





The Bywong and Wamboin Greenways

What are they? Established as a pilot project in 1994, this network of public access ways is a combination of crown road reserves (some with paved roads, some without, some driveways and also crown roads that cut across existing private land) and also specifically identified 'greenways'. The current Greenways network comprises some 30 km of council reserves (most of which were formerly crown road reserves) and road verges.

The Greenways (as distinct from road verges that provide links between them) are for pedestrian, horse and push bike traffic only. In addition to recreational use, the land involved provides a unique opportunity to retain and revitalise areas of native vegetation. For the purposes of the *Local Government Act 1993*, the Greenways are designated a natural area for community use and the natural area is further designated as bushland.

<u>Where are they?</u> An excellent Greenways map can be found at <u>www.bywongcommunity.org.au</u> and a more detailed map, based on QPRC cadastral data, is online at https://www.qprc.nsw.gov.au/Building-Development/Planning-Zoning/Online-Mapping. Select the layer 'Greenways - Bywong Wamboin' and open the drop-down menu.

<u>How are they managed?</u> The Greenways are managed through the s.355 Greenways Management Committee (the Committee) of the Queanbeyan Palerang Regional Council (QPRC). After discussions regarding the role and use of s.355 committees by the new Council in 2022, all s.355 committee terms of reference and guidelines are currently being reviewed. At its 2022 Annual General Meeting (AGM), a seven member Committee was confirmed with

Kathy Handel as Chair, Craig Bradley as Secretary and Carol Boughton as Treasurer. Cr Katrina Willis is the QPRC councillor designate for the Committee, and the alternate is Cr Louise Burton.

On-ground works are delivered in conjunction with local volunteer labour and Landcare groups, and periodic working bees, with a focus on managing water erosion, revegetation, weed management, grass and vegetation slashing, signage and public awareness. The Committee maintains a Works Schedule, which is updated throughout the year, as a guide for working bees and to direct the efforts of Council and others through appropriate grant funding opportunities. As Council reserves, QPRC has overall responsibility for the management of Greenways, including any major works that are beyond the capacity of community volunteers.

An overarching Greenways Master Plan was prepared by the Greenways Renewal Working Group (GROW)* and the Committee and was published in 2018 and updated in 2020. The Master Plan's objective was to establish a 10-year strategy for the development and maintenance of the Bywong Wamboin Greenways network, as well as providing a framework for the development of similar networks elsewhere in the Queanbeyan Palerang Region.

Over the past few years, the combination of COVID restrictions and persistent La Niña (wet!) conditions has seen significant weed growth and erosion in a number of places on the Greenways. The Committee met with the QPRC General Manager, Ms Rebecca Ryan and Cr Katrina Willis at the end of 2022 to discuss these and other challenges. The General Manager advised that while there is no funding in the QPRC Budget to support Greenways' capital works and maintenance, the Committee can apply for grants under the auspices of Council.

The General Manager encouraged the Committee to both update the Greenways Master Plan to include a section on priorities for action, and to submit the Management Plan to Council for formal endorsement (with a suggested timeline of April 2023). Council endorsement of the Master Plan would enable it to inform grant funding opportunities (as noted earlier, the Committee can apply for funding grants from the NSW and Commonwealth governments and other organisations under the auspices of Council), and would also help ensure that Council was aware of Greenways-related issues in considering development applications.


This is important because the Master Plan asks that Council refer any proposed crown road closures to the Committee to ensure that appropriate consideration is given to any impact these may have on Greenways planning or management. The Master Plan also notes that future rural residential subdivision of large lots adjacent to current rural residential areas should similarly

involve consultation with the Committee so that any associated Greenway connectivity options can be identified. This is pertinent given discussions some years ago regarding the possibility of a new Greenway along Black Joes Creek, but subsequent iterations of the associated Development Approval (DA), and the final DA for the new area of Woodfield Hills, had removed this option without further engagement with the Committee

<u>How to get involved:</u> Walk, ride or cycle the Greenways – privately, or as part of a guided walk, and share your experiences on one or more of the local Facebook groups. Join guided Greenways walks established to share and promote the objectives of the Building Community Resilience Project (for further information see www.resilientbywongwamboin.net). Some 170 people have already participated in the Spring Greenways walks under the Project. A further three walks are planned for autumn 2023.

