significant element, set in the context of the Wamboin community. The remainder of the design suggests God's creation reflected in the Wamboin landscape, in a partly abstract manner. Within its rural setting, the landscape is shown by varying shades of greens, blues and yellows of vegetation, and browns, ochres and other colours associated with the earth. A stylised tree continues this association. Eucalypt leaves, a feature of local vegetation, are hinted at by the flowing leadlines.

The scene is identifiable as Wamboin by the curving (Norton) road leading to the Telstra Tower, the Brindabellas in the distant background, and the grey kangaroo, the predominant large animal in this area.

A hint of changing seasons is reflected in the differences in hue across the panels. Away from towns and cities our awareness of

the changing sky, and the varying light from sun, moon and stars is greater, and this too is hinted at

through incorporation of these as design elements.

The window is constructed principally from both 'antique' glass and 'new antique' glass, with minimal use of paint, to make maximum use of the characteristics of these types of glass. The use of mainly unpainted glass gives greater life to the panel than would have occurred if this beautiful glass was subdued by extensive use of paint, as is the case with more traditional church windows. The window exhibits varying degrees of transparency from the hue and tone of the glass, enabling the outside landscape to be seen from inside the church, albeit distorted and

softened by the passage of the light through the striations and bubbles in the antique glass. Antique glass is not named because of its age, but because it is made in a more traditional manner, similar to medieval glass. The glass used in these panels was made in France and Germany. The window was designed and made by Robert Crafter of Canberra. - Alan Rope

Unsung heroes of Wamboin, Episode 1

Unsung heroes go quietly about achieving their goals and we have many of them in our community. You may not know them or even hear about them, but they are steadily getting things done for the benefit of all. In this article I'm going to talk about two I know and hope that you will write a little piece for The Whisper about a person you know who 'gets things done' but doesn't get mentioned or praised much for what they do.

Firstly, I want to write about Clare Hobbs who is the Support Crew Coordinator for the Wamboin Rural Fire Brigade and has been in this position for many years. Clare does many little but very important things like keeping the tankers stocked with enough drinks and food to sustain them for at least 24 hours in case they must either stay out for extended periods or in bad weather. She also organises the food for the many Fire Brigade fund-raising barbeques. There are several of these events every year, the latest of which was the Kowen Trail Runners where Clare organised the ordering, cooking and supplying of food for over 500 runners, volunteers and supporters. This takes much time both at and before the event and was made more difficult this year with quite a few of the regular volunteers unavailable due to Covid. She does the same thing at the many other events in Wamboin such the Wheels of Wamboin, Fireworks Night and the Fire Brigade Christmas party. Any profit goes directly to the Wamboin Fire Brigade. Clare fills this position quietly and efficiently and brushes off any praise.

Secondly, I want to sing the praises of Pam Muston who is an amazing marathon and ultra marathon runner (just Google her name) and is part of the Australian Mountain Runners Association. She organises the Kowen running events 3 times a year but once again it isn't a task that takes a day or two beforehand. She has an organised and dedicated team of helpers who work for months in the Kowen Forest hand raking and carefully cleaning the trails, so they are as safe as possible for the runners. This is physically demanding work but 'wait, there's more'! She and her volunteers also organise the entries, flags, the website, the drinks, the money, the



publicity...... On it goes! To top it off she then donates a huge amount of the takings to the Wamboin Rural Fire Brigade who have been able to buy essential equipment to improve our local firefighting operations and which have also included non-firefighting benefits for the community. On a lighter note, Pam also hand mows 2 of her paddocks to make golf holes for the Wamboin golf Association -she says it keeps her fit!!!! Just two unsung heroes in our neighbourhood!

The bush fire danger period commences on 1st October.



Are your preparations for the bush fire season underway? Great! If not, members of the Wamboin Rural Fire Brigade, and hundreds of other rural fire brigades across NSW encourage residents and property owners to make 17–18 September YOUR 'Get Ready' Weekend.

