






Bywong News



Geary's Gap-Wamboin and Sutton Landcare Groups – A Workshop of Collaboration By Geoff Butler

The Geary's Gap-Wamboin Landcare Group held a workshop for members of the Sutton Landcare Group on 20 November on how to propagate native species.

The session covered the use of cuttings to propagate natives and included valuable information on which species are best suited for this approach as well as in-depth techniques on the collection and preparation of cuttings as well as the use of hormones and appropriate soils and media. The morning session provided an opportunity for participants to prepare their own cuttings. The afternoon session focused on participants taking cuttings that were already producing healthy root systems and planting each individual plant into its own container to provide the best environment for a successful result.

The Geary's Gap-Wamboin Landcare Group has been developing closer ties with the Sutton Landcare Group, exchanging valuable information and skills and encouraging increased cooperation.

Photos of the Workshop: The Geary's Gap Wamboin Landcare Group's main activities centre around propagating and planting out native plants that grow well in the Gearys Gap/Bywong/Wamboin area. This includes plant propagation, planting the natives propagated in priority areas (primarily public places) as well as enhanced community awareness and knowledge about caring for the land and having an influence on the Queanbeyan-Palerang Regional Council on these important issues.



The Group also runs plant sales at the Wamboin markets and the Bywong Carboot Sale and uses the funds raised to educate the local community about the value of native plants and provide them with plants that do well in the area as well as advice about how to establish and care for them. What the Heck Part 8

Those who have driven through Sutton in the last two years, or have read my earlier articles about the Sutton church, will know that a new hall is under construction. This building is intended for community use, not just church related activities, as St Andrew's in Wamboin is used by non-church organisations.

The dream to have this facility is not new. I suspect many who attended services in the 'early days' of St Peter's dreamt of worshipping in a warm, cosy, modern building which included all mod cons of the day.

It was in 1981 that a special fund was created to put aside money for church building upgrades. Its initial purpose was twofold. One was to purchase an organ to keep the hymn singers both in tune and in unison, and secondly, to build a toilet to replace the 'long drop' toilet in use at the time. A few years later an organ was donated to the church, so the account became solely a building fund for a small toilet block.

On several occasions from 1999, 'Highfield', in Cooper Road Wamboin, held an open garden day to raise funds. Various other functions were held and parishioners and other locals made donations which kept the fund balance slowly creeping up. However costs were also heading that direction and the dream of an indoor toilet seemed as far away as ever.

On special occasion days and fund-raising events it was necessary to hire a portable toilet, so in 1998 a second-hand portable toilet was purchased as a temporary solution. However to use this still involved an outdoor trip and many of the elderly members were not comfortable with the facility, resulting in their stopping attending church services and functions.

In the early 2000s, Robyn Hardy put forward, and promoted, a five year plan for the development of St Peter's. Then, with help from Yvonne Barrett, the vision expanded to become not just a toilet, but an extension, with toilet, kitchen, meeting room, and a long awaited permanent vestry. The extension was to be attached to the front of the existing church, providing a wind break from the Westerlies which regularly blew open the front door during services.

The congregation soon came to realise that this was the opportunity to construct a building which would meet church needs into the decades ahead, taking into account the predicted growth of the region, and also a building which would be an asset, and a link to the

community.

In 2006 a building committee was formed and negotiations commenced with YVC. Over the years many different designs and plans were drawn and modified and discussed with council, heritage advisors and architects. A congregational meeting in 2019 endorsed the committee member's decision for a separate building, adjacent to, and complimentary to, the existing church building. In 2020, after forty years of waiting for a promised indoor toilet, the first sod was turned. – **Alan Rope**

Bird Of The Month

For December I chose the Dusky Woodswallow, a fairly common summer visitor to the region.

