

President's Paragraphs




Well now its a new month and a new State Government but events in Wamboin are still going strong. April is going to be as busy a month as March was.

It's been a busy month for the brigade. There were various callouts for

smoke sightings, MVA, assist police rescue at Lake George and the biggest commitment this season at the Curraweela fire. This fire grew to a final size of 4437 Ha, Wamboin



Brigade spent 312 hours over 6 days and nights with 17 firefighters on 3

Wamboin appliances. Many of the Lake George Zone brigades also made a similar commitment, and RFS members spent many thousands of hours on the fire ground.

Fire Season Ends

The current fire season is expected to finish on 31st March. This means from April 1, you will not require a permit, <u>BUT</u>, you <u>must</u> notify the RFS via the online portal and <u>ALL</u> your adjoining neighbours all at least 24 hours prior to lighting up. Here is the link: https://www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/fire-information/BFDP/burn-notifications

A word of caution! Although it will be out of the fire season, there are still large amounts of long grass around and it is still very dry. A windy day comes with a risk, as autumn fires do happen if you don't use common sense, checking weather conditions, being in attendance and having a water supply available should things go wrong. Remember, if a fire escapes your property, and damages another person's land or property, you will face the full extent of the law! Please do the right thing, keep your pile burns small and easily manageable. 17 firefighters

Wamboin Rural Fire Brigade – Built by the locals!

Back in 1972, this area was known as "Canberra Country Estates". It was felt that this name wasn't appropriate and at a meeting of 60 locals, some names were suggested, one of which was Wamboin. In July 1981, that name was adopted and gazetted for the area to be known from then as Wamboin. The area in the 1970's was under the jurisdiction of the Sutton brigade, and it became apparent by the community, that we should make steps to be involved with the then "NSW Bush fire brigades". We soon became part of the Sutton brigade, the locals built a fire shed in Cooper Road, and we soon had two fire trucks. By 1984, Wamboin brigade was formed and again the locals took the challenge to build a permanent fire station in Bingley way.

In the early days of the brigade, a high percentage of the locals became active members of the brigade. It was common to think along the views that "If we don't start doing things for ourselves, we won't be protected". Groups like the Community

Association, Golf Club, and Playgroup etc. were formed because of the needs of the community and assets like the Hall, toilets and other buildings were ALL built by the locals. Many of the brigade's key members are still active within the brigade, with some well over 40 years contribution to the Wamboin brigade. It's a typical scenario across volunteer organisations in Australia, where the members are ageing at growing rate. The average age of RFS members across NSW is now over 50.

Wamboin has had some luck with recruiting some new, younger members and we hope this trend continues. We hope they stay with the brigade, and move up the ladder to become crew leaders and field officers in the future. Without these people, many brigades will find it difficult to continue. The rewards in being a member of the RFS are huge. It's something that Australians have done for years. It does need a commitment, and hopefully a long term one. All our members always find the time for the brigade and their family so if we can do it, maybe you can too! Contact our brigade if you are interested.







Bird Of The Month

For April I chose the Yellow Thornbill, a small bright yellow bird which I have been seeing frequently lately. Yellow Thornbill (Acanthiza nana) Size: 10cm Status: Uncommon breeding resident


The Yellow Thornbill is a tiny bird, but noticeable due to its bright yellow colouration on the underparts. They are an active bird, usually foraging for insects in the canopy of trees, and may be hard to observe well, but the yellow colouration usually stands out enough to detect the bird. They are duller olive-yellowish on the back, and brown on the wings and tail, with a dark eye, and pale streaking on the

cheek. Yellow Thornbills are the least common of the five Thornbills in the local region, the other four being Brown Thornbill, Striated Thornbill, Buff-rumped Thornbill, and Yellow-



rumped Thornbill. Yellow Thornbills are more common at the coast; although they can be found a considerable way further inland. They are more fussy than other Thornbill species with respect to where they occur, and whilst they will occur throughout forests and woodlands, they specifically prefer groves of trees with fine foliage, for example needle-leaves Casuarinas or Callitris, or bipinnate leaves of Acacias. I don't see them too often locally, but there have been a few hanging out in some dense Acacias along our road. They like to occur in flocks, usually associating with larger