Raise issues – any queries, issues or concerns relating to the Greenways can be brought to the attention of either the Committee Chair (Kathy Handel – her details are included on the front of The Whisper under the key contacts list) or the Committee Secretary (Craig Bradley – cobardles@gmail.com.au). Depending on the nature of the issue, it could also be raised directly with the QPRC by sending an emailing to council@gprc.nsw.gov.au.

Wamboin Pony club is a small local pony club situated at 79 Canning Close Wamboin. We have 3 fully enclosed arenas for our members to safely ride in, (especially those beginning to ride and need to be in a confined area to maintain control), a club house, cross country jumps and horse yards.

We have 4 fully qualified instructors and members currently completing their instructors' certificates.

We have riders ranging from 3 years old to 80 years old and all our riders are helpful, supportive and encouraging of each other, no matter what your age or riding ability. Pony club is about learning and gaining new experiences and having fun with your horse, while making new friends along away. Note: Riders over the age of 25 are subject to the chief instructor's approval to ride at rally days. Riders over the age of 25 cannot compete in Pony Club competitions.

Pony Club rally days are usually held on the 2^{nd} and 4th Sunday of every month, even in the school holidays (except Christmas holidays). In the event the rally day isn't being held or there are changes members will be notified.

Rally days generally run from 9:00am – 1:00pm (approximately) Times may vary depending on weather. Generally, there are 1 or 2 sessions held in the morning with a break for morning tea around 11:00am followed by another 1 or 2 sessions. FOR ALL EMERGENCY CALLS



PREPARE. ACT. SURVIVE.

We've been busy since early December with callouts. 4 x MVA's, 1 x Ambulance assist, 1 x structure fire and 1 x grass fire. The structure fire was our biggest incident for some time, as it required our attendance for 4 days. 6 Neighbouring brigades together with NSW Fire and Rescue, NSW Police and NSW Ambulance all remained on scene for at least the first 10 hours.

WHEN A FIRE STARTS IN OUR AREA

If you are reporting a fire, ring ONLY 000. <u>Do not ring</u> the Wamboin station or Captain.

Once a fire has been reported in our area, it will immediately be listed on the FIRES NEAR ME APP. It will be listed as "OUT OF CONTROL". Until the RFS arrive on scene to assess the incident, it will stay listed as out of control. When it is changed to "BEING CONTROLLED", effective strategies are in operation or planned for the entire perimeter. When listed as "UNDER CONTROL", the fire is at a stage where firefighting resources are only required for patrol purposes and major re-ignition is unlikely. There are 3 alert levels,

(triangles with a flame) next to the listed incident. Yellow is

ADVICE, meaning a fire has started, no immediate danger, but stay up to date in case the situation changes. Orange is WATCH AND ACT means there is a heightened level of threat, conditions are changing and you need to start taking action to protect you and your family. Red is EMERGENCY WARNING, this is the Highest level of Bush Fire Alert. You may be in danger and need to act immediately. Any delay now puts your life in danger.

If you haven't set up your own "WATCH ZONE" on Fires near me, do so ASAP. You can set up a radius search (say 30KM as an example) Any fires within that radius will send a notification to your phone to let you know there is a fire in that zone. You can change your "watch zone" to whatever area you like.

SOCIAL MEDIA and FIRE INFORMATION:



Social media can be a great source of information and sometimes misinformation. Often, people will post incorrect information which might cause unnecessary panic. Information posted by local RFS Brigades, NSW RFS or the Lake George Fire Control & Administration Centre can give accurate information. If a fire escalates to an emergency warning, local ABC radio will give information. The RFS website will also have up to date information on fires. This will list ALL FIRES in NSW, so even if you smell smoke, it could be from a fire hundreds of kilometres away and NOT in our area. BOTH the FNM app and RFS website will show at all times all incidents in NSW, so go and have a look when there isn't smoke or a fire in our area to see how it all works.