Your safety and survival may depend on the preparations and decisions you make even before there is a fire. In terms of fire safety, we encourage people to have, and practise, a family bush fire survival plan. **Do you need advice or guidance?**

On Saturday 17 September, coincidentally Wamboin Market day, <u>our Community Engagement Team of experienced firefighters will be on hand to talk with individuals on a one-on-one basis</u>, answer questions, and provide general advice on the preparation of a personal and family Bushfire Survival Plan. We can also help identify steps you could take to prepare your property. We can explain the new Australian Fire Danger Rating system implemented from 1 September – a factor to help guide when you should take certain decisions. We can't tell you what to do, but we can run through various scenarios for you to consider. We also offer free visits under our Resident Requested Property Visit Program. **Come and talk to us**

New Fire Danger Rating System (See next page)

On the next page you can see how The Australian Fire Danger Rating System (AFDRS) has redesigned the forecasting of fire danger in Australia. From September there will be just four levels of fire danger (instead of six) – Moderate, High, Extreme, and Catastrophic. When there is minimal risk, Fire Danger Rating signs will be set to 'No rating'. This is the white wedge sitting under Moderate. There are actions recommended for each level, so you'll know what to do to protect your life, family and property. The fire danger ratings are online and the roadside signs have been changed to the new system. The new system will be used across Australia so whether you're at home or travelling, you will see the same system being used. Community feedback was used in the design process to help make it easier to understand and to provide everyone with clearer advice about how to stay safe.

FIRE DANG RATING

KNOWING THE FIRE DANGER RATING MAY SAVE YOUR LIFE

The Fire Danger Ratings give you an indication of the consequences of a fire, if a fire was to start. They do not indicate the chance of a fire occurring, although this is a common misconception.

The higher the rating is, the more dangerous the conditions will be.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

The Fire Danger Ratings have four levels, which are:

MODERATE

PLAN AND PREPARE

At MODERATE, most fires can be controlled. Plan and prepare and be ready to act if there is a fire.

HIGH

BE READY TO ACT

At HIGH, be ready to act. Fires can be dangerous, so be alert for fires in your area.

EXTREME

TAKE ACTION NOW

TO PROTECT LIFE AND PROPERTY

At EXTREME, fires will spread quickly and become extremely dangerous. If a fire starts, take immediate action. If you and your property are not prepared to the highest level, go to a safer location well before the fire impacts.

CATASTROPHIC

FOR YOUR SURVIVAL

LEAVE BUSH FIRE RISK AREAS

Under CATASTROPHIC conditions, if a fire starts and takes hold, lives are likely to be lost. For your survival, leave bush fire risk areas. Stay safe by going to a safer location early in the morning or the night before.

NO RATING - On days when there's minimal risk, the white bar meaning 'No Rating' will be used. Report any fires to 000.

Well done Wamboin - a "Cracker of a Night"


Wamboin Playgroup Update

Nature Notes - August 2022

A few heavy falls of rain at the beginning of the month had white water thundering down my creek. And, later in the month, snow fell for quite a while one morning. It melted as soon as it hit the ground, but the temperature only reached 9 degrees that day. Most days though, temperatures reached the mid-teens and there were some pleasant almost-spring days.

The local Wattles, mostly Silver Wattles (*Acacia dealbata*) and Red-stemmed Wattles (*A. rubida*) are now laden with golden flowers and brightening up the landscape – with new growth on the eucalypts adding tinges of orange and yellowish green. Not much else is in flower yet, but yesterday I did find a single bright yellow flower on a Common Butterecup plant (Ranunculus lappaceus). Buttercups prefer moist soil, so are extending their range at my place which has been rather soggy for some time now.

A Magpie was picking up a few stringy strands of bark from a tree the other day, so the birds may be contemplating nest-building in spite of the still cold weather. And last week, while I was walking with friends in Molonglo Gorge, we heard a Horsfield Bronze Cuckoo calling.

Two birds I hadn't seen (or heard) for a while were here last week. A Grey Currawong was perched high in a tree in the driveway, and a Boobook Owl was calling nearby one evening. Like many owls, they feed on moths and beetles that have become scarce recently so it was good to hear that call again.

By the way, the Molonglo Gorge track (mentioned above) provides a beautiful walk, and, even though it's just down the road, much of the vegetation is different to our area. The walk to the Blue Tiles picnic area takes about three hours (if you're examining plants or bird-watching) along a narrow and rocky track on the steep hillside above the river. - **Jo Walker**




The handicapper became

Cindy's Winter Warmers

With these cold dark evenings in Wamboin and Bywong there is nothing nicer than a delicious warming casserole. I have a cast iron enamelled casserole dish which can be used on the stove top and in the oven. You can cook it low temperature slowly or a higher temp for a shorter time. As some of us are working from home so putting the casserole in a slow oven at lunchtime for an easy dinner is ideal. I prefer to use free range and organic meat and seasonal vegetables. I love the Fyshwick markets where I can taste the fruit and vegetables before I buy, there is nothing worse than coming home with look like luscious oranges to find they are sour and dry.