Dusky Woodswallow (Artamus cyanopterus)

Size: 17.5-20cm

Status: Fairly common breeding summer migrant

The Dusky Woodswallow is an active aerial bird, often seen in its distinctive spiralling/circling flight catching insects in the air. Their plumage is a dusky brown with dark slaty grey wings, with a fine white leading edge. The tail is dark with white corners and the bill is bluish. In flight, the dark body contrasts with the pale underwings. The male and female look the same. Dusky Woodswallows almost always occur in flocks which can occasionally number up to several hundred, and may also include other Woodswallows (e.g. Masked or White-browed, which are rarer in the local region). They like open habitats with perches like powerlines or dead trees where they perch often huddled close together, and perform small sallying acrobatic flights hawking insects, or circling 'glides' with their wings held out,



returning to the perch. They avoid denser forest and woodland where it is harder to fly. In flight their broader wings and tail help separate them from other true Swallows. Woodswallows are not closely related to true Swallows, instead they sit in the same family as Butcherbirds and the Australian Magpie. They nest often in forks or on the sides of trees amongst the bark with well camouflaged nests. They raise their young here over summer. In mid-autumn they leave southern Australia and move north to warmer climates for the winter. They are often seen flying high in big flocks, where they can be quite vocal making brassy chirruping and zitting calls. Make sure to keep a look out for these active birds over the summer months.

For January I chose the Eastern Rosella, a common and colourful resident around the region.

Eastern Rosella (Platycercus eximius)

Size: 29-34cm

Status: Common breeding resident



The Eastern Rosella is arguably the most colourful parrot in the local area, providing a vibrant flash of colour when seen. It has a bright red head, white cheek, yellow back and belly, becoming lime green on the rump and flanks, with a red vent, and blue wings and tail. The back is mottled with black. The female is slightly duller than the male. This colourful parrot frequents more open, grassy habitats than its Crimson cousin, occurring in grassland and woodland, avoiding the denser forests. The two species often co-occur, and whilst they are closely related,

they are very different visually, with Crimson's being plain red (green in juveniles) with some blue. Eastern Rosellas feed mostly on grass and plant seeds which they crack with their strong bill. They are usually found in small flocks, and are quite social and noisy, with a variety of high pitched squawks, clinks and chatterings. They breed in tree hollows in summer, and the young appear like a duller adult. Eastern Rosellas

are a very colourful and common resident and should be easy to observe around local roadsides and properties. Sometimes Australians take these colourful parrots for granted but even though they are abundant and may become pesky, most other parts of the world lack such colourful birdlife. Keep an eye out and enjoy the colourful splash these birds add to the local ecosystems. (Photo from Google Images)


The last Wamboin markets saw about 50 locals take advantage of the "Sim table" demonstration. This was a special sided table filled with sand and a projected topographic map displayed over the top to give a 3d image. Weather conditions and fire danger ratings could be added to the software, and a moving image would display simulating what bushfire might look like and do across the landscape. A scenario of a fire to our north west was loaded into the programme and showed what we might face on a very hot windy summers day. Some issues during the demonstration became evident, such as road closures and possible infrastructure failures such as power and mobile phone towers. Some locals watching quickly realised that some roads that aren't "through roads", once cut by a fire, would leave you no choice but to stay on your property if you left it too late to leave. Other main roads if cut, might mean an hour or more diversion or completely block access to or from Canberra, Bungendore or Queanbeyan. Understanding where a fire is headed is directly attributed to temperature, wind direction and speed, so during the demonstration, the spectators had a better understanding of what might happen, and show things they hadn't thought about previously. Having a fire plan is important living in a rural area so if you don't have one, consider getting one either online from the RFS website or picking one up at one of our information sessions.

As the grass is now starting to dry out in our area, the risk this year will be mainly from grass fires. Where grasses haven't been cut, you can see the seed heads now evident and the grass will start to die off and "cure" as it's referred to in the RFS. Cutting long, drier grasses comes with a risk in that sparks from hitting rocks etc., or heat build-up in mechanical parts or exhaust pipes on mowers or

tractors. Fires can start quickly and spread. In summer, cutting in the cool of the day when the humidity is low and winds are calm is preferred. Consider having a fire extinguisher attached to your mower or having one nearby. Wamboin brigade has attended many fires over the years where mowers have caught fire or caused a fire. Some owners were oblivious to a fire they started and it wasn't until they turned around to mow in the other direction, they noticed the flames. Sometimes it's a good idea to have a "spotter" available to be with the person mowing to keep an eye on things. It is a RFS requirement to have a 9 litre water fire extinguisher, 0.9kg dry powder fire extinguisher or a 16 litre knapsack spray pump filled with water when operating machinery in the fire season. Your mower is a very costly replacement, so having some sort of fire suppression equipment is a good insurance!