Bird Of The Month

By Luke Downey

For February I chose the Dollarbird, an uncommon summer migrant that I have seen around the local area recently.

Dollarbird (Eurystomus orientalis)

Size: 26-30cm Status: Uncommon breeding summer migrant The Dollarbird is a colourful medium-sized bird that migrates to the local area from northern Australia (and further afield into Asia) during the warmer summer months, moving back north in winter. It is the only representative of its taxonomic family in Australia, the Rollers (Coraciidae), which mainly occur in Africa and Asia, and therefore it is quite unusual and distinct, with its closest Australian relatives being Bee-eaters and Kingfishers. Their plumage is a deep blue-green, becoming blackish on the head with a darker blue throat, wing tips and tail. They have a very wide red bill and red legs. The male and female look the same and the immature birds are more

blackish with a dark bill and legs. They typically perch conspicuously by themselves or in pairs, on perches in open areas such as powerlines, often near water. They



'hawk' insects in the air with their specially adapted wide bill. In flight they have a distinctive pale blue 'dollar' shaped marking in their wings, which can look similar to the introduced Common Myna but Dollarbirds are larger and a rich blue (not brown) in colour with longer wings and a red bill. Their call is distinctive, which is a harsh metallic "kak". Dollarbirds are an uncommon bird locally and I haven't seen many in Wamboin, however they are more regular at a few other places nearby including Sutton and Fyshwick in Canberra. For those that go to the coast they are also more regularly seen in coastal regions. Recently I have seen quite a few, after not having seen many over the last few years. So make sure to keep an eye out for this colourful bird as the summer comes to an end. (Photo from Google Images)



What the Heck: Chapter 9

In the last episode I detailed how the early St Peter's congregation begged and fought for indoor facilities for forty years. The plan printed with the article was one of several prepared for consideration, and not part of the initial proposal by Robyn and Yvonne for a five year plan. Their idea, and prompting, kicked off the discussion to physically do something, not just talk about it. However it still took many years to reach a decision. In those days St Peters was still part of the St John's church in Canberra, so discussions involved not just the Sutton congregation but also the St John's Parish Council, The Anglican Property Trust, and of course, Yass Valley Council. As was said in the last chapter, a five year plan was proposed early 2000, but it was not until 2006 that a committee was formed. Many plans and ideas were thrown around until 2014 when a decision was made by the building committee to erect a separate building for use by the community as well as church members.

Once this decision had been made it was time to begin many meetings and serious negotiation with the Council, to design and erect a building which met current planning laws, achieved the requirements for both church and community use, and complementary to the existing church building, which is listed as an item of historical significance to Sutton.


Construction of the hall commenced early 2020, but Covid 19 caused this to continue at snail's pace, greatly frustrating the church members. However by late 2021 there were bathroom facilities located in the hall and available for use.

Some people have said "but you still need to go outside of the church to use the facilities". Yes, this is true, but I do not recall ever visiting a church where one could access a toilet directly from the worship area. I can't imagine anyone jumping up mid-sermon and slipping into the loo in front of a roomful of watching eyes. Coming back would be even worse. And the poor preacher would probably lose his/her train of thought. And might even have to start the sermon again to the horror of the congregation. Then of course there would be the gossipers who would have a field day debating whether it was a #1, or a #2. Even Ladbroke's might get in on the act!

Meantime work is continuing on the building. Thanks to some successful fund-raising events and some very generous local donors, the kitchen fit-out will happen within a month or so.

Next will be the installation of the air-conditioning followed by the wall and ceiling sheeting, as more funds come in from more planned fundraising events.

We are getting there, but we still have a long way to go.