Pork With Cider And Mustard

1 pork fillet trimmed and cut into 2-inch (5 cm) lengths 4 pieces of good smoky bacon 1 medium finely chopped brown onion 1 230 ml bottle of dry cider 2 generous tablespoons Dijon mustard 1 tablespoon dried tarragon or 2 or 3 sprigs of fresh


Bunch Dutch carrots scrubbed or a couple of normal carrots, chopped into 2.5cm pieces 300 mls chicken stock 1 teaspoon of cornflour Salt and pepper

If you have don't have a dutch oven which you can use on the hotplate just use a frying pan. Chop bacon into small pieces and sauté with onion till brown and the onion is transparent. Add about a tablespoon of cider to deglaze the pot and put in a bowl without any kitchen towel as that absorbs the lovely cider. Place pieces of pork in pan and brown on all sides. Add another tablespoon of cider then

turn off the heat and add remaining cider, if you add it to quickly it will foam over the side. In the casserole dish place pork and cider with bacon and onion, tarragon, Dijon mustard and carrots season with freshly ground black pepper. Give the casserole a good stir so the mustard and tarragon integrate with the sauce, add enough of the chicken stock to cover meat and veggies keeping a tablespoon aside for later. Put the lid on and cook either low and slow, or for 1 hour at 170 Celsius. Mix the remaining chicken stock with a teaspoon of cornflour and stir into the casserole. Check seasoning and add salt and pepper to taste. Serve with mashed potato and steamed silverbeet or kale, this casserole is



Bird Of The Month

By Luke Downey

For September I chose the Flame Robin, a rarer species which has been around our place recently.

Flame Robin (Petroica phoenicea) Size: 12.5-14cm

The male Flame Robin is a very colourful bird, it has a vibrant orange-red breast and belly. The upperparts, tail, head and chin are dark slaty-grey, with a small white forehead. The vent is white, as are the undertail and outer tail feathers. Also present is a white wingbar across the wing (both above and below) forming a V-shape when seen from behind. The female, in comparison, is rather dull, but just as pretty in her own way. She is mainly brown all over, paler underneath fading to buff-white on the lower belly. She also has a white forehead, albeit less prominent, white outer tail feathers and white wingbars, bordered black. Immatures resemble females but are motley and duller, and males can have a red wash to the chest (very rarely also in females). Both sexes have black eyes, small black bills, and black legs. Flame Robins prefer to forage close to ground level in more open woodlands, perching on higher vantage points and flying to the ground to take insects. Recently, the bird seen around my place was observed singing from the top of a tree, which is slightly more unusual. Male Flame Robins are fairly distinctive with an orange red breast extending high onto the throat and grey upperparts. Females and immatures can pose ID (identification) problems with other female robins (e.g. Scarlet and Rose Robins). Flame

Robins tend to be more uniform brown, larger and appear longer and more upright in position when perched. They also have an extremely reduced white forehead, and almost always lack a reddish colour wash on the breast which is often present in other species. The call is also distinctive, and can be used to help with identification. An onomatopoeic rendering of the high-pitched trilling call is "you may come, if you will, to the sea". Flame Robins are generally uncommon and are also listed as threatened and the species is in decline. They undertake migration to the higher alpine areas of Namadgi and the Snowy in summer, and in winter they disperse widely across south-eastern Australia into open woodlands, when they are likely to be seen in the Wamboin area. In the past month, a single female has been singing from the top of a tree and residing with our local mixed feeding flock. A bird to keep an eye out for over the cooler months in Wamboin.



A Chronology of Wamboin and District, Part 8: 1941-1965 David McDonald

In late August the fourth edition of an historical timeline of our local area, titled 'A Chronology of Wamboin and District, NSW', was published at the Wamboin Community Association's (WCA's) website. Visit

https://www.wamboincommunity.asn.au/localhistory/ and navigate through the left-hand-side menus Wamboin Locality | Chronology. It commences with a two-page synopsis for readers seeking a brief overview of the history of the area.

This is the eighth article presenting some items from the Chronology that focus specifically on Wamboin and district, rather than the broader, contextual happenings. It covers the period 1941 to 1965, and future issues will continue the series. The full version of the Chronology at the WCA website provides the documentary sources (including URLs where appropriate) underpinning these contents and, in some cases, additional information, as well as other entries for the time period covered below.