Finally, if you start a fire, or see a fire that is unattended, the only phone number to ring is 000. Do not try to ring the brigade. Ringing 000 will activate a paging system to get the closest brigade or fire appliance vehicle to you.

Nature Notes - November 2022

The rain seems to have eased a little, but there are still fairly regular showers and the weather forecast is for another wet summer. The temperatures are rising though and plants are beginning to grow fast – including rather a lot of weeds!

The native grasses are flowering at the moment. These include Kangaroo Grass (*Themeda triandra*), Red-anthered Wallaby Grass (*Rhytidosperma pallidum*), several other species of Wallaby Grasses (*Rhytidosperma* spp.), Brushtail Speargrass (*Austrostipa densiflora*) and Corkscrew Grass (*Austrostipa scabra*).


The Buttercups (*Ranunculus lappaceus*) are still covering a large area of grassland below my dam, and even more yellow is being added to the landscape by Sticky Everlasting Daisies (*Xerochrysum viscosum*) many of which are flowering along local roadsides. The suckering Common Everlasting (Chrysocephalum apiculatum) and the taller *Chrysocephalum semipapposum*) are bearing their small yellow button-like flowers, and, in wetter areas, the Billy Buttons (*Craspedia variabilis*) and the smaller Scaly Buttons (*Leptorhynchos squamatus*) are adding some more yellow. And the white Hoary Sunray (*Leucochrysum albicans*) flowers are still giving an impressive display. A bit of blue has just started to appear as the Bluebells (*Wahlenbergia stricta* and *W. communis*) begin to flower.

And, amongst the larger plants, some of the eucalypts are flowering. There is a small Scribbly Gum (*Eucalyptus rossii*) near my house that is covered in cream flowers at the moment. And the red flowers of a planted *E. leucoxylon* are attracting the attention of a lot of Red Wattlebirds.

Black Wattles (*Acacia mearnsii*) are beginning to flower too, their masses of cream flowers sending out a pleasant scent on the slightest breeze. The earlier-flowering Wattles would usually be carrying lots of seed pods by now but there appears to be hardly any on the Wattles here this year. Maybe, because of the wet weather, their pollinators were not around at the right time.

There was a Nankeen Kestrel hovering over the driveway here a few days ago. They used to be common visitors here but I hadn't seen one for some time. Probably, as the vegetation grows denser here, they seek more open land where they can see the ground more clearly and spot their prey.

It's interesting to see the plants, birds, lizards, insects and other parts of the fauna that come and go over the years depending on prevailing conditions. With Wamboin beginning to look more like a near-coastal countryside than the rather dry and rocky place it was years ago it will be interesting to watch.





A Chronology of Wamboin and District, Part 11: 1982 to July 1989 David McDonald

In August the fourth edition of an historical timeline of our local area, titled 'A Chronology of Wamboin and District, NSW', was published at the Wamboin Community Association's (WCA's) website. Visit https://www.wamboincommunity.asn.au/localhistory/ and navigate through the left-hand-side menus Wamboin Locality | Chronology. It commences with a two-page synopsis for readers seeking a brief overview of the history of the area.

This is the eleventh article presenting some items from the Chronology that focus specifically on Wamboin and district, rather than the broader, contextual happenings. It covers the period MONTH 1982 to DATE, and future issues will continue the series. The full version of the Chronology at the WCA website provides the documentary sources (including URLs where appropriate) underpinning these contents and, in some cases, additional information, as well as other entries for the time period covered below.