Wheels of Wamboin 2023

Start dusting out those cobwebs and checking the oils as the Wheels of Wamboin

returns in 2023 on Saturday April 15th. 2023 marks some very important car anniversaries including Louis Renault who tested his first car 125 years ago in 1898 and this was of course the foundation for Renault. In 1903 (120 years ago) Henry Ford launched the first production A model Ford and 1923 marked the construction of the first BMW

motorcycle. In 1923 there were some truly iconic nameplates including Vauxhall, Dodge, Rolls Royce, Peugeot, Fiat, Alvis, Triumph, Buick, Cadillac, Auburn, Chevrolet, Hudson, Lincoln, Nash, Oldsmobile, Pontiac, Studebaker, Willys, only a few have survived the 100 year journey. 1923 was also the first year the 24 hours of Lemans motor race (and still running today) and electric windshield wipers first went on sale in the United States.

50 years ago in Australia, Holden sold 177,000 cars and the HQ Kingswood was the top selling passenger car and the Ford Falcon running second. Valiant's accounted for 31,000 cars. The ill-fated P76 was launched in 1973 so was the new XB Falcon in September. Along with the XB came the new ZG Fairlane. You could buy a new 180B Datsun or Honda Civic. The Mazda rotaries were on the market as was the new series 1 Celica from Toyota and the second generation Corolla. Torana's and Cortinas were on the streets as Australia started the move to the small and medium sized sedan with the oil crisis starting to bite late in 1973 and petrol soaring to around 50 cents a litre by 1974.

One of the big celebrations will be that of Matchbox cars who turn 70 years old. The first Matchbox models by Lesney Products rolled out of their matchbox size boxes to inspire generations of young car enthusiasts. The first model was a red and green road roller. Since then, they have sold over three billion cars. Expect some anniversary limited editions to be announced during the year including one for the coronation of King Charles III. -Peter Evans



Wamboin Entrance Sign Damage

On 23 January an ACT-registered car crashed into our masonry Wamboin locality entrance sign at the corner of Norton Road and Sutton Road, badly damaging its northern half. The police attended. The driver was not injured, but the car appeared to be a write-off. Apparently the driver was an allied health professional travelling from Canberra to provide a health care service to a client in our area.

The Wamboin Community Association (WCA) is obtaining quotations for work to repair the sign, the costs of which we expect to be covered by the driver's third party property damage car insurance.

The entrance sign was constructed in 2008 by Wamboin resident Dave Argaet, and his team. Sadly, Dave died in July last year. As Gabrielle Le Grand wrote in the August 2022 *Whisper* (p. 7), 'Dave [Argaet] is probably best known for his stone masonry which is all around the Wamboin and Bungendore areas, most prominently the big Wamboin sign on the corner of Sutton and Norton roads, but also in beautiful handmade stone gateways and landscaping features throughout the region. Dave was also an artist and created the award-winning half-sunken "Sands of Time" house sculpture along Lake Road.'

The WCA will keep the community informed on progress in repairing and rebuilding the sign.

WCAG Update on the Broadband Fibre Network Project for Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton - January 2023.

Summary: Opticomm Ltd has been contracted by the NSW Government to construct and operate a Fibre to the Premises (FttP) based Broadband Network for over 1,400 residences across Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton. Construction of the network is being undertaken on a cluster-by-cluster basis and commenced late last year in Sutton village. The project is scheduled to be completed by the end of 2023.

Changes to Eligibility: The NSW Government is funding the full cost of the connection to eligible residences (ie at no cost to the property owner). As a result of the "Feasibility Review" undertaken by the Department late last year, there have been some changes to eligibility. Specifically:

- A significant number of properties were omitted from the original list provided by the Department. The outcome of the Review has seen the majority of these now being included. As a result, the number of properties being connected under the project has risen from 1,352 to over 1,400.
- However, in order to fund these extra connections, it appears that the Department has instituted a new policy it calls "one
 address, one connection". The effect of this policy is that properties with more than one residence will only be funded for
 the connection of a single service. The list published by the Department last year included a total of more than 80
 additional connections to second residences (ie dual occupancies), Caravan Parks, Businesses, Resorts, etc.
- Affected residents should already have been contacted regarding this change but if in doubt you should check your
 address status on Opticomm's web site, and if necessary, contact the Department (see Links below). Opticomm can
 provide information and costs for additional connections.