mixed species flocks of other small birds, such as other Thornbills, Robins, Fairywrens, and Honeyeaters. Their call is usually a harsh, deep "chi-zit-zit". They are similar to the tiny Weebill, which has a pale eye, and prefers more open woodlands, is also less rich yellow, without the facial streaking, and has a different, more musical call. The White-throated Gerygone is similarly vibrant yellow but has a white throat, darker brown upperparts and head, and a musical call. Make sure to keep a look out for this bright little bird, and perhaps if you are heading down the coast you may be more likely to see them there. They also can be seen (Photo from Google Images) at birdbaths.

A Chronology of Wamboin and District, Part 14: November 2002 to June 2004 David McDonald

The fifth edition of an historical timeline of our local area, titled 'A Chronology of Wamboin and District, NSW', has been published at the Wamboin Community Association's (WCA's) website. Visit https://www.wamboincommunity.asn.au/localhistory/ and navigate through the left-hand-side menus Wamboin Locality | Chronology. It commences with a two-page synopsis for readers seeking a brief overview of the history of the area.

This is the 14th article presenting some items from the Chronology that focus specifically on Wamboin and district, rather than the broader, contextual happenings. It covers the period Nov 2002 to Jun 2004, and future issues will continue the series. The full version of the Chronology at the WCA website provides the documentary sources underpinning these contents and, in some cases, additional information, as well as other entries for the time period covered below.



What the Heck: Chapter 11

Each year there are four months that have five Sundays and seeing as our two churches have services on alternate Sundays, Wamboin the first and third, Sutton the second and fourth, where would one go to church on these fifth Sundays? The answer is that we alternate these four days so it is necessary to check the noticeboards if you want to attend the service.

A five Sunday month can be any month other than February, except in a Leap year when 1 Feb is a Thursday. Your next opportunity to go to a weekly church service five times in a February is 2032, so you don't have a real long time to wait. But meantime there will be plenty of opportunities to attend a fifth Sunday service in the other months.

This month has a fifth Sunday (30 April) and the service will be held at Wamboin and starting at 10.30am, with a group lunch somewhere after the service, but that is all I know.

Fifth Sunday services at our local churches are varied in starting-time, presentation, duration, style, and the only way to see what is happening is to attend. It could be a musical extravaganza, a talk fest, a movie show, a food feast, maybe a rev-you-up sermon, (or, but mostunlikely, a very boring sermon, but if this is the case the seats are comfortable and silent snoring is permitted). Come along this month and be surprised at what happens, like I will.

Our churches operate under the auspices of the Anglican Church of Australia, previously the Church of England, so used to be known as the C of E. Some wags were known to say their religion was C and E, Christmas and Easter. Whether this name fits you or not, and regardless of your branch of religion, you are welcome to attend church with us this Easter. There will be a service at Wamboin on Good Friday (7 March) at 0930 and another at Sutton on Easter Sunday (9 March) at 0930.

So What Does The Average Punter Really Know About Kangaroos

- Kangaroo joeys are the size of a jellybean and weigh 1 gram at birth
- They can't hop backwards
- There are 60 species of kangaroo (known as macropods)
- They can hop 8 metres (25 feet) in a single bound
- Their tail is used as a fifth limb
- Their lifespan in the wild averages at 8 years but that increases to an average age of 25 in captivity. In general terms though, many live to around 20 years old in the wild.
- They have a grooming toe on the inside of both feet which has two little nails which they use to scratch themselves and get right into their ears.
- When they shake themselves they look extremely uncoordinated.
- They are left-handed. Researchers have discovered that they use their left hand 95% of the time (unless they want to scratch themselves on the right hand side...that's a bit difficult to do with their left hand - their arms are so tiny (3)
- Arms are also what they use to cool down. They lick their forearms and that cools their blood.
- Gestation for embryos is only five weeks. They are then born and use their forearms to drag themselves into the pouch.
- A female can pause the pregnancy. Gestation can become dormant with the embryo pausing development until the doe's body sends out hormonal signals for development to recommence.
- Dormancy of a joey can relate to the pouch not being available at the time of pregnancy. Once the pouch joey becomes an at foot joey, development recommences.
- Dormancy of a joey can also be triggered by inappropriate environmental conditions.
- A female kangaroo has two teats and can produce two different kinds of milk, to simultaneously feed a newborn and an at foot joey, both of which require different levels of protein and fat.
- There is a 'World Kangaroo Day' which is on 24 October every year. Who knew.
- There is always a dominant male in a mob.
- Eastern Grey Kangaroos are one of the largest macropod species.
- Kangaroos have the highest birth to adult weight ratio of any animal. A male can reach 90kg in weight which means they grow to 90000 times bigger than when they were born.
- Each roo has its own smell so become very possessive of their own pouches when in care; to the point of there being a bit of biffo if someone else decides to jump in.
- Sometimes joeys in care will tolerate sharing their bag with another joey they consider to be 'part of their mob'.