Date	Occurrence/comment
1982	Commencement of closer settlement in the Joe Rocks Road/The Mountain Road area.
1982, 3 Apr	A public meeting held on this date agreed that a community hall be built on a block which had been put aside
1982, 23 Dec	in Bingley Way for 'Local activities'. Following fundraising, local volunteers commenced erecting the hall. First birth to occur in Wamboin: Michael Bird.
1982, 23 Dec 1984	Wamboin Volunteer Bushfire Brigade created. John Finn was the first Brigade Captain and David Robertson
1904	the first President.
1984, 17 Mar	The initial erection of the Wamboin Community Hall framework collapsed.
1984, June	The Masons (Joan & Lofty) commenced as editors of the <i>Wamboin Whisper</i> , and filled that role until June 1989. 145 copies were printed, reflecting the small population of the area at that time.
1985	Greenways: Yarrowlumla Shire Council ' established a working party to develop a Shire-wide approach to
	a Greenways network that resulted in Council adopting "Access to the Countryside" as their Bicentennial theme in 1988.
1985	'Anglican Church services began in Wamboin in 1985 with monthly services held in the Bingley Way
	Community Hall.' The St Andrew's Church had not been built at that stage.
1985, 22 Jan	'Two men are facing prosecution by the Yarrowlumla Shire Council under the NSW Bushfire Act. A meeting
	of the council resolved last night to instigate court proceedings against the men, whom the council regards as
	having begun the bushfires through negligence. Council investigations alleged that a fire at Bingley Way,
	Wamboin, which burnt four hectares of grazing land on January 2, had been begun by a linesman working for
	the Southern Tablelands County Council, who allegedly dropped a cigarette in long grass. Another fire at
	Norton Road, Wamboin, on January 7, was allegedly begun by a lawn mower. That fire burnt 16 hectares and
	required bushfire units from Wamboin, Sutton, Queanbeyan and Kowen Forest.'
1985, 2 Mar	Majura Bushfire ignited on the southern slopes of Mount Majura, under suspicious circumstances. Strong
	N-W winds drove the fire east across the Field Firing Range and into Wamboin. 'Despite 27 houses being
	surrounded by fire, miraculously, no houses were lost. Other NSW Bush Fire Brigades, ACT tankers, Army
	water tankers and the Canberra Airport fire tender had all joined the fight, and were able to save all these
	homes. This event made a huge impact on Wamboin'.
1985, 23 Oct	The election of Lofty Mason of Wamboin, to fill a vacancy on Yarrowlumla Shire Council, was announced.
	'The returning officer and Shire Clerk, Mr Stuart Warner, said that only 37 per cent of electors eligible to vote
	had done so, although voting was compulsory.'
1986	The Sutton interchange grade-separation on the Federal Highway opened.
1986, 16 Aug	The inaugural Wamboin Curry Night was held to raise funds for the local golf club, and to build community
	cohesion. This occurred at the suggestion of Peter Flynn who became the organiser until 1993 when Dave
	Hubbard took over.
1986, 6 Oct	'Golf in Wamboin was started by the Fire Brigade to give the members an opportunity to get together for a
	social occasion. As this could not be achieved at a commercial course the idea came up for members to
	prepare a course over our own properties. The first Golf Game at Wamboin was played on Monday the 6th of
	October 1986. There were 35 players. \$5 entry fee. Shotgun start at 10 am. Free barbecue lunch plus one
1007 C	drink.'
1987, Sep	Wamboin resident, Peter Greenwood, elected as a councillor on the Yarrowlumla Shire Council.
1988, 18 Mar	Opening of the Sutton Interchange on the Federal Highway, along with the new 10 km dual carriageway.'
1988, Oct	Opening of the new Wamboin Bicentennial Fire Station at 112 Bingley Way, Wamboin. The Wamboin Volunteer BushFire Brigade Captain was John Finn, and the Brigade President Geoff Wines.
1989	Wamboin resident, Peter Greenwood, elected as Deputy Shire President, Yarrowlumla Shire Council.
1989	The then Geary's Gap Community Association (the name Geary's Gap was later changed to Bywong)
	developed a case for the establishment of the first Greenway in the area.
1989, July	The Nordsvans commenced as editors of <i>The Whisper</i> and filled that role until February 1990. 210 copies
	were printed.