Opticomm:

- Opticomm has undertaken a mailout to eligible residences across the three communities. However, it appears that many
 residents have not received a copy of this notice. The primary purpose of the mailout was to ask residents to register their
 contact details as Opticomm wishes to contact residents, prior to construction in each cluster, to discuss the fibre route
 and point of connection to the residence. To do so, they need to have your contact details (eg name, phone number, email
 address). Please ensure that, if you haven't already done so, you registered these with Opticomm as soon as possible
 (see link below).
- Opticomm can provide further information to residents about how to go about using the service (including choosing a plan that meets your needs and budget) once the fibre is connected to the residence.
- WCAG has received some very positive feedback from residents in Sutton about the effort undertaken by the construction
 crew to minimise any impact on garden features, trees, etc. In your discussion with Opticomm's construction team,
 regarding the route to be taken for the fibre lead-in, please ensure that you alert them to any existing underground
 services. This is especially important if this was installed by the owner.

Starlink

A significant number of residents across the three communities have installed SpaceX's Starlink service at their properties over the last two years. There is no doubt that Starlink provides a far superior service to that of NBN's SkyMuster satellite service, so the strong uptake by residents is not surprising. Several residents have reached out to WCAG seeking to understand why they should consider connecting to the fibre network, given that they are happy with Starlink. There are MANY reasons why you will almost certainly be better off with a fibre connection. In summary, these are:

- Cheaper In addition to the cost of the Starlink dish (\$450 to \$924) and any costs of its installation on your roof, there are the usual monthly service costs of about \$139. Opticomm Service providers offer hundreds of plans, with many having far cheaper monthly charges for a comparable service. Depending on the contract you agree to, there may or may not be a once-off connection fee (typically \$100).
- Faster Early Starlink users often saw download speeds of up to 300 Mbps. However, as more people in the area have installed the service, typically they now see download speeds of between 50 to 150 Mbps. Opticomm's fibre service will be initially capable of up to 1,000 Mbps (ie 1 Gbps), and is able to be upgraded in the future to 10,000 Mbps.
- **Greater Competition** While Opticomm is building and operating our fibre network, they operate as a wholesale provider. Your service contract is actually with one of Opticomm's 50 Service Providers. This has the benefit of providing an environment that ensures competition and pricing that is aligned to residents in the cities. Contrast this to Starlink, which, once you purchase the dish, has a monopoly total control over pricing, speeds, download limits, etc. As we've seen from Starlink's recent announcement to cap downloads for some users, this is a real issue.
- Latency Starlink's latency is far lower than other satellite-based internet services being typically between 30ms and 50ms for Australian based servers. While this is adequate for most applications, it can degrade some services eg online gaming. Fibre latency is more typically between 5ms to 10ms.
- Reliability While this has improved a lot for Starlink over the last 18 months with the addition of more satellites, the fact remains that the service continues to be affected by very heavy cloud and rainstorms. The Starlink dish is also known to shut down when subject to high temperature. Fibre is not subject to such environmental issues.
- Phone Service Many of Opticomm's Service Providers offer a range of additional services including the option to use the fibre connection to replace your exiting phone. For many residents who have lost their copper connection and have had to rely on using a mobile service (if they can get a signal), this will allow them to re-establish a basic phone service again. For other residents, it may present them with a far cheaper alternative to that of retaining their existing copper service. This capability does not exist for Starlink.
- Power Consumption Starlink users have noted much higher household power consumption.
- Property Value It is generally understood that a fibre broadband connection adds value to a property above that of
 other internet connections.

A Chronology of Wamboin and District, Part 12: July 1989 to September 1999 David McDonald

In August the fourth edition of an historical timeline of our local area, titled 'A Chronology of Wamboin and District, NSW', was published at the Wamboin Community Association's (WCA's) website. Visit https://www.wamboincommunity.asn.au/localhistory/ and navigate through the left-hand-side menus Wamboin Locality | Chronology. It commences with a two-page synopsis for readers seeking a brief overview of the history of the area.

This is the eleventh article presenting some items from the Chronology that focus specifically on Wamboin and district, rather than the broader, contextual happenings. It covers the period July 1989 to September 1999, and future issues will continue the series. The full version of the Chronology at the WCA website provides the documentary sources (including URLs where appropriate) underpinning these contents and, in some cases, additional information, as well as other entries for the time period covered below.