Date	Occurrence/comment
1941, Oct	The men of the 3 rd Aust. Infantry Battalion (Werriwa Regiment), a Militia unit of men from the Monaro, Canberra & NSW South Coast regions, were called up for full-time service following Japan's entry into World War 2 the previous month. In May 1942, they embarked for Port Moresby, and served with outstanding distinction, experiencing a huge number of casualties, on the Kokoda Track and in the Gona/Buna Campaign.
1942, 27 Feb	A RAAF Wirraway training aircraft, serial no. A20-462, based at the RAAF School of Army Co-operation at the Canberra airport, crashed and burned on the 'Auverne' property, Millpost Lane, when on a map reading exercise. The pilot and observer were both killed in the crash.
1942, 30 May	Bywong Post Office at Emu Flat on the Bungendore/Gundaroo Road closed, Mary Harriott Postmistress.
1943, 4 th quarter	Amungula Telephone Office on 'Woodfield' station, Sutton Road, became a Manual Telephone Exchange.
1944, 04 Jan	A RAAF Wirraway training aircraft, serial no. A20-464, based at the RAAF School of Army Co-operation at the Canberra airport, made a forced landing following engine failure some six miles west of Bungendore. This would place it in the vicinity of what is now Wirreanda Road. The pilot and observer were not injured. The aircraft was repaired and returned to service.
1945, 8 May	Second World War: Victory in Europe Day (VE Day).
1945, 15 Aug	Second World War: Victory in the Pacific Day (VP Day): 'All offensive action against Japan comes to an end'. Also referred to as VJ Day: Victory over Japan Day.
1946	Severe bushfires in the area. It burned out the markers of the graves of the Gambell family on the western side of Amungula Creek (por. 88, parish of Goorooyarroo).
c. 1948	Creation of the map 'Murryong, Parishes of Amungula, Majura & Wamboin, County of Murray'. The 'Murryong' property covered much of the western part of Wamboin, and still operates as a pastoral property.
1949	Bungendore connected to mains electricity by tapping the 33,000-volt line to Captains Flat.
1949,19 Feb	Sutton Bush Fire Brigade created from the Gundaroo Bush Fire Brigade; responsible for the Wamboin area.
1949-1951	Korean War boom in wool prices.
1950s, early	The CSIRO commenced intensive research in the Murray River region into myxomatosis for the control of rabbits, with rapid success. The disease was observed in rabbits in Canberra in 1952, and by October 1954 local farmers were being urged to bring healthy rabbits to the Bungendore saleyard (and other locations in the area) to be inoculated: 'It is wished to spread the disease through all portions of the district and all landholders are encouraged to make an effort to present some rabbits for inoculation'.
1950, 29 Apr	Frank Wallis Hyles (1886-1952) auctioned 5,000 acres/20 sq km of his property 'Murryong Estate': from near the present-day Canning Close in the west to just past Ryans Road in the east, and north to the Wamboin/Bywong boundary.
1951	'As you drive from Bungendore to Wamboin shop on Norton Road [corner of Bingley Way] you can see a yellow farmhouse in the distance looking south towards Kowen Forest. Jack and Nita Welch raised 6 children, Peter, Steven, Allen, Gregory, Evelyn, and Karen in Wamboin between 1851 and 1976 and their access was via Kowen Forest to Molonglo Gorge forestry Road.'
1952, 25 Jan	Terrible bushfire from Canberra to the Tinderies; threatened Queanbeyan; and destroyed the Kowen Pine Forest. Being driven by westerly winds, presumably the fire that hit Kowen continued into Wamboin. Two lives were lost in these fires.
c. 1955	By this year, the electricity supply was connected from Queanbeyan to Amungula and Bywong.
1957, 22 Feb	Amungula Manual Telephone Exchange on 'Woodfield' station, Sutton Road, closed.
1961	Bungendore's ' fortunes received a fillip with a decision that the Kings Highway linking the blossoming Canberra with the coast at Batemans Bay should be routed through Bungendore and Braidwood. Building and sealing of the road was completed as far as Bungendore in late 1961 and meant that for the first time it was possible to travel from Bungendore to Canberra at speed and in comfort.'
1964	Arthur Shepherd died. He was the last miner resident at the Bywong gold mine site.
1965	The 1965 to 1968 drought commenced.