Canberra Country Estates / Wamboin, 50 years on.....

It's just past the 50 year anniversary since my parents, Sally & Dene Evans purchased their property back in February 1973. Canberra Country Estates (as it was known as) was first advertised in December 1972 as freehold land available, just over the ACT border in NSW. My sister had won a Quarter horse yearling in the Sunday Telegraph "Win your own Quarter horse" competition a couple of years previously, after she had pestered my Dad to buy her a horse. His answer at the time was, 'why don't you enter this competition if you want a horse?' 15,000 entries later, this was the catalyst to buy a rural property and was something that was to change our lives.

The subdivision, just off Sutton Road comprised mainly 5 acre blocks, sealed roads and power available to the street. Norton Road finished at Fernloff Road. My parent's block was in Gallagher Crescent and priced at \$15,000. There were no houses at all built in the area. The powerlines back in 1973 to the roads were only under construction, and took another year to complete. Shortly after, a couple of houses stared to be built in Cooper Road, and my parents decided to build in 1976, the third house to be built in the area. A building covenant existed at the time that all houses had to be brick veneer and have a tiled roof.

Things were very quiet out here, no facilities at all. The closest shops were Queanbeyan. Bungendore was a half hour drive. I was attending school in Campbell. After some enquiries, we found a school bus that took the kids from the Kowen Forest settlement and from properties on the Sutton Road (within the ACT) to Campbell schools. The condition was that you could only be picked up in the ACT so I got dropped off just over the border, on the ACT side.

My sister became friends with the Bingley's and Harriden's on the Sutton Road. The Bingley's were a source of local knowledge and information, as their family had been in the area for generations. Sutton Bush Fire Brigade was the closest brigade and had fire trucks on the larger property owners along the Sutton Road. I remember attending a fire near Gundaroo where my Dad and I jumped on Jack Cooper's fire truck in the middle of the night with only wet wheat bags to put out the flames!

"Canberra Country Estates" name was changed due to local lobbying and by July 1981 was officially changed to "Wamboin". The community was close, most people knew everybody and were involved in most activities. The Cooper Road fire shed, Wamboin Community Hall, toilet block, new fire station were ALL built by the locals. If you wanted something out here, you got involved in some way to make it happen.

Wamboin continued to grow, with subdivision after subdivision along Norton Road, making its way towards Bungendore. It finally stopped near Ryans Road but Wamboin still came to a dead end. Clare Valley Estate started to be developed from Bungendore Road back towards older Wamboin. After a number of fires in the area, the road was built to join both sections of Norton Road so it became a through road and was a means of escape if a big fire was to hit the area.

So much has changed since the early days of Wamboin. Many homes have been sold from the original owners, maybe twice or more! Those original families who did start the community are still around and feel an ownership to the things they built, and things that were achieved when there wasn't so much bureaucracy around. There are many groups, Fire Brigade, Community Association, Golf Club, Play Group, Pony Club, Table Tennis Club, Social group and the Wonderful Women of Wamboin group. All those have enjoyed the comradery with the friends they have met in the Community. I hope the tradition continues, with newer families taking over where the original ones started, to build and maintain the Community and its facilities and continue to make Wamboin such a great place to live! - **Don Evans**