Date	Occurrence/comment
1989, July	The Nordsvans commenced as editors of <i>The Whisper</i> and filled that role until February 1990. 210 copies were printed.
1989, 4 Nov	A front-page article in the <i>Canberra Times</i> issue of this date reported on a \$3.8 million cannabis crop that had been discovered in the roof of a house on a property at Wamboin. 'Police said yesterday they had charged a Canberra man with possessing, supplying and cultivating a prohibited substance. A Queanbeyan man was being questioned and was also expected to be charged.
1990, April	The editors of The Whisper from this month until June 1993 were Jans/Frazer/Bedford.
1991	Steve & Ruth Lambert commenced planting wine grape vines at what became Lambert's Winery.
1991, 27 Feb	Bywong Community Incorporated registered. Previously known as the Geary's Gap Community Association.
1991, Sep	Wamboin resident, Peter Greenwood, elected as Shire President, Yarrowlumla Shire Council.
1992, Sep	'September 2022 marks the 30th anniversary of Wildcare Queanbeyan. Wildlife rehabilitation in this region began in 1991 with the formation of a group run by WIRES. According to Di Stockbridge, a founding member of Wildcare Queanbeyan, when the members realised more than 50% of the funds raised by them had to be returned to WIRES head office in Sydney and would not be used to benefit the animals in this region, she and the other founding members established a new group, and Wildcare Queanbeyan was born.'
1992, 24 Nov	Gearys Gap Pony Club Inc. incorporated, registration no. Y1621539. Based at the Les Reardon Reserve, Bywong.
1993, July	Ned Noel commenced as editor of <i>The Whisper</i> and he is still in that role. 325 copies were printed.
1994, 7 Jan	'A 14-year-old boy was officially cautioned by Bungendore police for lighting a fire on a day of total fire ban after a home-made ignition device he had been experimenting with started a fire on the Norton Road in Wamboin yesterday. 'The fire was reported at 11.30am and the Wamboin Bush Fire Brigade put it out before it could threaten
	property. About 2.5ha of grassland was burnt. A police spokesman said it had been a serious offence, but because of the boy's age he had received only an official caution.'
1995	Yarrowlumla Shire Council established a s. 355 Committee to manage the newly created Wamboin/Bywong Greenways.
1995, 20 Jun	Gearys Gap/Wamboin Landcare Group Incorporated registered. The first President (following incorporation) was Trevor Gough.
1995, 29 Jun	Wamboin Community Association Incorporated registered. The first President (following incorporation) was Steve Lambert.
1997-2009	The Millennium drought.
1997, Apr, Jun	Ned Noel, <i>The Whisper</i> editor, documented and published valuable oral histories of the Wamboin area in <i>The</i>
& Sep	Whisper.
1998, 8 Mar	The new St Andrew's Anglican Church, Wamboin, was consecrated by Bishop George Browning. The church was funded by David Robertson on land donated by the Schultz family. It was built by Ken Kelly.
1998, 29 May	Gazettal of name 'Bungendore Road' for the former 'Gundaroo Road'.
1999	The Wamboin Rural Fire Service came first in the Light Tanker Pumping Event at the 1999 NSW Rural Fire Service State Championships.
1999 – 2001	Wamboin Community Association (WCA) members became increasingly concerned about what they considered to be a significant increase in low-flying commercial aircraft in the skies above Wamboin. Keith France represented the WCA on a Noise Reference Group convened by the Canberra international Airport. The community's concern was about the adverse impacts of low-flying aircraft on community amenity.
1999, 7 Jul	Wamboin Pony Club Incorporated registered, incorporation no. Y3002121.
1999, 3 Sep	Yarrowlumla Shire Council notified its intention to close a section of Clare Lane at mid-length. 'The purpose of the road closure is to prevent through traffic along the lane in order to relieve safety concerns at the Clare Lane/Bungendore Road intersection.' The proposal was subsequently implemented, and the road closure today separates Clare Lane from Valley View Lane.
